District Governor's Personal Project 2022-23

Angel Flight is an organisation that provides a massive free social service to the people of the bush. Yet – as far as I'm aware of – no modern Banjo Paterson has written a poem about this wonderful organisation. Dozens of pilots donate their time AND their planes to fly non-urgent medical missions from outback places to either a regional airport or – more often – directly to the location of the hospital. Most of the time, these flights are of several hours' duration, both ways. The flights do not carry medical staff, so they don't engage in medical emergencies as does the Flying Doctor Service.





Here are a couple of examples: A woman requiring regular dialysis. A child requiring regular chemotherapy, or follow-up treatment after a serious accident. By road and/or train, the trip could take 8 hours each way, and outback roads are not exactly as smooth as the M1!

Angel Flight often also takes carers with the patient on the same flight. This is, of course, of huge importance, particularly for children.

During her year, she will focus on four presidential


initiatives that Imagine Rotary:

This means that through the generosity od **Rob Brown OAM** (picture left) and **Don Rabinowe** of the Rotary Club of Hope Island, Mt Warning AM's nominated charity of **Tweed Palliative Support** received a **total of \$34,750**, made up of their fundraising of \$ 17,375 from the Trivia Night, doubled up by Rob and Don's contribution.

Hope Island's charities of **The Rotary Foundation**, **Zephyr Education** and **Australian Rotary Health** received \$5,442 in addition to the \$5,442 raised at Hope Island's Boat Show. Thank you Rob and Don for initiating the competition and for

PDG Graham Jones: Malaria Vaccine Project tops \$1,500,000

Steered by its hard-working multi-club committee, MVP is registered with Rotary Australia Benevolent Society (RABS) and is sponsored by Rotary Against Malaria (RAM). It has now raised nearly \$1.5 million to bring PlasProtecT®to the cusp of clinical trials in an endemic country. These funds have come from Rotary districts and clubs all over Australia and overseas, friends of Rotary, foundations, private donors and **Zarraffas Coffee**. The Rotary clubs of Hope Island (black-tie dinners and golf classics) and Surfers Paradise (race days) lead the way but Mermaid Beach Rotarian **Colin Welch** wins the most innovative prize for his epic kayak journey down the Murray River earlier this year. Our District has raised \$318,000 and was instrumental in MVP receiving a matching grant of \$500,000 from the Federal Government (Medical Research Future Fund) in 2019. THANK YOU to all the District

Governors and clubs for your incredible support.

At the 5th Anniversary, MVP launched **Challenge 22 to raise** \$300,000 this year to meet the shortfall in funding needed to complete the preliminary studies. So far we have raised \$150,000



and we are right on track to meet our target and to take PlasProtecT® one-step closer to saving the precious lives of the more than 600,000 children and pregnant mothers who die from malaria every year.

Lifeblood - We are calling it "Rotary United We Give"



The need for blood never stops. Did you know that **Australia needs 33,000 donations every single week.** For example, people having chemotherapy often require blood product transfusions weekly to second daily in order to maintain their life. At present 1 in 2 donations are being cancelled.

Every donation given by donors who identify themselves as District 9640 will count towards our group goal of 500 donations for 2022-2023, hopefully by December 31st 2022. There are now many donor centres and locations, please see the schedule below. As our drive commences, a link will be provided which will show how many donations Rotary District 9640 have given and how many lives you have saved.

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Capacity crowd at the District Changeover Luncheon

OK, I haven't been to all that many District Changeovers, but of those I went to, this would have been the most pleasant and relaxed one I had the pleasure of attending in my 30-odd years in Rotary. Three major reasons for my assessment:

Firstly, the Master of Ceremonies, PDG Harry Bolton from Tenterfield, in his customarily humorous way, kept the procedures trim, light-hearted rather than evangelical, and on time.

Secondly <u>and</u> thirdly, (now Past) District Governor Jeff Egan and incoming District Governor Karen Thomas refreshingly refrained from bringing up old hoary chestnuts, reminiscing about distant times well over 100 years ago.

For those of you who are time-constrained: Jeff channelled Charles Dickens with the opening line of 'Tale of Two Cities': "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times." As to the latter, he of course referred to the horrendous floods that occurred, predominantly in the Lismore and Tweed regions. As to the former: in-person club visits. Of particular significance was the visit to Currumbin-Coolangatta-Tweed at the top of Bay Street, under a marquee straddling the NSW-QLD border. "That showed that we could be innovative and resilient" Jeff said.

The major items in-between main course and dessert were the presentation of the District Awards. 14 in all were presented – see separate section on Page X in this newsletter.

Then came the solemn moment of the change of the Governor's collar, followed by the address by our new District Governor Karen Thomas:

"Have you been asked the question "What is Rotary? THIS is Rotary." Karen eloquently outlined both her background as a health professional for 40 years, and declared that Rotary's area of Focus of Disease Prevention and Treatment will be her major

focus. Foreshadowing her District Conference in March 2023, she emphasised that the endeavours of our clubs will be showcased there, in Yamba.

Just one example to show that it's not empty words: Karen has organised a collaboration with the Australian Red Cross for blood donations. The goal for 2022-23 is 500 donations, but the real aim is to achieve this by 30th December 2022.

One of Karen's major aims is to address the 70/30 Gender Inbalance. What an opportunity, having female heads of both Rotary International (Jennifer Jones) as well as of this District of the "fair" gender.

And the Governor's personal project Karen wants us to support: Angel Flight. This organisation flies non-emergency patients from remote regions to hospital and back again after treatment. The pilots are all commercially trained, flying their own planes free of charge. They just need to raise monies to pay for fuel. A truly wonderful charity.


Ian & Heather Yarker honoured with the Brian & Nancy Knowles Award


PDG Tony Heading caught up with them at a recent meeting of the e-Club of NextGen to present the trophy.

Rotary Refresher: 7 Areas of Focus



Rotary develops character and brings out the best of the human spirit. It teaches people ethics, humanity, cultural awareness, people skills and the desire and ability to serve. Rotary always benefits more than one person.

Rotary clubs serve communities around the world, each with unique concerns and needs. Rotarians have continually adapted and improved the way they respond to those needs, taking on a range of service projects. The most successful and sustainable Rotary service tends to fall within one of the seven Areas of Focus or causes as they are sometimes referred to.

Turning Dreams into Reality: Dementia Friendly Stanthorpe

Dementia is the second leading cause of death of Australians (the leading cause for women). At present an estimated 487,500 Australians are living with dementia and almost 1.6 million people are involved in the care of someone living with dementia. Approximately 70% of people with dementia live in the community.

The Rotary Club of Stanthorpe's "dream" is to make Stanthorpe a dementia-friendly community. A community that has a good understanding of the disease and its impact; a community that is safe and inclusive; a community that supports people living with dementia and their carers. It begins with a club member's attendance at a

Dementia Australia workshop following a parent's diagnosis of dementia. A club discussion lead to the club initiating the Dementia Friendly Stanthorpe project. An Alliance with representatives of community groups such as the local Men's Shed and the Churches of Christ Aged Care and individuals was formed. This group created a plan of action focussing on promoting awareness and providing support within the community.

To date, activities have focussed on providing awareness and have progressed slowly due to the occurrence of CoVid. Stanthorpe Rotary Club members are members of the Alliance and have been actively involved in the activities. These have included street BBQs, in collaboration with members of the local Men's Shed, where information is distributed to the public and Dementia Friends' presentations to community organisations such as Lions and Zonta. A Facebook page was also established to provide information to the public, people living with dementia and carers.

Whilst continuing awareness activities, the focus of the Dementia Friendly Stanthorpe group will move towards providing support for people living with dementia and their carers. The Rotary Club of Stanthorpe encourages other clubs in the District to take on the "dream" of making their community dementia-friendly.
