Celebrating something District 9670 does well, **District Governor Brian Atkins** focuses his address this month on Youth in Rotary and their importance in our Rotarian community. ### The DG has been on the move!

This month I am focusing on **Youth in Rotary**, an avenue of service covered very fully and successfully by District 9670.

For those of you who know me well, you know that our youth programs are something I am very passionate about. The success with our **youth programs** comes from our strong leadership team at a District and Club level.

Our friends at Rotary Down Under produced a handy booklet titled "An Introduction to Programs of Rotarians 'Down Under". It's an overview of major programs available to Rotary Clubs in our Zone 8 Districts. I could mention our youth programs of Group Study Exchange, YEP, NZ short term exchange, MUNA, the Science and Engineering Program, NYSF, RYCOTT, RYCAGS, RYLA, RYPEN, RELAYID, Dream Cricket, Try-A-Trade, RYDA and Young Adults Vocational Exchange, but I would like to touch on our friends in Rotaract.

**Rotarians.** We have 4 Rotaract Clubs in our District, the Hunter Club who meets in Newcastle, Cessnock, Hunter Valley who meet in Singleton and Dubbo City. These young people need our support.

Madeleine and I have taken the time to visit the Rotaract Clubs in Dubbo, the Hunter and Cessnock as part of our official visits and will catch up with the Hunter Valley Club in Singleton over the coming months. We have learned that these young people are **committed to community service and learning more about Rotary**. They deserve our attention.

If you have a Rotaract Club in your area please **make yourself known to them** and offer your experience in 'Service Above Self'. Please involve them in your Club activities, but more importantly, **assist them** in growing their numbers by introducing them to the youth in your community.

Another very important issue has taken my time over the last few weeks. As Rotarians, we are asked to support our fellow men and women on an international, national and local level. We have a situation at present in District 9670 that is affecting our local communities with the **severe bush fires** we have experienced in the past few weeks.

I am now investigating the process to link our Rotary **District in to the Emergen**cy Services so that we have a plan in place to identify a need and offer the appropriate assistance in a crisis. I am seeking advice from our Rotarians relating to the establishment of a Rotary District Disaster Assistance Plan. The two stages of disasters include emergency and recovery. Following my discussions with Allison Rowlands, Director, Welfare Services from the Ministry of Police and Emergency Services, Rotary's best work can be established in the recovery stage.

Congratulations to all our Rotarians who work so hard in their communities as active members of the **Rural Fire Brigades** and associated support networks. This is "Service Above Self".

It is going to be a long hard

summer for many of our communities. Rotarians do amazing work around the world, and this summer I would like us to also focus on our own communities and **be prepared** with a plan of action.

# Keeping our kids safe...

Is your club involved in any programs that involve children?, **Trevor Lynch**, **Assistant Governor and District 9670 Child Protection Committee Chair**, gives us some sound advice on what to do when working with children.

Below are some important bits of information and some suggestions that you might like to consider if your club is involved in any programs that involve children.

#### Information:

Some clubs who are involved with YEP students are encouraging their members to register for the new Working With Children Check even though volunteers, organisations and clubs such as ours are not due to implement this new procedure until 2015. Some of these clubs are encouraging all their members to apply so that every member can legally work with that student under any circumstance.

The process to register and be checked is very simple. Those of us who have applied have received our clearance within a day or two of applying. To apply go to, complete and submit the online application form (it only takes a few minutes), you will receive an email reply giving you an application number. Take it and your licence to an RMS (was RTA) office to have your identity verified. If all is well you should receive an email containing a clearance letter and your "Working with Children" number. All clearances will have a five year currency.

There are three possible outcomes to an application for a check. They are:

- a bar against working with children; or
- $\Rightarrow$  still being investigated.

If you are involved in a Rotary program where you are working with children and decide to wait until 2015 you will still need to use the old process of getting those involved to sign a declaration and file in your club records.

Some Rotarians who work on programs for children will not need to apply for the new check as there are many exemptions. Clearly the level of risk to the children involved determines whether a check is needed or not.

When this system becomes fully operational after 2015 clubs may be subjected to an audit so it will continue to be important for club Boards to ensure that members who are working with children have the necessary clearance to do so.

#### Suggestions:

Check out the website www.kids.nsw.gov.au

Determine if you are going to implement this new process now or wait until the phase in year of 2015.

If you are running a child related program, you should add a section to the Risk Assessment you need to complete for that program to satisfy the requirements to be covered by Rotary Insurance. This section should consider the risk to the child participants for each task the club's members have taken on. For example a child being hosted overnight by a member is at far greater risk than one who is being served a meal by a volunteer.

If your club decides to require members involved to register for a check then your club should be registered as an 'Employer". This can be done online. Once registered your club will be able to go online and check the "Working with Children" status of members who are involved with your club's youth programs. They will have a record of who you have checked and will notify you of any status change. NB: Read "Rotary Club" for "Employer".

It might also be advisable for club secretaries (or youth directors) to ask members who have been checked and have received email notification to send the result on so that they can keep an electronic file for the status of checked members.

Further it may also be worthwhile keeping a log of members who are deemed to be exempt when preparing the risk assessment for your child related project. This might well be expected by the Rotary Insurance people.

#### Some Suggestions about Child Protection and Rotary Insurance:

I would recommend that all clubs require their members to register NOW. The process is so simple I see no reason to delay until 2015.

Where students are hosted in private homes - even if only overnight - all adult persons in that household should have completed the check.

Any Rotarian who refuses to register should not be allowed to have one-to-one contact with YEP or any other students unless under supervision.

The recommendation to complete the check applies to car transport of students where the only other person in the vehicle is the Rotarian driver.

Finally, every Rotarian should remember that our liability insurance policy DOES NOT provide any benefits for a perpetrator or alleged perpetrator of a molestation offence, and further for those Rotarians, Committees or Boards that are covered by the policy, there is an excess of \$25,000 for each and every claim. All of which means that we need to get this risk assessment and child protection matter right.





# **CHARLEY'S ANGELS**

I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank each and everyone for the great humanitarian support with the medical and surgical treatment for Nurak Charley's correction of his club feet.

Without the dedication, expertise and professional care given by the medical staff of the John Hunter Children's Hospital this little boy from Tanna Island, Vanuatu would still be living a secluded life with his grandma, out of sight, in a small hut.

Brian Coffey, President of the Rotary Club of East Maitland and I have no words to express our gratitude for the involvement of all Rotarians in making this ROMAC project a great success and the dreams of Charlie's mother, Veronic, a reality.

Charlie arrived here on the 15th April 2013, a boy with limited mobility, social and hygiene awareness. There were concerns for his mental comprehension, but he quickly responded to all assistance and developed into a cheeky, toilet-trained, TV-addict, IPod-devotee and a very happy outgoing child. Charley was loved by all who got to know him. He managed to increase a quarter of his body weight with a dislike for anything sweet or cold....except "Chuppas" which we used for rewards.

I believe that upon returning home, Charley ran across the tarmac into his fathers arms—who with all the family are still in disbelief of the miracle that was performed at the John Hunter Children's hospital.

My greatest moment was when the plaster cast were removed for the last time. The look on Veronic's face was priceless and her smile never left her face when she realised that Charlie's feet were now NORMAL!!!

The road to recovery has not only been about just Charley's feet but also about the bonding of a mother who rejected her child through the believes and superstitions of her community. Veronic has also grown personally and emotionally in herself.

Charlie went "fast forward" from a 1 year child to a 7 year old confident boy in 5 months.

We have enjoyed each step of this wonderful journey as Charley and Veronic now have a permanent place in our lives and we hope that they will reflect on their time in Australia.

Thank you again to everyone for the great team effort that has made a difference to a small boy from Tanna Island. This great young boy now the opportunity to attend school, climb palm trees and take his place alongside his father in a community where disability is seen as a curse.
