I cannot start this report without mentioning the devastating impacts of the flood event so many in our District experienced firsthand in recent days. I received many phone calls from fellow Rotarians keen to offer assistance but one of the first people I felt compelled to speak to was Rotary Club of Dungog President Bob Humphrey, whose home town was struck by severity of the flood and is now living with the tragic loss of life.

Through Bob's efforts, Dungog residents were able to access laundry services through support of Harvey Norman stores who provided washing machines and dryers. The local aged care service also opened their commercial laundry for use by the general public, which allowed so many people to do their washing.

Rather than Rotary setting up their own disaster fund, we will support those organisations already offering sup**port** to those affected. Organisations such as the Salvation Army have strong experience in these relief efforts and it is these organisations that we should be providing secondary support to.

It is also a time to reflect that out of disasters such as this recent event, comes the strength of humanity and it is of great comfort to see how this little town is binding together as a community in this time of intense adversity. Our thoughts are with all af-

Professor Noah Bassill is a lecturer in politics and international relations and gave an insight into regional and national power relations that have emerged following the Arab uprisinas.

Liz Gerard spoke on the role of female doctors during World War One which again, reflected on Anzac Day.

Andrew Hughes spoke about human potential and I am pleased to announce this won't be the last time you hear from him. Andrew will be the master of ceremonies at next year's conference which is to be held at Mudgee. Refer to the website for all available details for next year.

Two things we did a little differently this year was the 'Walk-In' of Past District Governors to recognise their service to Rotary and we also had all the district trophies on display.

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It was decided to give plaques to trophy recipients and to **retain the trophies together** as a collective to be displayed together at appropriate times.

Many Rotary Clubs throughout the district were involved in their **Anzac Day activities** and when I think of Anzac Day, it is not about glorifying war, it is a **time of national pride but also great sorrow**. They returned with demons on their back and with it came many cases of post-traumatic stress that not only affected individuals but also family and friends around them.

I also wish to thank everyone who is supporting my partner Yvonne's project, **the MHERV Van** and particularly Pam McHarg who quilted a beautiful piece and also to the Rotary Club of Morisset who donated two bottles of port. All three were **auctioned at the conference** with proceeds going to MHERV.

I would also like to mention the work of Clarice Hamling of the Rotary Club of Wallsend-Maryland with **Donate Life**. Clarice highlights that the NSW RMS organ donation program attached to the driver's licence is now invalid and does not recognise proof of an individual wanting to donate an organ.



The 2015 Loop the Lake event held on 8th March has been hailed as an outstanding success.

Kerry Hayes, President of Warners Bay Rotary Club, said "our club sponsors this event and planning started way back in November 2014. Teamwork is critical, to pull off an event like this and our club has it in spades".

" It was a great joint effort; with the Mayor of Lake Macquarie, Councillor Jodie Harrison launching the ride, other Rotary Clubs in District 9670 and organisations such as Crest Communication, Ulysses Motor Bike Club, St John Ambulance and Lake Macquarie Police all providing valued services.

As a result of our combined efforts, we will be able to donate substantial funds to the John Hunter Children's Hospital, the Royal Institute for Deaf and Blind Children and other worthy causes. We had around 1,700 cyclists from far and wide, enjoying the ride around Lake Macquarie on such a perfect autumn day. Off course, without our loyal cyclists, there would be no event, and we are grateful to them for their participation. The feedback again this year has been excellent", concluded Ms Hayes.

A recent rider survey found that 57 per cent of riders were local, 25 per cent were from Sydney, 13 per cent from the Hunter and 5 per cent from other areas. Riders rated the event 9 out of 10.

District & Club Insurance Policies

Rotary International District 9670 Inc. arranges insurance for the District, District entities and District Clubs in a number of categories.

The suite of Rotary policies includes -

* Industrial Special Risks coverage for property,

* General Liability for personal injury or property damage to others,

* Personal Accident and Travel for Rotarians and partners

* Associations Liability for Clubs and entities,

*Crime as a result of internal or external events, or thefts.

The District is currently arranging for the renewal of these policies. The cost of coverage is included in the fees Clubs pay to the District through the Annual Fees.

There is an additional policy available covering trailers and caravans owned by Clubs or District entities. District does not pay a premium for this policy, but it is available to such bodies upon request and payment of the assessed premium.

Clubs and District entities are issued with a certificate of currency for the General Liability policy, usually late in July of the new Rotary year. If any Club or organisation is planning to hold an event in the first three weeks of the new Rotary Year, contact should be made with the District Insurance Officer at an early date to request that the certificate be issued in time for the event. If another body, such as a local Council or an owner of property on which an event is to be conducted, requests that its name be included in the certificate, the District Insurance Officer needs to know this.

Club Presidents, Treasurers and Boards need to remember that the premium for the Insurance Policies is payable immediately upon issue of the invoice by the Insurer. It is essential that Clubs pay their District Fees immediately upon receipt of their invoice so that District is in a position to pay for the insurance coverage arranged.

District Governor, Gerard McMillan, has stumbled across a real gem...previously published by one of our region's PDG's on Rotary and the FUN that RLI brings to Rotary. As a focus for the current Rotary year from RI President Gary Huang, we need to remember that Rotary should be FUN and the way that RLI can ensure we have it...

"The Rotary Leadership Institute"

"It is fun! It is fast-paced! It is totally inter-active!

What is it? It is the Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI). With introduction to, and expansion on, Rotary topics ranging from Membership to Leadership to Service Projects, Rotarians complete the facilitated sessions over three one-day sessions across a Rotary year.

Each group of ten to fifteen Rotarians, from different Clubs across the District—and sometimes the neighbouring District—fast become friends as they share experiences and knowledge, through the facilitated topic discussions. Structuring of the courses is comfortable for participants, feeling familiar to participants, since they reflect and are geared towards busy, professional business, trade and community leaders.

Group after group complete the course, and each time, Rotarians go back to Clubs re-invigorated, excited and impatient, keen to apply their learning to Projects and Club activities and too savour their expanded Rotary experiences. Many gain the confidence to take on more responsible roles, including leadership roles within their Club. Many also comment that the skills gained have been useful in their professional development as well as their Rotary development.

Over 365 Districts, across almost 200 countries and territories, are conducting RLI sessions. The six Districts in New Zealand and the Pacific Islands are all utilising the RLI to educate and inspire Rotarians. In Australia, 19 out of the 21 Districts are running RLI sessions. Although not a specific program of Rotary, the RLI has the enthusiastic support of Rotary International, and that support translates into wisdom with many current, past and future RI Presidents and Directors part of the RLI Senior Advisors' Board, including our current Rotary International President, Gary Huang.

With the future of Rotary, and the local and international service we give, dependent on strong Cubs with knowledgeable Rotarians and excellent leadership, the RLI is an excellent way of providing the underpinning for Club success."
