



Well this month **District Governor Gerard McMillan** updates D9670 on how he should be on the downhill run...but so many exciting programs have taken place over May that it has actually been an exciting ride to keep up with. From Youth Programs to District Assemblies, our District Governor has been super busy seeing all Clubs giving back to our communities and having fun doing it...

After the conference, some have said I'm on the **downhill run**...but we are far from it as there is still so much happening in the District...

During April, one of the many youth programs was **RYCAGS** (Rotary Youth Crops Agronomy Grain and Seed) where Past President Geoff Smith and his team conducted another fantastic program in Narromine that puts the attention onto those **working the land**. This sector is so often forgotten, particularly the hardships they face.

I was made aware that today some families in Longreach, who continue to **battle the drought**, are eating just one meal every second day. The RYCAGS program in Narromine sees students aged 16 to 20 involved in **hands-on activities** to better understand life on the land, which is a very worthwhile initiative.

Closer to home, we continue to recover from the **devastation of the floods**, which hit hard in Dungog. Rotary Club of Dungog President Bob Humphries has been amazed at the **offers of assistance** from Rotary Clubs throughout Australia and is so humbled and appreciative. Those in need have been well supported by the **generosity** of Rotary.

There are many good and generous people and always a **disaster** that needs our attention. News of another earthquake in Nepal is upsetting to say

the least; but know these people are being assisted with **ShelterBoxes**, a very tangible and effective project that offers some comfort when all seems so hopeless. Please **continue to support** this great Rotary initiative.

On Wednesday May 6th, Yvonne and I travelled to the Rotary Club of Dubbo West which was a **German Night** attended by Hans-Dieter Steinbach, **German Consul-General** (based in Sydney) and the District's three Rotary youth exchange program students from Germany.

On the night ,Club President Lance Murphy presented a cheque for \$5,000 to the ShelterBox program. According to ShelterBox conveyor, Assistant Governor Peter Croft, this was the **biggest single donation** he has received this year. There is much need for clubs to continue to support this initiative.

It was lovely to hear from the youth exchange students who had just returned from their **Capricorn Ramble** that took them to parts of Australia most of us only imagine seeing. They have enjoyed their **exchange visits** and each have their own story to tell. In the next two or three months they will journey back home and I know they take with them many **fond memories of Australia**. I express gratitude and appreciation to the Rotary Clubs who hosted the inbound youth exchange program students; and especially the **counsellors and host parents** as a

collective.

Yvonne and I have met these students on numerous occasions and are so impressed by this program and the **positive experience** it provides young people throughout the world. This is a neverending story for the hard working **Youth Exchange Program (YEP)** committee, under the Chair of Denise Parkes, who are in the process of conducting interviews on May 23rd for the next group of exchange students who will **go overseas in 2016**. I am indebted to this committee and the great work they do. The students comment how well briefed they are by Denise and her team—so thank you to all involved.

Another youth activity during the month of May was **RYPEN** (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment) at Myuna Bay. The Committee Chair is Zoey Kirwan, who is a young mother of three herself, but manages to find time to **commit to young people** and this fantastic program. Congratulations to all involved.

We also have the Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA), another youth initiative, that sees senior students teaming up in pairs to discuss important global issues. The conversation is in our District and conducted at the Muswellbrook Council Chambers. The event is on this Saturday 23rd May and I recommend Rotarians attempt to attend this Assembly and listen to these bright, young people. My thanks to Past President Megan Valentine and her MUNA committee on their organisation of the weekend and also to the Muswellbrook Shire Council for providing such as appropriate venue.

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Congratulations also to Rotary Club of Muswellbrook and Past President Phil Lawlor who have secured **significant sponsorship** for this event over the years.

The Rotary Foundation meeting on Sunday, May 17th, saw the changing of the guard when Past District Governor Alex McHarg chairs his last Foundation meeting—having completed his three years as Chair. On July 1st, I will pass on the role to Past District Governor Peter Raynor. If Rotary Clubs and individual Rotarians could support the Foundation, the charity arm of Rotary, now is the time to do it.

As we approach the new Rotary year, many took the opportunity to take part in the President Elect Training Seminars (PETS) and District Assemblies, led by District Governor Elect Adrian Roach and his Learning & Development team at Singleton and Dubbo. I acknowledge all those involved with those two weekends and also Rotary Clubs of Singleton on Hunter and Dubbo West who provided catering over these days.

In one of the breakout sessions at the District Assembly it was stated by some **newer Rotarians** (of two years membership) that they **learnt more** in that one day about Rotary then in the previ-

ous two years. The format of the Assemblies has **evolved over the years**, as a result of feedback received by the training team, both in **delivery and content**, so much so that both experienced Rotarians and newer ones find attendance at PETS and Assemblies a **worth-while experience**.

It also inspires me to remind you all of the importance of continued mentoring of all Rotarians - like a farmer we can't allow ourselves to merely plant a crop and walk away hoping it grows. Our crop of Rotarians, both new and long serving members, need ongoing attention and care.

On May 24th, I will met with the **Group Study Exchange (GSE) Team** that leaves for Germany soon. It is with regret that Past President Birgitta Smith has had to withdraw from leading this **group study** because of an injury. Sympathies to Birgitta because I know how much she was looking forward to this trip which was, no doubt, an **opportunity of a life time**.

On a brighter note, Past President Wolf Sturner from the Rotary Club of East Maitland has, at very short notice, jumped on board...so sincere thanks to him. We wish the group well and know they will enjoy their trip to Germany.

District Chair of the GSE, Shari Tanzer

has sent out notices to clubs for the **2016 tour of Taiwan**. Applications are open now so consider taking up this **amazing opportunity**.

In closing, I ask all Rotarians to **share your Rotary stories.** In the words of Rotary International President Gary C K Huang: "Whenever I travel I ask my hosts to talk to me about their clubs. What I value most about these conversations are the stories I hear - the stories that, taken together, **tell the story of Rotary.** 

"I've heard stories that have made me laugh and stories that have moved me to tears. I've heard stories of how our service changes the lives of others and how it changes us as Rotarians. When I hear these stories, I can't help but wonder: How many other lives could we change for the better by bringing more people into Rotary? And how many more people could we bring into Rotary simply by sharing our Rotary stories?"

I share RI President Huang's request that you share your Rotary story - these stories are what **inspires us and encourage others to join us**.

"They help light up our service as we work to Light Up Rotary."

The sales make about \$8,000 for the club and the money goes to Rotary programs, including foreign aid and

youth scholarships.

"At the end it is good to see where all the money goes."

Mrs Burke's son, Alex Burke, joined her at the flower stand at Rutherford on Sunday for the Mother's Day rush.

The family from Buchanan spends a lot of time together in their kitchen and benchtops business and have been Rotarians since 2012.

The two laughed at the idea of breakfast in bed and said helping the club was a great way to spend the day.

"She loves helping people," Alex said of his mother.

"She is a very happy person."

## **DISTRICT INSURANCE RENEWALS**

Rotary International District 9670 Incorporated's suite of insurance policies <u>expires</u> on 30<sup>th</sup> June, but will be renewed.

A certificate of currency for coverage under the General Liability policy which covers Public Liability and Products Liability will in due course be issued in the name of each of the District clubs and incorporated associations. However, these certificates are often not available until about the **third week in July**.

If your club or entity is holding an event during the first 3 weeks of the new Rotary year and you have been asked to provide a certificate of currency valid for a date within that period, special arrangements can be made.

If you need such a certificate, you should contact the incoming District Insurance Officer,

If another entity, such as a local government council, or the owner of land on which you are holding some function has requested that its interest be noted on the certificate, this should also be advised so that appropriate certificates can be obtained.

East Timor teenager Dulcia Gusmao (14) now has a new lease on life...




The procedure was done by spinal surgeon, Dr Rob Kuru at Newcastle Private Hospital on a humanitarian basis. ROMAC were fortunate to locate a lovely young couple who speak Tetum; willing to host and translate as the girls speak no English.

Dulcia is the first of two ROMAC patients for District 9670—both with the same spinal problem .We are hoping that Dulcia will be fit to travel home at the end of May as ROMAC have our next patient Esperanca Santos (17) booked for surgery on 15th June at Newcastle Private Hospital..

We are looking for Rotarians in our district who might like to get involved by hosting these beautiful girls on a daily basis and showing them our wonderful part of the world.

Recent ROMAC patient, Charlie Nurak (with club feet) was sponsored by the Rotary Club of East Maitland. Charlie's story was a lovely and rewarding success...but unfortunately he and





his family lost everything in Cyclone Pam that hit Tanna Island in March 2015.

ROMAC is looking for donations, as there are still 50 children on the ROMAC waiting list for surgery.

ROMAC provides free medical treatment for children from developing countries through life -saving and/or dignity restoring surgeries not accessible to them in their home country.

# WHAT IS RLI?



The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a multi-district, grassroots leadership development program of member districts organised into regional divisions throughout the world

RLI conducts a series of quality leadership development courses for potential club officers and other club members, including those who have recently joined a Rotary Club. The courses emphasize both leadership skills and knowledge of Rotary around the world.

All course sessions are completely interactive and the 81 RLI Regional Divisions believe that leadership education has a positive impact on membership retention by creating enthusiasm and furthering engagement for Rotary.

For the first time, President-Elect Ravindran has set a goal for membership retention as part of the requirements for the 2015-16 Presidential Citation program. This is significant step for Rotary because prior R.I. membership goals have normally used percentage/numerical member increases as the goal. There has been continuing realisation that Rotary membership losses have been primarily caused by retention problems rather than a lack of sufficient recruitments.

So what do you think, could your Club consider improving Rotary retention rates in D9670 by sending all new Rotary club members to a RLI course during their first year of membership? Why not give it a go...

### **FLUTRACKER**

If you are interested in helping researchers from the University of Newcastle track influenza activity across District 9670 you can join a weekly online survey that takes less than 15 seconds to complete.

Flu-tracking monitors for early warning signs of severe influenza outbreaks or pandemics and provides participants with a weekly report and a link to maps of influenza activity.
