This cause-based Club is committed to rescuing, caring for and releasing re-habilitated wildlife back into a safe environment. This Club has been in the planning for several months with AG David Kenny and PDG Andy starting with nothing else but a concept to identify a future major population hot spot and then fit a cause that would connect with the community. This will be the 4th new Rotary Club formed in our Zone this Rotary year and is the 2nd formed in our District this year. AG David Kenny has been instrumental with the formation of both clubs. Well done and congratulations to AG David and PDG Andy.



As we move towards the end of this Rotary year I would like to thank and acknowledge all the Clubs that have finished the year with positive membership growth and as a result, our District should complete the year in the positive. The star performers are Ballina-on-Richmond with +14, Beaudesert with +9 and Gold Coast with +7 net growth. Well done.
