- Completing a School Report: We need Rotarians to collect student feedback forms at the end of each workshop, collate them and return them to ROADwhyz.
- ROADwhyz / Rotary Young Driver Support Scholarship: Would your Rotary Club be interested in a scholarship program where young learner drivers, who cannot afford professional lessons, apply for financial support for 5 driving lesson? Learn more – contact me.
- Source Information on Requirements of embedding ROADwhyz into 120 hours licensing process: The aim of ROADwhyz is to get the program endorsed into the licensing process for new drivers. Be an advocate for road safety.

Committed to Rotary Grants

As part of the District Rotary Foundation Committees responsibilities under the new Rotary Grants (formally known as Future Vision) we are required to report on the District's activities utilising Rotary Foundation Funds.

At the recent Rotary Foundation Seminars the use made of Funds under the control of the District through the Share system and the District Designated Fund (DDF) included some of the following.

The total DDF available to the district from giving to the Annual Programs Fund over the past 5 years is US\$255,387.

Hit Polio For Six

An initiative of the District Polio Committee to capitalise the Gate's Foundation promise to match every dollar donated by Rotary with two dollars from the Gate's foundation.

The District Foundation committee will match every dollar donated by the District Clubs with a dollar from DDF, so every dollar given by the Clubs will result in six dollars going to fight Polio.

Grants Qualification

To date we have 94 Rotarians who completed the Grants training representing 33 Clubs, of which only 7 have signed the Club Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU). Of these 7, only 6 have the required number of qualified Rotarians to receive grants.

For a Club to receive a grant it must accept and sign the Club MOU and have three members attend a Grants Training workshop in the last three years, one of which must be for the current program year.

The next Grants Workshops will be held after the meeting of the TRF Board of Trustees in February in case they approve any changes in the current procedures.

One change they will be considering is allowing the training to be held in webinar format and not face to face as currently required.

District 9670 celebrated the Rotary Foundation over the month of November.

Giving back to the locals

By providing scholarships to further education, **Peter Clough President of the Rotary Club of Nelson Bay**, talks about recent scholarship recipients and how they will give back to their communities.

This Rotary Club of Nelson Bay Scholarship fund was established in 2005, in recognition of the 100th anniversary of Rotary International.

Following the award of a Scholarship in the inaugural year, the fund has been given the opportunity of developing to the stage where it is in a position to support ongoing Scholarships. This year, it was decided to recommence the awarding of Scholarships.

In fact, the Nelson Bay Club Scholarship Trustees have awarded two [2] scholarships this calendar year.

In March this year, the Club Scholarship Trustees awarded a Scholarship to Melissa Cox. This scholarship is to provide her with the opportunity of receiving accreditation to establish a business in Salamander Bay which supports families who have autistic children. The business has been an immediate success for Melissa and in fact, Melissa now employs staff in her new venture and at the same time addresses an unmet need in our community.

More recently the Nelson Bay Club Scholarship Trustees have provided a Scholarship to Chantelle Smith. This scholarship will allow Chantelle the opportunity to complete a Diploma in Life Coaching. When completed, this Diploma will allow her to establish a business in Life Coaching in her local Tomaree Peninsula community.

Whilst there is a range of criteria, the key eligibility for a Scholarship is the applicant being able to clearly demonstrate their ability to give back to the local community following completion of the course and/

or project.

We believe this is a very special Scholarship program providing the opportunity for local recipients to give back to our local community by using community-raised funds to further their education, particularly when in need.

The Scholarship fund is supported by local fund raising and benefactors.

Rotary Global Grants Scholar Annelise Bissett, fills us in on how she is settling into Oxford University and launching into her "green" studies

I have now been in Oxford for 5 weeks and spent the first two weeks settling into the town, and this week I will begin my third week of studies.

I live in a large house in the north of Oxford that is a five minute bike ride from my college and the School of Geography and the Environment. My college is called Green Templeton and has a very active extra-curricular calendar.

I currently row for the college advanced team and the college is also organising a conference on the theme of Human Welfare for May 2014, which all members of the college have an opportunity to contribute to the planning of.

On Saturday the 19th October, all new

members of the college took part in the Oxford University Matriculation ceremony, which is where students are formally admitted into the University.

I have been enjoying my classes immensely and the standard of teaching here is very high. All of my lecturers are world-leaders in their respective fields.

The course content is hugely varied, from science to micro-economics to anthropology and beyond. I am particularly enjoying my current elective, which focusses on developing encouraging environmental sustainability at the individual, household and small community level. This is particularly relevant to my career aspirations, as I am very interested in working on small-scale, grass-roots environmental solutions.

The course also deals with practical skills about working with people and communities, which is going to complement my science background really well.

The Rotary Scholars for District 1090 have already become a very active network over the past five weeks. We have attended a number of introductory events and some less formal introductory events organised by local clubs, as well as walking tours around Oxford and London.

Digging deep to help hospital

On a quest to raise \$100,000 for new accommodation units at the Dubbo Base Hospital, **Peter Gordon Hill President of the Rotary Club of Cobar**, fills us in on how the Rotary Club of Cobar are keenly supporting the Tour de OROC and seeking sponsorship along the way.

The Rotary Club of Cobar has strongly supported the Tour de OROC project initiated by Dubbo City Council Mayor Clr Mathew Dickerson.

This project was launched to raise funds to construct self contained accommodation units in the grounds of Dubbo Base Hospital for residents of the isolated communities west of Dubbo who need low cost accommodation while receiving treatment in Dubbo or for their family members supporting them.

President of the Rotary Club of Cobar, Gordon Hill said that "the lack of low cost accommodation in Dubbo close to the Hospital has been a ongoing issue for many years.

With many more Cobar Residents now needing to go to Dubbo for specialist medical treatment this need has become critical".

The Rotary Club of Cobar was keen to support this worthy project when it was announced by Clr Dickerson and was prepared to provide support for the Tour de OROC by immediately signing up for sponsorship of the bike tour worth \$1,000.

Gordon added that "the Rotary Club members felt that strongly about the need for this accommodation in Dubbo that they also decided to donate a further amount to the appeal when the Tour Bike riders ,including the Club Secretary Gary Woodman, reached Cobar last Thursday".

Gordon went on to say that "during the Fund raising and Auction evening held at the Copper City Motel on Thursday night he had handed over another cheque for \$4,000 to CIr Dickerson on behalf of Cobar Rotary bringing the Clubs total commitment to the project to \$5,000".

Gordon concluded by saying that "the Rotary Club of Cobar was pleased to be able to support this important project which will have long lasting benefits to the Cobar Community".
