Supporting Healthy Minds, Bodies and **Communities for 30 Years**

Mental illness can affect anyone at any age and is close to becoming an invisible epidemic, affecting one in five Australians every year. So fast is this problem growing that depression and anxiety are expected to become the world's leading cause of disability within the next eight years. This year, mental health was put back in the spotlight when the Federal Government invested \$2.2 billion over a five year period into mental health services, allowing the 1500 people on average turned away from psychiatric units and emergency rooms each day another possible avenue of treatment.

The success of these services is heavily reliant on the research funded through donations to organisations such as Australian Rotary Health who allow mental health professionals to stay informed of the most recent research findings in areas of mental health. Australian Rotary Health is Australia's largest nongovernment funding body for mental illness research. Thanks to the generous support of Rotarians Australia wide over the past 30 years, Australian Rotary Health has raised over \$26 million in donations that have facilitated better



those who are least able to assist themselves. In the past year alone, researchers funded by Australian Rotary Health have unearthed links between symptoms of depression and anxiety and dietary habits, as well as discovered depression to be a long term side effect of other illnesses such as cancer. By continuing to fund research that uncovers possible causes of mental illness, Australian Rotary Health brings the possibility of prevention all the more closer.

New Generations

This year, Rotary International has endorsed New Generations as the Fifth Avenue of Service to join International, Community, Vocational and Club. The Five Avenues of Rotary Service provide the focus by which Rotarians make their unique contribution to World understanding, goodwill and peace both locally and globally.

District Governor Janette has asked me to chair this new District committee, a role I am pleased to accept.

The formalisation of New Generations as the fifth avenue of service will not necessarily mean the establishment of new Rotary programs. It will bring together under a more logical management model many wonderful programs which have served young people over many years.

Working with young people can be challenging and needs to be well planned and structured. It is however very rewarding and satisfying. Programs need to be relevant and flexible enough to adjust to the rapidly changing environmental and societal challenges which confront young people.

Child Protection, the ability to ensure the well being of every young person involved in a Rotary program is a prime concern. A well planned, nationally endorsed youth protection policy has been part of our Youth Exchange program for many years. This same policy needs to be extended and made a mandatory, formal component of all of our District Youth Programs. I ask that each District Chair responsible for a Youth program ensure that this be the first aspect of planning for the year's activities. I suggest that the model established by Youth Exchange be the starting point and District Child Protection Officer Chair, Birgit Smith and District Legal Officer, Scott Lewis be consulted for assistance.

Each year all our district training programs contain a session related to child protection. This year, clubs were advised that all Rotarians, partners, family members and volunteers coming into contact with young people should sign the club register confirming they had no record of an offence against children. There is no need for that declaration to be renewed each year. The formalisation of New Generations will make no difference to the operation of the well run and excellent programs our district has conducted over many years. It will simply bring them under the one umbrella. I see my role as advisory and one of support. The various District chairs will still plan, conduct and evaluate the program.

Our District conducts most, if not all of the programs of Rotary International and some that are unique to Australia and our District. Over the coming months, I will list and provide a brief description of our District programs.

One exciting aspect of my new role has been the opportunity to discuss potentially new programs with District Rotarians. Assistant Governor Geoff Smith last year conducted a Rotary Youth in Agriculture program (seed and grain) at Narromine. Geoff modelled this on the very successful RYAG (Cattle Husbandry) program conducted now for 6 years by the Rotary Club of Wellington. Geoff, following a trip to Northern NSW, has plans to develop another program called RYCOTT. This will be based on the cotton industry which has become a major agricultural industry in the Western part of our district. I am aware also that the Rotary Club of Nelson Bay has RYAG (Marine) included in its vision planning for near future implementation.

It is clear that we have Rotarians in our District keen to expand the already established youth programs. Just six years ago, our District ran the first Try-a-Trade program. This has now become well established. *Cont...*

Several Clubs conduct driver training programs and RELAYID (Rotary Educational Leadership Award for Youth with Intellectual Disabilities) is a program which began in D9670. I see a very important part of my role as offering advice and support to Rotarians and Clubs interested in and exploring the possibility of establishing new programs for our New Generation. I will be providing information about these programs over the next few months in the pages of this newsletter.





Firstly my congratulations to all Presidents, Rotary Foundation Directors and Rotarians for the good work of the 2010-11 Rotary year. Final figures are not to hand at the time of writing but all indications are last year will be the most successful for the District in raising funds for the Rotary Foundation. We all take pride in the good work that is carried out in the name of Rotarians, funded by the Rotary Foundation, work carried overseas or even in our local communities. The Rotary Foundation assisted three local communities in each of the past two years through the District Simplified Grant program.

Current Club Presidents and Rotary Foundation Directors, we all take pride in the work that has been carried out, but we are all judged for the work we do in the present. RI President Kalyan Banerjee has selected two areas of focus to be achieved by clubs for him to give a Presidential Citation to successful Clubs in 2011-12. In this he stresses the importance of both membership and support to The Rotary Foundation (TRF). I am sure the District Membership Committee will be in touch concerning the Membership criteria, the criterion for the Rotary Foundation is as follows:

First;

100% Annual Programs Fund (APF) participation (every active member personally contributes some amount between 1 July 2011 and 31 March 2012); and

Second;

US\$100 minimum per capita in club contributions to Annual Program Fund.

The first criterion is easily achieved in several ways;

- Making a donation on the RI WEB site through member access (tax deducibility not available by this method).
- Sending a donation to The Australian Rotary Foundation Trust, PO Box 1415 Parramatta NSW 2124. (This is tax deductible.)
- Making a periodic deduction to the Australian Rotary Foundation Trust from your bank account or credit card (tax deducible, forms are available from the undersigned and soon should be available on the District WEB site).
- Using the TRF Money Boxes and having the Club Treasurer report the amount in your name to the TRF office in Parramatta to gain your tax deductible receipt.

The second criterion is gained by the Club raising sufficient funds for The Rotary Foundation.

The next meeting of the District Rotary Foundation Committee is on Sunday 7 August 2011, 10:30am at Singleton Diggers, Alroy Complex, Dorsman Drive Singleton Heights and all are welcome to come and find out how they can meet the criteria above.



Membership Focus: Addressing Attendance Requirements

At the recent membership seminar there was some robust discussion around the issue of attendance requirements. Most clubs are challenged by the tension between the need to demonstrate the flexibility that may be required to attract new members and retain existing members and a commitment to elements of Rotary's core, such as attendance at weekly meetings. Perhaps it is time to revisit this issue and ensure that all members are aware of ways to maximise their attendance.

The 2010 Manual of Procedure states the following under Attendance:

Attendance requirements are set forth in the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. (SRCC 9; SRCC 12, 4) Club leaders are encouraged to emphasize to club members and prospective members the value and significance of regular attendance. (RCP 7.060.) Cont...

Methods in which absences at a regular club meeting may be made up can be found in the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. (SRCC 9)

The Standard Rotary Club Constitution addresses the following

- attendance requirements
- unexpected absences
- extended absence on outposted assignment
- excused absences

make-ups attendance at other clubs

attendance at Rotaract, Interact, Fellowship, etc, meetings attendance at a Rotary International Convention or meeting attendance at a district conference, assembly or meeting participation in a club service project or club-sponsored event attendance at a board meeting or service committee meeting participation in an interactive activity

attendance at meetings overseas travelling on Rotary business

For some Rotarians, attendance may be easier via a transfer to a club that meets at a different time. For others who are shift workers or are on-call membership of an e-club may be convenient. Let's ensure that we are all aware of options that enhance membership and participation in Rotary activities.
