September is Basic Education and Literacy month

We are Rotarians, we are change makers. We can be, and many times are, the voice for those in our towns and around the world that do not have one.



Rotarians around the world are committed to supporting both Rotary's key areas of focus and the goals of the United Nations. The United Nations Goal No.4 is to ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all. Literacy is at the heart of basic education. If you are unable to read, how can you learn other forms of basic education like science, history and economics?

It is true that education is for many, the way out of poverty. The Rotary Foundation has as one of its 7 areas of focus, Basic Education and Literacy. Did you know that 776 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate? That's 17% of the world's population. (My Rotary Service in Action)

Globally, Rotary and Rotaract clubs are engaged in a wide range of impactful projects that help students thrive around the world. They range from teacher training, development of educational resource materials and working with and

volunteering in local schools. One of RI President Gordon's areas of focus is to empower Women and Girls. What better way to empower Women and Girls than to help them read and write? This helps prepare them to be able to contribute financially to their family income, and empowers them to be leaders in their families and communities.

Nelson Mandela said "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."



At a local club level, I can share with you a project the club I am a member of is working on with St Gertrude Primary School in Uganda. While many children in Uganda attend Primary School, the opportunity for them to go on and attend secondary school can be both unaffordable and very competitive. Students from low social-economic backgrounds are likely to face constant disruption to their schooling as they cannot afford to pay their tuition in full. This increases their chances of failure in their final year of primary school.

This can and does have dire consequences for these children who are left behind for a life of poverty, crime and limited employment opportunities. The Rotary Club of Ballina-on-Richmond along with our local Interact Club combined to introduce and fund a pilot Primary School Scholarship program for 7 students in Year 6 who were not able to pay for their tuition and were also falling behind in their grades.



It is truly amazing how a small amount of funds can impact and change lives in developing countries. This Scholarship project provided \$150 for each student to complete Year 6 with the outcome being that each of the students were able to pay for their schooling and improve their grades enabling them to continue onto secondary education. There is much we can do to encourage equity in Education. Many of our clubs in District 9640 collect books for distribution to schools overseas through RARE and in doing so, are actively supporting our Rotary Foundation's focus on basic education & literacy. Further, we have many Rotarians who volunteer at local schools in various reading programs including <u>Story Dogs</u>. This program has amazing outcomes especially for students with learning difficulties.

We have some important events coming up in the following months. The Polio Train Ride is happening on Saturday 21st of October. As in past years, we will encourage our members to ride the Gold Coast Rail and the G Link Tram.

We will be departing Pacific Fair G Link at 10.04am and returning to Pacific Fair (Broadbeach South) where we can meet up for a drink and lunch afterwards.

For those who will travel on the Gold Coast Rail, we propose leaving Helensvale at 11.07am and returning to Helensvale around 11.54am. There will be more specific information go out in next month's Newsletter.

A big congratulations to the 20 clubs that received **Rotary Citations** in recognition for setting their club goals for the past year and achieving them. For some, setting club goals may seem challenging and/or may be seen as setting yourself up to fail. This is certainly not the case as a goal is something to strive towards and helps you plan and strategize on how, as a combined group, your club can achieve the set goal. If you do not quite get there that is OK because at least you have tried and learnt some lessons along the way. It is no coincidence that all types of organisations, companies and sporting teams are successful because they continually challenge themselves to be better. This can be your club.



A big shout out to our 54 clubs that have set their goals on My Rotary and the 18 clubs in our District that have already achieved their 90-day plan with their membership goal of +1. The star performer is the Rotary Club of Gold Coast with +7 membership growth so far this year. Well done President Barry Lane and Membership Chair Glenn Wran for your leadership and enthusiasm.

We have had a couple of clubs register their interest in the Hope Springs initiative. Please don't leave it to the last minute to be part of this very positive opportunity. Clubs are encouraged to plan for their 'call to action' during the International 16 days of Activism against gender-based violence from 25.11.23 – 10.12.23. PDG Andy Rajapakse is organising an event on the Gold Coast for Saturday **25**th of November with other events planned for Ballina and Murwillumbah. We need a call to action from our clubs on the Granite Belt, the Clarence River, Northern Rivers and the QLD/NSW border.

The National Day of Action for all Rotary clubs in Australia is Friday the 1st of December. We

encourage our clubs to activate some activity be it a walk, vigil, bike ride, static display or breakfast/morning tea/lunch/dinner. Order your shirts now. Your Assistant Governor is your link to plan a cluster-based activity.

Last week Robyn and I had the opportunity to meet with Federal Politicians at Parliament House in Canberra to discuss the Rotary led Zone 8 campaign against Domestic and Family Violence. I am pleased to share with you that we have Tri-partisan support for our project and that thanks to Angie Bell Federal Member for Moncrieff and Shadow Minister for Early Childhood Education and Youth and at the invitation of Justine Elliot Federal Member for Richmond and Assistant Minister of Social Services and for the Prevention of Family Violence, we will launch this campaign at Parliament House in Canberra during the sitting weeks of October or November.



This is the opportunity for your club to connect with your community and for your members to take action on one of the most challenging social issues facing our society. This call to action will give your club relevance and an identity. Be the voice for change. Speak out, break the silence, end the violence. Together, we can help promote peace and create hope in the world.

But wait there is more. We are having a **Membership Seminar in Boonah on Saturday 14th October**. District Membership Chair Rowan Johnstone, District 9620 IPDG Tim Keeler and I, are organising the event. This is a seminar about connecting with community, making membership memorable, attracting members and most importantly, retaining members. Save the date.
