Since 2002, motorcycle adventurers have taken on the challenge of riding a small capacity motorcycle vast distances across the Australian landscape and all for a good cause.

World heritage rainforests, deserts, open plains, snowy mountains, river crossing, bitumen roads, dirt roads, corrugations and bulldust provides the backdrop to the Postie Bike Challenge event.

We have had riders from Australia, New Zealand, United Kingdom, Singapore and the United States. The one thing they all have in common is a great sense of adventure.

#### What are the Postie Bikes?

The Honda CT110 motorcycle is a light-weight 110cc machine designed for commercial and agricultural use. The "X" model as used by Australia Post is the result of years of continuous development and millions of hours of operation. The 4-stroke engine is extremely reliable, very low maintenance and simple to service. It uses unleaded petrol.

#### **Fundraising**

There is a special feeling of generosity and community support associated with the Postie Bike Challenge. Your entry fees are injected directly into local community groups along the route and through the donation of the motorcycles for auction and fundraising purposes.

#### **Local Community Groups**

Where possible, we source local community groups at each of our overnight stops to provide our catering. Over the years these groups have included, Lions Club, Rotary, school parents and citizens groups, local sporting clubs, Country Women's Association, Cancer council, Aboriginal community groups, and showground society groups. The Postie Bike Challenge provides one of the most significant fundraising opportunities for these community groups in return for their provision of dinner, breakfast, drinks and packed lunches.

#### **Donation**

The Postie Bike Challenge has selected Rotary as a benefactor for the donation of bikes at the end of the event. Rotary was selected because of our established high profile community programs and ability to process the bikes and forward either funds made from the bikes or the bikes themselves to where they will do the most good. ALL RIDER MOTORCYCLES WILL BE DONATED to the chosen benefactor on completion of the event. THIS DONATION WILL BE DONE IN YOUR OWN NAME and we will facilitate a formal certificate of thanks to verify the donation. The spirit of the event calls for support for those less well off than us.

#### **Event Outcome**

Further funds have been raised from the sale of the motorcycles and are currently being distributed to worthy groups. These details will be updated as soon as they become available. To date there have been some early donations as per the email from Rotary which follows:

So far we have earmarked the following organisations/causes/purposes as recipients of proceeds from the bike sales, but no funds have been distributed as yet. We have achieved a very broad spread across the community.

Total Recreation NT - Sport and recreation activities for 9-16 year olds with a disability Rotary Club of Dili – small projects in East Timor

- Rangi and his mum Robyn (Rangi is a 15 year-old student undergoing brain tumour treatment)
- East Timor Rotary Youth Exchange Program Sponsorship program to assist ET Youth
- Rotary Club of Katherine (sale of Bernie's bike 14) equipment for Katherine Emergency Services
- The Wishlist Foundation start-up assistance for a social enterprise linking needs and benefactors
- Arthritis and Osteoporosis NT Additional office equipment to support access to AONT musculoskeletal health services
- Adults Surviving Child Abuse (ASCA) workshop in Darwin for adults surviving child abuse
- Down Syndrome Association Computer Aided Learning program for kids with Down Syndrome
- Rotary Polio Plus Program Vaccine to immunise 1200 children against Polio
- The Essington School Darwin instruments for music program

We are also providing the Rotary Club of Dili in East Timor with some funds to assist with some small projects in East Timor, plus the contingent of 2006 Postie Bikes that we are currently making arrangements with Conoco Phillips to ship to ET. The RC of Dili is concurrently liaising with Health Alliance International and other health organisations in ET for the transfer of the bikes to then be used by midwives and other medical staff employed by those organisations.

We linked our sale prices to a bit below the Red Book trade-in prices.

We sold the 2004 bikes for \$750.

We sold the 2005 bikes for \$800.

The 2006 (we sold 2, with the funds to go to RC of Dili) and 2007 bikes were \$1000.

We are very proud and privileged to have been given this opportunity to participate in helping share the generosity of the 2010 Postie Bike Challenge, so a huge thanks to you both and the rest of your team."

# Note from the Communications Officer

# Would you know what to do in a mental health crisis?

In 2008, 2,191 Australians committed suicide. Over three-quarters of them were male. 103 were Indigenous Australians.

While suicide accounts for only a relatively small proportion – around 1.5% - of all deaths in Australia, its impact on specific age groups is great. According to ABS statistics, in 2008 24% of all male deaths aged 15-24 were due to suicide and more men aged over 85 years die as a result of suicide than any other age group.

Females did not fare much better, with the median age at death for females who died from suicide just 43.5 years and suicide rates for women aged over 60 remaining consistently high.

Betty Kitchener and Professor Tony Jorm began running Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) courses as a community service activity. MHFA acts as the first line of intervention in much the same way as medical first aid, teaching participants ways of assisting someone in a mental health related crisis before professional assistance becomes available.

Now, Australian Rotary Health, in conjunction with Rotary Clubs around Australia, are running their own preventative mental health first aid workshops that aim to assist in providing support to community members who are at risk of or who are experiencing a mental health crisis.

## "The Winds of Change"

Stuart Heal at District 9710 Conference From D9710 "The District Chronicle", editor AG Rowley Tompsett, District 9710 PR Committee 2011–12

What a breath of fresh air was the RI President's Personal Representative, RI Director Stuart Heal from RC Cromwell in the Shaky Isles. Stuart is a straight shooter who says what he means and means what he says. He left us in no doubt that for Rotary to survive we must consider change as an integral part of our future development. No longer can we sit back in our comfortable cocoon, satisfied that we are doing good deeds.



Speaking on the subject of *The Winds of Change*, Stuart suggested before we talk change we must recognise 'one size will not fit all'. Clubs and Rotarians must be able to make changes applicable to them and their environment.

Nonetheless, we need to review our 'traditions' and, where necessary, start new ones.

Stuart continued "We must move from a culture of attendance to one of engagement. We are service clubs not attendance clubs. I believe it is time for clubs to manage their own attendance requirements to meet the needs of their members and communities."

He continued "We must use contemporary language. Why do we have a Rotary vocabulary different from our work and family lives? Rules are potentially strangling this organisation and are used to create problems instead of solving them by too many Rotarians. Further, I believe rigid structures stifle spirit and Rotary needs more spirit. The Board is reviewing a new 'core essence' statement following the review by North Western University. It says what and who we are really well: a worldwide network of inspired individuals who translate their passions into relevant social causes to change lives in communities.

The students also reported:

- we underestimate the mentoring and networking opportunities offered to new members
- they suggest we use the word integrity and not ethics

The big words for me were 'empowerment, revitalise, energise'. Rotary wants to empower you to be a better friend, better professional, better citizen to the world. We need to power up our clubs to ensure a sustainable revitalisation of our organisation. The time to empower, energise
