- The Annual Fund is the primary source of funds that support The Rotary Foundation's programs and areas of focus.
- Source of Grant funds to individual Clubs and Districts The

#### This Is How It Works

You or your club donates/contributes \$100

Trustees of The Rotary Foundation invest it for 3 years – the interest is used to manage the day to day operation of the Foundation

After 3 years, 50% of the original donation is moved to the World Fund. The trustees determine its use i.e. Global Grants, Peace Centers, Polio Plus, Areas of Focus, Disaster Relief, etc.

After 3 years, the other 50% is made available to the District as **District Designated Funds (DDF)** managed by the District. • Half of the DDF may be used for District Grants... this is 25% of the original \$100 donation

The remainder of the DDF may be used to match club cash for Global Grants or it may be donated by the District to support Polio Plus or Peace Centers

## A Look at What Has Been Happening

#### The Rotary Foundation re Global Grants

The demand for global grants has dramatically exceeded the capacity of the World Fund

World Fund will continue to match **only** District Designated Fund (DDF) contributions at 100%

Effective July 1, 2020, the World Fund will not match cash from Clubs

- In 2013-14, when global grants were introduced, the Foundation awarded 868 global grants worth \$47.3 million.
   By 2018-19, the number of global grants awarded had risen to 1,403, worth \$86.6 million.
   While demand for our grants had shot up by 80%, corresponding Annual Fund contributions never kept pace, showing only a 7% increase during this same time period. Therein lies our fundamental problem.

Global grant submissions rose 33% as Rotarians moved against COVID-19



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# A Look at 2020-21

#### In District 7040


- The "hurry-up" in June created a DDF shortfall (DDF overdraft)
- an extra workload for that slowed final approval of some grants that allowed borrowing from 2020-21 DDF
- Bottom line, very little DDF for 2020-21 ......~\$20,000



# In District 7040 the Fallout is...... Currently we do not have sufficient DDF to apply for new Global Grants and are "begging" friends in other Districts for their help. International projects require at least \$15,000 DDF to qualify for the required World Fund match of \$15,000 With no DDF available, clubs wishing to undertake humanitarian projects must fund them solely with cash and without the support of the staff at The Rotary Foundation.







### What Do We Need to Consider?

- Clubs need to recognize and set goals in Rotary Club Central that are consistent with the 100 goal of The Rotary Foundation
- Rotarians can use Rotary Direct to accommodate constant recurring contributions to meet personal giving objectives
- Individuals and clubs that have not met during the Covid-19 shutdown consider contributing all or a portion of the money saved on meals
- Work to change the attitude that giving to The Foundation is solely for the purpose of acquiring Paul Harris recognition points
- Promote the benefits that giving to The Foundation Annual Fund can accomplish both at home and abroad
