BRIEF SUMMARY

It's been an interesting year. I did not manage to do all the things during the year I wanted to do, particularly visit clubs. I did manage to visit some for functions apart from the official visits, but would have preferred to have been able to do more, to see more of Rotarians on the



ground doing the things that we pride ourselves on doing for our communities.

Administration and governance are issues for both clubs and the District. After about 6 years we have managed to bring in a new constitution which takes effect from 1^{st} July, 2017. The new constitution will assist in enabling standardised procedures for district committees and activities to be introduced. There is a Committee which is smaller than it was under the existing constitution, and District meetings can now be held by electronic means, meaning people do not need to travel from one end of the District to the other to attend a meeting.

Most District Committees have now transferred control of their accounts to the District Treasurer. This simplifies the accounting procedures and means that there is no longer a problem in having all the committees put in reports in time for the audit which has to occur. The two which have not transferred their accounts are the Youth Exchange



Committee and the Rotary Foundation Committee, each of which is separately incorporated and looks after its own accounts.

The average age of our members seems to be increasing. One does not see very many younger members around the clubs – there are exceptions of course – but most are either retired or approaching retirement. This may be good in some ways because those who are retired theoretically have more time to devote to Rotary matters. However grand-child caring duties somehow seem to fill the gap that was once occupied by earning a living! And we have to remember that it is family first, work second and Rotary third. If there are child-minding duties to perform, Rotary misses out!

Three of our Past District Governors, Bob Geddes, Bart Richardson and Howard Grigor have died during the last 6 months, and others are not in very robust health. In this District we try to have the District Governor attend club changeover meetings, but if he or she cannot do so, a Past District Governor is asked to deputise. With the death of some, the ill-health of others, and absence from the District of even a few more, the burden cast on the District Governor and the remaining PDGs is increasing. We may have to think seriously whether we should continue the practice of having the District Governor attend or be represented at each Club changeover.

There is much more I could write about what has transpired in the District this year, but the heading to this article is "Brief Summary" so in the interests of brevity, I will go no further except to thank all members of clubs, District Committees, and various Club and District Offices for their work and dedication in showing the ways in which Rotary Serves Humanity, and wish them well in the future as they show that Rotary (is) making a difference.

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REDISTRICTING - MY LAST WORDS!

Australian Director Noel Trevaskis has confirmed that while some recommendations for redistricting have been made to Rotary International, at this time those proposals do not affect this District in any way. Any changes to District boundaries that are approved will not come into force until 1st July, 2020. That gives affected District quite a lot of time to re-arrange their affairs, and the Parramatta Office apparently has a template designed to assist those affected Districts to manage the changes. While there are no proposals which affect us at this time, it is still 3 years until the date mentioned. I would not be surprised if something happens in the reasonably near future, perhaps involving the Districts in the northern half of New South Wales, namely 9640, 9650 and our own District 9670. I think it is still a case of "watch this space!"

THE AVERAGE AGE OF ROTARIANS

In his latest Director's Newsletter, Australian Director Noel Trevaskis says, "One of my greatest concerns is our aging membership. Indications are that, by the year 2022, we are going to start losing members at an accelerated rate because



of our demographics. That is why membership must be a top priority as we have much to achieve in five years.

This is meant to be a conversation starter to get people thinking on the future of Rotary in Australia and New Zealand. VOLUNTARY WORK - A WORD FROM DGE HELEN

President elect Ian Riseley is very keen to promote the work that Rotarians do throughout the world as volunteers and feels that for this work to be recognised it is important that we keep accurate records of the many hours we put in 'voluntarily' for Rotary. He is particularly keen for us to



seriously record the hours we do as without such information he feels that he is unable to promote Rotary in the best light.

So, what is it that we call "volunteer" work? The dictionary notes that "a volunteer" is a "person who voluntarily offers himself for a service or undertaking" or "a person who performs a service willingly and without pay".

Rotarians do that in spades and my understanding of the volunteer work that needs recording is anything that one might do for Rotary beyond the 'normal' role one plays.

President Elect Ian is specifically looking for the recording of volunteer hours that the members put into service projects, either within the local community or more broadly on a District or Global level.

Many clubs have been benefiting from the new membership flexibility resulting from the 2016 Council on Legislation


decisions. The changes in policy affect when, where, and how clubs meet and the types of memberships they offer.

The Rotary Club of Capitol Hill, Washington, D.C., USA, has doubled its membership in six months by creating two new membership types with reduced dues — one for young professionals, and one for spouses or partners.

The Rotary Club of Singapore East has changed its meeting structure: Members now meet formally for lunch only twice per month. The other two weeks, the club meets in a less formal environment.

Rotary excels in customer service

The Rotary Support Centre, which received approximately 50,000 phone calls and 84,000 emails this past year, has earned a top industry designation as a Centre of Excellence.

This is best achieved using the following method.

- 1. Log on to My Rotary
- 2. Go to Rotary Club Central by highlighting the Manage tab at the top of the screen.
- 3. Go to **Club View** and click on the **Service** tab on the top line.
- 4. Scroll down past Goals and Progress to Service Projects and Activities

Highlight 2017-2018 and you will see the EDIT button; click on that and the screen opens for you to write your project, add the volunteer hours and when you have completed, **SAVE**.

INTRODUCTION

The Kula Spirit (private boat clinic, licence number 0201) with Spacim Pikinini-PNG conducted outreach in Suau between 9-18th May visiting Iloilo Aid Post, Suau Island Health Centre, Fife Bay Health Centre, Silosilo Aid Post and Konemaeava Aid Post. The

outreach team included Dr John Vallentine, Wendy Stein OAM, Marina Luccioni, Tristan Stein and Sophie Pascoe. The objectives of the outreach were to:

Conduct needs assessments at rural health facilities in Suau

Provide drugs and medical equipment as required and available

Conduct training and capacity building with rural health workers

Provide medical services to rural populations

Indertake community engagement on family planning and offer women access to implants

Conduct eye assessments and provide reading glasses

Question frequently asked of Rotary International's staff

- Q: Is it possible to have a member status such as "out of town member" or some other designation, in which members do not have to pay RI dues and can return to the club when they move back to town?
- A: Clubs are free to offer alternative membership types of any kind to accommodate their members' needs. RI dues must be paid for "out of town members" to remain active in Rotary. If they pay RI dues, they can be included in your club's official membership count and receive all the benefits of other active, dues paying members. Your club can have different policies for these members' other financial obligations (club and district dues, etc.), attendance requirements, or service expectations, as long as these conditions are reflected in your club bylaws.
