When you've collated your figures, I definitely expect you to pass them on to me so that we can have a chat and write about it, so that people know.





The Rotary Foundation's work in promoting world peace results in this program, which offers to the team an opportunity to experience another culture at first hand and for Clubs to learn about other parts of the world.

Our next exchange will be with District 1090, in England. The visiting team will arrive in our District in February, 2013, for approximately one month. We are planning for a team of four team members and one Rotarian team leader. The team members will be aged between 25 and 40 years of age. Our return visit will also take place in February, 2013. We are planning to send a team of five team members and one Rotarian team leader.

There are three ways in which you and your Club can be involved:

- 1. By hosting the visiting team;
- 2. By providing a nomination of a Rotarian as a team leader;
- 3. By providing the nomination of a young person as a team member.

Attached are some details about each of these aspects. As with all things, there are some fun aspects and some responsibilities, so please consider these as well!

Here are some very important dates;

Interviews and final selections will be conducted at Tocal College, which is between Maitland and Paterson. Times for interviews will be notified, but Clubs are urged to have a Rotarian accompany applicants for team membership, and thus travel time must be considered.

It is essential that all applicants are able to attend the final selection weekend should they be chosen to do so at the interview. There is a cost for each applicant at interview, the amount being \$75, which is paid by the sponsoring Club, prior to or on the day. An invoice will be issued and the District Treasurer will issue a receipt.

Airfares for the exchange are paid for by our Rotary Foundation, and additional travel may be undertaken by teammembers after the exchange, but at personal expense. Insurance for team members for the exchange and any additional travel for the team is provided under our District Insurance.

The team members are provided with some of the uniform as part of the sponsoring club's commitment but there is a cost to each member in supplementing the complete outfit.

Club Hosting for Visiting GSE Team.

Clubs should be able to provide accommodation and meals, travel and quite probably, some vocational visits. It is advisable for the club to have a 'person responsible' to arrange and manage all activates related to the hosting of the team.

In discussing hosting within your Club, please consider that some overseas people still smoke cigarettes, that some people are allergic to pets, and that there is always the possibility of food preferences/allergies.

It is usual for the team to be with a Club for several days, and thus there is time for some opportunities for outings and other functions, often including a Club meeting with a presentation from the visitors, with other surrounding Clubs being invited to meet with the visitors.

The possibilities for vocational visits must also be listed. However, it is impossible to include that in the planning at this stage. Information will be forwarded to nominated hosted Clubs as soon as it is known.

Should there be GSE related costs incurred to the Club, these are legitimately paid out of the community/charity/service account of the Club.

It is also possible for two neighbouring Clubs to propose a joint hosting arrangement.

The closing date for Hosting is September 30, 2012.

GSE Team Leader

The team leader is the contact/liaison person between the team and the hosting Clubs and District, so this is a pivotal and vital position to hold. The team is representing this District, so all the attributes of diplomacy and mother/father/ counsellor/ mediator are necessary qualities! It is a wonderfully rewarding position to hold, complete with responsibilities as well, but very worthwhile. There is no gender restriction for being a team leader.

All airfares are paid for by the Rotary Foundation and all tickets are arranged through that body. Accommodation, travel within District 1090, and meals are all the responsibility of the hosting District and Clubs. There is a mandatory cost of \$500-00 which is paid to the District for assistance in covering preparation costs. This is paid **only** if you are selected for the team.

The position of team leader is available to all experienced Rotarians, and especially those with an interest in international service, and the person should be well-informed about Rotary. The person selected must be prepared to pay some of the uniform costs, and all passport, entry visa, additional fees and taxes associated with the travel, as well as gifts and personal clothing. This may be between \$800-00 and \$1000-00.

The team leader will be expected to attend all pre-departure training, and be responsible for guiding the team in the preparation of presentations which will be made in District 1090, and for "welding" the team together. The time of the visit often includes the host District's Annual Conference, and hence attendance at that will be expected of the team. There is an expectation of a presentation by the visiting team at some time during the Conference.

Partners and other close family members may not accompany the team, but are welcome to join the team member on any tours which take place after the exchange program is completed. All such tours are at the expense of the individuals concerned, but travel insurance for the leader is covered through our District Insurance. Here are some very important dates for the Team Leader applications.

GSE Team Member

Membership of the team is open to a person in permanent employment or in a business as owner or partner, and in a recognised profession. A person who is a relative or partner of a Rotarian is most definitely not eligible, and there must be least a 3-year time lapse between a relative or partner having been a Rotarian and the departure of the team. There is no gender restriction for a team member.

There is an age-range into which prospective team members should fit -25 to 40 years. A person may not be already 40 years of age at the time of departure.

The committee will be looking for people who are interested in world understanding, who are out-going in nature and are willing to operate in a co-operative team environment. Some knowledge of Rotary will be useful, and a willingness to learn more will be essential.

Team members will be expected to participate in all training sessions after selection, and must bear some of the uniform costs and all passport, entry visa, additional fees and taxes associated with the travel, as well as gifts and personal clothing. This may be between \$800-00 and \$1000-00. They will also need to prepare a presentation which will be made on several occasions, including at the hosting District's Annual Conference if the exchange coincides with that event.

All airfares for the team are paid for by the Rotary Foundation, and all tickets are arranged through that body. There is a mandatory cost of \$500.00, which is paid to the District for assistance in covering preparation costs. This is paid **only** if you are selected for the team. Accommodation, travel within District 1090, and meals are all the responsibility of the hosting District and Clubs. Partners and other close family members may not accompany any team member, but are welcome to join the team member on any tours that take place after the exchange program is completed. All such tours are at the expense of the individuals concerned, but travel insurance for the team member is covered through our District Insurance.





Happy while helping

BRIAN Vidler, 79, is a retired engineer and company general manager who's been married to wife Faye for more than 57 years, and still manages the insurance needs of 50 Rotary clubs in his district.

He walked in to his regular Newcastle Enterprise Rotary club meeting last week and got the shock of his life when his family, friends and Rotarians from as far away as Dubbo sprang a surprise celebration to mark his 40 years in Rotary.

"I was quite taken aback actually. Quite overwhelmed," he said last week.

"I never looked for any plaudits."

Mr Vidler was presented with an inaugural exemplary service award from his district, and became the inaugural Fellow of his club.

We had a lovely chat about his outstanding history with Rotary, his life in Newcastle, and a general state of the nation tour which included our joint despair over the state of federal politics, a despair we agreed was shared with our fellow Australians.

I was under strict instructions not to write about Mr Vidler the individual, because that would embarrass him.

I said I wanted to write about his contribution to the community because he represents many people whose unpaid work is the glue – and pardon the slightly icky imagery – that keeps society going.

And research shows it's the volunteers of this world, and particularly volunteers past retirement age, who are the most contented people in our communities.

Mr Vidler was slightly embarrassed to admit it, but he joined Rotary reluctantly in June 1972 after he was given an invitation.



"I don't really recall why I was reluctant. It was probably because at the time I just saw it as another demand on a busy life," he said.

"I had my job, we had young children and elderly parents who were ailing, and joining Rotary was going to be just another demand on my time."

But the social contact, fund-raising and working to improve the community – whether at home or via Rotary projects around the globe – was almost immediately attractive, Mr Vidler said.

His club raises about \$100,000 per year which is returned to the community. Newcastle Enterprise has supported Kaleidoscope, the umbrella organisation that integrates public health services for children and young people, for a number of years.

Multiply that single Rotary club's contribution by 50, for the other clubs in the district, and then add the many other community groups and organisations across the Hunter region, and it's easy to see why we depend on volunteer groups, and volunteers, to keep society going.

There is plenty of research to support the

theory that working for others, rather than focusing exclusively on our own wants and needs, is good for our mental health.

In a 2008 paper titled The impact of volunteering on successful ageing, two American researchers explored the essential elements needed for contented and meaningful life after retirement.

Volunteering helped people increase their self-esteem and self-efficacy, but it also provided another vital element in a contented life – positive social interaction.

Brian Vidler's 40 years in Rotary has provided him with what researchers would call "social capital", and what he would call friends.

They're the people he's shared a laugh with at countless Rotary barbecues, trivia nights and golf days, or at meetings to organise youth exchanges between Australia and other countries, or while coordinating the insurance needs of his district's 50 clubs, a job he has held since 1989.

And they're the people who gave him a standing ovation when he turned up at his club meeting last week and found he was the guest of honour.

"I am a contented person, and my wife and I are contented people," he said.

"I think if you're doing things for others, and with others, you're able to think about things other than yourself, and you feel good about that."

And so that I don't embarrass him, I'll say that the description of Mr Vidler as "highly ethical and honest" and an "example for others to follow" on one of his awards last week is probably the description of many others like him in our community.

Earlier this week, Rotary lost one of its heroes in Bill Little – Eastern Region Volunteer Coordinator of RAWCS I am sure that you will join me in expressing great sorrow in Bill Little's passing, to his wife Irene. He will be sorely missed by his colleagues in the Eastern Region and all others who have come into contact with him. Bill was a stalwart of his District 9690 and will be remembered in particular by those whom he has supported and assisted in the Philippines Village Aid Program.
