## Governor's Year in Review

## **Executive Summary**

Our theme for the year, "The Magic of Rotary," encapsulated the spirit of our organisation. There is something truly magical about the way we come together as Rotary and Rotaract members to create positive change. It reminds us that our work is not just about projects and programs; it's about the lives we touch and the hope we inspire.

The 2024–2025 Rotary year was a celebration of connection, belonging, and the irresistible magic of Rotary as we:

champion Rotary's Action Plan find a balance between continuity and change work for peace

Our Rotary Action Plan is our strategic framework that focuses on four essential priorities:

- Increasing our impact amplifying the good we already do. Whether it's through service projects, fundraising efforts, or community partnerships, we have the power to make a significant difference. This past year, we focused on continuity by scaling successful initiatives (Say No to Domestic and Family Violence, Mental Health, Falls Prevention and more), and embracing the formula for change with new projects.

## District 9640 Rotary Foundation District Grant Review for the Rotary year 2024-2025

Each year an annual review is conducted for the previous year's allocation and management of District Grants. District 9640 has complied with the District 9640 Rotary Foundation Financial Management Plan and The Rotary Foundation Memorandum of Understanding. A copy of the D9640 District Designated Funds (DDF) and Grants Annual Report 2024-25 is *attached*.

D9640 has a 100% compliance with our grants management process for the 2024-2025 Rotary year.

The District 9640 Rotary Foundation Financial Management Plan was updated this year. A copy of the signed document is available on the district website.

## D9640 Fundraising for the Rotary Foundation

What a positive momentum in club and personal contributions to the Rotary Foundation. Across all funds (Annual, Polio Plus, Other & Endowment) over **USD 252k** has been contributed during 2024-25 by clubs and members.

- A total of US\$130,466 was donated to the Annual Fund
- A total of US\$44,368 was donated towards Polio
- A total of US\$70,513 was received from the Endowment fund.
- A total of US\$7,350 was received in 'Other funds' (e.g. directed gifts to approved grants)

#### The total equates to a total giving amount of US\$252,696.

- Only the Annual Fund amount is used in the calculation for the District Designated Funds that return to the district in 3 years.
- Other funds include term/directed gifts and funds for approved grants.
- Only the annual interest on Endowment Funds returns to the district each year.

### Polio Plus Society

This year we launched our Polio Plus Society with eighteen members and counting. Everyone can be part of our District 9640 Polio Plus Society, a fundraising and recognition program specifically to support the worldwide effort to eradicate polio.

This new fundraising and recognition program that specifically supports PolioPlus encourages Rotary members and others to pledge at least US\$100 per year to the PolioPlus Fund until polio is eradicated from the face of the earth. Contributions will count toward Paul Harris Fellow recognition and Major Donor status and will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation.

## Polio update



As you would be aware Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years, and we have made incredible progress in the fight to rid the world of it forever. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary has helped to reduce polio cases by more than 99.9% since the mid-1980s. It is crucial to eradicate polio from the last two countries where it remains endemic and to keep other countries polio-free.

## WHO Wild Polio Virus Summary

The Polio report (July 2025) shown below details the progress being made in the battle to eradicate Polio and shows both the Wild Polio virus (WPV) confirmed cases and the Circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus (cVDPV) cases.

#### Peace

Our Four-Way Test shows us how peace starts within. It guides us to treat others with honesty and kindness, fostering peace in our communities.

A Peace Pole is a monument that displays the message "May Peace Prevail On Earth" in the language of the country where it is placed. It usually displays 3 to 7 additional languages meaningful to the host site. The message is an affirmation of peace, and its placement furthers Rotary's goal of building a culture of peace throughout the world.

At the start of the year, I asked our incoming Presidents to consider installing a **Peace Pole** in their local community. We now have Peace Poles clustered around the district – in Lismore, Southport, Hope Island, Ballina, Kingscliff, Goondiwindi and Griffith University (Gold Coast) – that symbolise the global Rotary motto "May Peace Prevail on Earth". Thank you to everyone for taking positive action to foster peace in our communities. Let's keep this going.

This year we celebrated several clubs reaching significant milestones in their Rotary service:

25 years -Rotary Club of Mt Warning AM (Murwillumbah) – chartered 24 May 2000

**50 years -** Rotary Club of Nerang - chartered 2 June 1975

**80** years - Rotary Club of Currumbin-Coolangatta-Tweed - chartered 27 June 1945

These anniversaries represent far more than the passing of years. They stand as evidence of enduring fellowship, dedicated service, and meaningful contributions to both local communities and the wider world.

## The 2025 Council on Legislation

Every three years, representatives selected by their Rotary districts gather to debate and vote on proposals designed to adapt to changing times and move Rotary forward.

Clubs, districts, the RI Board, and the general council of RI in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI) may submit legislation and resolutions to the Council on Legislation (COL).

The 2025 COL met at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Chicago from 13th to 17th April 2025.

"This Council represents the heart of Rotary's democratic process and the best of our international spirit," said 2024-25 RI President Stephanie Urchick at the opening session. "The gathering is one of Rotary's most powerful expressions of multiculturalism. Here, voices from every corner of the globe come together — not to compete, but to collaborate."

Here are some of the decisions made this year:

- The annual dues paid by Rotarians to RI will increase by US\$3.50 in 2026-27 and by US\$3.75 in each of the following two years.
- A regular independent analysis of processes and cost structures in the administration of RI will be held.
- The number of members required to charter a new club was reduced from 20 to 15.
- Changing the names of the Presidents Elect Training Seminar (PETS) to Presidents Elect Learning Seminar (PELS) and District Training Seminar (DTA) to Club Leadership Learning Seminar (CLLS) were approved.
- Rotary club boards will now be required to present a mid-year financial report to their club members by January 31st. It was previously a deadline of December 31st.
- District conferences, which have been mandatory run by districts each year are now optional.
- It was agreed that the Board could test new governance models in districts beyond the pilots currently underway in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI) and in Australia and New Zealand.

## Regionalisation Pilot

District 9640 continued its involvement in the Zone 8 Regionalisation Pilot, an ambitious initiative to explore how Rotary can thrive with modern, flexible governance. This included the introduction of Rotary Community Groups (RCGs) within the District and Rotary Community Leaders (RCLs) replacing the old Assistant Governor model.

The Pilot provided an opportunity to reimagine how Rotary could grow and thrive, but it also introduced ambiguity and change that required flexibility and patience. From the outset, District 9640 was encouraged to respect the integrity of the Regionalisation Pilot by allowing the Regional Council to manage the implementation independently. This approach ensured that the outcomes could be assessed fairly, without unintended influence from Districts.

#### In practice, this meant:

- Membership initiatives and strategy were guided centrally, rather than through District-led planning.
- "Fit for Purpose" workshops were conducted with only a select number of clubs, to provide focused testing.
- A portion of our Rotary International–allocated allowances were redirected to support the pilot's implementation.
- Communication protocols were established with Community Group Leaders so that updates and feedback could be shared regularly.

This deliberate restraint allowed the pilot to test its systems and frameworks in a way that preserved objectivity. While it sometimes limited the role our District could play directly, it reinforced our commitment to contributing constructively to the broader goals of the trial.

To remain strong, Rotary in our part of the world needs to explore ways of consolidating resources, growing membership, and finding new efficiencies. The Regionalisation Pilot is an opportunity to show that our clubs and Districts can adapt and collaborate in ways that strengthen our independence and influence within Rotary International.

Standing still is not an option. If we embrace change with open minds and work together, the opportunity is there to strengthen our clubs, attract new members, and ensure a vibrant future for Rotary in our region.

## **Reflection and Thanks**

I am filled with gratitude for our clubs, leaders, and every Rotary and Rotaract member who made 2024–2025 a year of connection and purpose. The Magic of Rotary is found in laughter, teamwork, and compassion that turn ideas into impact.

Circling back to my very first DG communication, I asked the question what is **the Magic of Rotary**? It starts with you, our communities, the impact of what we do (our projects) and importantly the power of collaboration and partnerships. It is what we do that makes a difference every day everywhere. Even small actions or a smile can make a difference. The magic is within each one of us.

Serving as District Governor has been the greatest honour — witnessing the resilience and creativity of District 9640. Together, we've shown that Rotary remains a force for good. Keep creating irresistible club experiences and spreading the magic of Rotary.

Thank you from Gareth and I for all your support this past year. We look forward to continuing to support you in the years ahead.
