Sometimes we need a comment or a thought-provoking story to have us think about our own lives and that just by being provided the opportunity to be born in Australia we have all been presented a standard of living and opportunities that many in the world dream of.

It is true that times are tough for many of us in OECD countries with such things as the increased price of groceries, fuel and mortgages but let's just consider what it may be like for 800 million people in the world who live on less than \$US1.90 a day. One in nine people in the world do not have enough food to eat with 70% of the world's poorest people living in rural areas. Even more concerning is that 60% of the world's most disadvantaged and most hungry are women and girls (*rotary.org*).

It is interesting when Robyn and I travel around our District and speak to community members and different community groups the question is often asked 'How is Rotary different from Lions and other service organisations'?

While I sometimes add a few examples of how we are different, the common response I give is that we have our own charity, **The Rotary Foundation** that is like no other. I mention some of our achievements and the causes we commit to and support as Rotarians. The work we do with helping in Economic and Community Development is yet another success story of Rotary and our Foundation.

Rotary clubs and our Foundation support investments in people and communities toward alleviating poverty by creating measurable and enduring economic improvements in poor and underserved areas. Our Rotary Foundation spent \$9.2million to grow local economies and reduce poverty last year.

We concentrate our efforts in order to maximize our local and global impact. Our most successful and sustainable projects and activities tend to address these causes, and all humanitarian projects, scholars, and vocational training teams funded by The Rotary Foundation's global grants work toward specific goals in these areas of focus:

- Peacebuilding and conflict prevention: Rotary encourages conversations to foster understanding within and across cultures. We train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict and help refugees who have fled dangerous areas.
- Disease prevention and treatment: We educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases like polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. We improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in developing areas.

It is very pleasing to visit clubs that have not just embraced our District's 90-day plan but have exceeded all expectations. One example is our visit to Beaudesert club last week. Robyn and I were not just treated to a lovely home cooked meal prepared by Linda Jackson, but her husband, club President Mark had 4 new members that I had the pleasure of assisting to induct on the night.



At present our District is at +33 membership for this Rotary year. Many of our clubs have worked hard to attract the 72 new members to our clubs however; we have lost 39 members this Rotary year. Of concern are the 12 resignations from members of our clubs with less than 2 years membership. This is an internal matter for clubs to look at and perhaps a question to ponder is, *why*? Some feedback learned from member exit surveys demonstrates conflict and unrealistic expectations are sadly factors in members leaving our clubs.

We have now entered the 2nd 90-day cycle of this Rotary year. While as a group we remain committed to working towards a +1 net membership growth for your clubs, let's all make a concerted effort to retain our current members. I encourage club members and presidents of clubs to seek support from your AG and/or our District Mediation/Conflict Management Chair Bruce Kuhn if you have internal challenges within. Our Leadership team is here for you and our job is to support you. Further, both Robyn and I are always available to provide support to our clubs and members.

Let's also set our Foundation goal ready for November which is Foundation month.

We have 2 really good activities planned for our End Polio campaign this month. We have the 'Polio Tram and Train Ride' on the Gold Coast happening on Saturday 21st October and for the Rotary Clubs around Tweed & Murwillumbah, we have the 'Polio Walk or Bike Ride' on the new Rail Trail happening on Sunday the 22nd of October.

Our District Rotary 'Say NO to Domestic and Family Violence' campaign is moving forward at speed. Last week I had confirmation from QLD Police that the Domestic and Family Violence Command will support Rotary clubs throughout QLD with



our activities and campaigns. Clubs that would like a copy of the supporting letter can contact me or your AG and we will forward it to you. We now have clubs planning campaigns in Grafton, Ballina, Byron Bay, Gold Coast, Coomera Valley, Beaudesert & Scenic Rim and Fassifern Valley, with more to come. Many clubs are joining together to maximise their impact. Please let us know what your club is planning as soon as possible as many Rotarians have expressed an interest in attending activities in addition to their own.



Our Youth programs are up and running with plenty happening. This week we had our first YEP short-term outbound student Georgia Watts return from Brazil together with her exchange partner Dani Araujo. Dani will now spend 3 months being hosted by the Rotary Club of Goondiwindi. This Sunday we have another 2 short term exchange students leave for Argentina, with our 12 long term exchange students leaving for their overseas destinations in January.



While on the subject of youth related programs I am pleased to share with you that Stanthorpe Rotary Club has just sponsored a community based Interact club with the Northern Gold Coast Rotaract club close to sponsoring a community based Interact club in Coomera Valley. Recently the Borderline awards night was held at the Jimboomba Hall to recognise Rotary clubs in our District supporting youth programs in Mental Health. Disadvantaged children in Sierra Leone are being assisted by a Library and Literacy project begun and managed by Rotary Club of Alstonville member Sarah King. Originally from Sierra Leone, Sarah, a librarian with a passion for providing education opportunities where they are not currently available, has set up an organisation named Sierra Learners. The website <u>sierralearnerssl.com</u> has the amazing story and photos.

Two containers of books and other resources have been shipped to Freetown, Sierra Leone with the assistance of Alstonville Rotary. One container has been converted to a library. Alstonville High School and Alstonville Public School have now provided Sierra Learners with a 40-foot container which is being filled with books, school uniforms and computers. With assistance of Alstonville Rotary this will be shipped to Sierra Leone and also converted into a library.
