Recently, 21 young folk from diverse backgrounds came together for a camp at Tocal where they took part in a series of lectures and forums.

One of the **challenges** this year was the direction to look at four organisations, all facing diminishing membership (including Rotary), and come up with innovative ways to market their brands.

The group split into four **working groups**, discussed their ideas and on the graduation evening, presented these ideas.

I was impressed with the **new-found confidence** these young people displayed and was blown away by their ideas.

How do such organisations that have been around for such a long time get **their message across** in today's society and get young people involved?

One simple example was the Meals on Wheels discussion group that came up with a spectacular new logo that could be placed on the side of delivery vans. The logo was of a truck designed out of cutlery, fruit and cuts of meat within the Meals on Wheels logo, an **innovative and catchy idea**.

The youth were **exposed to professionals**, those who had experienced both success and failure in business, one fellow spoke about body language.

The program reinforced the ideal that Rotarians have a **responsibility** to our young folk to give them the opportunity to maximise their potential. RYLA does exactly this.

9670 does to promote youth leadership in our District. Focused on empowering people to reach out to others and provide opportunities to make a change, DG Gerard asks us to con-

sider how we are reaching out to Youth and embracing this month as Vocation Month...

A nice aspect of this program is that many of the **participants mentored** as youth come back to help with the program in following years.

We all make mistakes in life, young people need to know this, know there is forgiveness and move on - a message that will encourage young people.

Rotarian, Darcy Geale, is the chair of this committee and **thanks and congratula-tions** must go to him and his hard working committee.

RYLA was also successful in gaining grant funding to sponsor two young people from New Guinea, one an English teacher in her 20's; and another young man who worked in IT.

RYLA this year gave the additional opportunities to **share culture**. We learn so much from one another - 'I use to complain that I didn't have shoes until I met someone who didn't have feet', something to think about.

Preparations are in hand for the **annual conference** in Forster from March 21. Among the guest speakers will be Paul Lions who is a corporate consultant specialising in change; Noah Bassil who did his studies on the political situation in Africa; and

Liz Gerard who will speak on the work of lady doctors during World War I.

This is a time when we can **learn from one another**; look at what we are doing well; and how we can do those things better.

Speaking on that, I have appreciated those clubs that have filled out our **survey forms**. This information is invaluable and will assist with the development of a **strategic plan** for the district heading into the future.

I remain amazed at the **diversity** within our clubs and the growing **flex-ibility** to meet the needs of their members.

Among the meetings I attended over

the past month, including a number of breakfast meetings, I remembered there are **no hard and fast rules** about where, when or how Rotarians meet. The only rule I like to see enforced is that those who attend the meetings **have fun and feel their time has been well spent**.

As the Rotary International President Gary Huang says "use your hand to help, use your head to make sure you are helping in the right place and use your heart to make sure what you are you are doing with sincerity. Without

I would also like to thank everyone for their interest and support of Yvonne's project, **the MHERV Van**. As a matter of fact, interest is so keen that during one of our visits to a club question time saw the majority of questions directed to Yvonne which indicates the keen interest in men's health in rural communities and I thank you for that.

As I said, 2014 has been **better than wonderful** and I know even more inspirational experiences are yet to come before this very special year is over
