ROTAPLAST _EGYPT Sohag June 27-July 12 2010 Project No 63/2009-10 Rotary Districts represented were D1560, D2050, D5000, D5120 and D9670 A STATE AND THE STATE AND THE

The team was made up of 32 volunteers 12 of whom were Rotarians. Team members were from Cuba, USA, The Philippines, The Netherlands, Saudi Arabia, The Czech Republic, Russia, Egypt, and Australia. The funding came from District 5120 and the Smile Train at a cost of approx US\$80,000.

The team met at Cairo airport and were transported by bus with police escort 10 hours south to Sohag on the Nile. The hospital was supposed to be new but it had only undergone extensive renovations which were far from complete, making it a construction site with lots of problems.

The days were very hot with temperatures always at 45-47C but our accommodation was at a 4 star hotel with air conditioning. We brought along all our surgical equipment and disposable supplies but faced many problems of power surges and water supply.

First day at the Pre-op Clinic we processed over 200 patients many not suitable for operation as they suffered from inoperable congenital deformities and chromosomal disorders which were a field day for our geneticists. Many patients were malnourished as this is Egypt's poorest area. Very disappointing for those who travelled a long way to see us. Through our interpreters we tried to explain the nature of their problems.

We did manage to operate on 102 patients repairing cleft lips and palates revising burn contractures and excising extra digits. This was also a teaching program for the medical students and doctors associated with Sohag Hospital. They were keen to learn and demonstrated a desire to gain as much experience as possible.

Our activities were controlled by the local police who insisted that we only move from hotel to hospital in their presence. We did attend a Rotary meeting where we were told that great improvements were about to happen in Sohag but they didn't mention what century!!!

It was a great experience demonstrating again that the Rotary family can come together in "Service Above Self" bringing smiles and changing faces by extending the hand of friendship in building communities and bridging continents.

I always feel very proud and special to be part of this Rotaplast Program which sends out 15 teams per year to third world countries under the banner of Rotary.

Recently Wendy Stein and Grace Hull worked on the above project and pro-

vided the Rural Health Centre with vaccine fridges for drugs and vaccines, Equipment, drugs and other essential supplies, implemented Rotary Malaria bed net programme at Centre and Villages, as well as dental programme.

The Global fund has provided 127,000 bed nets, which are not stored at Alotau, for distribution to Milne Bay Province. A team will in the coming months assist with this distribution. A container has been shipped from Australia to Alotau, with hospital beds and much needed equipment for the upgrade of the Health Centre.

Dear District Governor Don Stephens, Assistant Governors and Club Presidents District 9670,

I write to you as ShelterBox Representative for District 9670 to hopefully clear up any uncertainty with regards to the structure and setup of ShelterBox and your ongoing support of this global Rotary project.

As you have most probably seen from the recent correspondence and articles in Rotary Down Under, ShelterBox International and the Rotary Club of Endeavour Hills (which set up the Australian affiliation of ShelterBox) have parted company, with the Rotary Club of Endeavour Hills deciding to produce their own disaster aid under the name of Disaster Aid Australia. Disaster Aid Australia is <u>not</u> ShelterBox.

Shelter Box, with the continued support of the Past District Representatives has continued delivering aid to those in need whist at the same time establishing a new base in South Australia . Unfortunately some confusion has been caused by us having to use the name of "ShelterBox In Australia" to set up the new company and associated Trust Fund (as ShelterBox Australia was no longer available) but we do hold the intellectual rights of ShelterBox and will be fundraising under that name and all future correspondence and publicity will also be as ShelterBox Australia.

Under the Direction of Past RI Zone 8 Director John Lawrence and with the input of all Australian District Governors and the new board of ShelterBox Australia, ShelterBox Australia has been initiating a proposal of becoming a Multi District Project under the governance of Rotary as opposed to its previous format of an individual club project. It is also great news that ShelterBox Australia in rejoining the ShelterBox International family will again be working with ShelterBox affiliates and Rotarians in the UK, Canada, Denmark, Germany, France, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Switzerland, USA and also Sweden, Brazil, Indonesia and Portugal who are currently going through the process of setting up affiliate offices in their countries.

Through ShelterBox, this is truly Rotary International at work.

Each year every club in our District receives requests for donations. My role as ShelterBox Australia District Representative, together with Peter & Lorraine Croft of the Rotary Club of Dubbo Macquarie is to provide accurate information on what we believe is a truly remarkable Rotary project. Then it is up to each club to make the decision as to which projects they wish to support.

I thank you all for your past donations and look forward to your future support. Please contact us if you would like us as guest speakers to update your club on the work of ShelterBox.

With this truly remarkable product, our highly trained response teams, prepositioned stock throughout the world and ten years of disaster relief experience as well as the joint support of the 14 above mentioned countries and your help as Rotarians, we will be there to assist those in need.
