### **POLIO UPDATE**

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation is on record as commenting "We're awed by the teams of vaccinators who take risks to reach each child, and we're inspired by the infinite persistence of Rotary



International. They were leading this fight long before we joined it, and they've just kept moving forward. They know that going from 350,000 cases a year to 37 (in 2016) is amazing, but success is zero."

If you've wondered why I seem to keep mentioning polio eradication, I say there are 3 reasons.

The first is that the world is now closer to seeing the elimination of poliomyelitis than it has ever been. After the last case of infectious smallpox was diagnosed in 1977, that disease was declared to have been eliminated in 1979. Another infectious disease, rinderpest, which mainly affected cattle, was declared eliminated in 2011. Poliomyelitis is another such infectious disease and we are being told that its elimination is "this close". So far this year, as at 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2017, just 3 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 have been confirmed, 2 in Afghanistan and one in Pakistan. This is an incredible result.

The second reason is that the battle is not yet over. Samples containing the virus are still being found, particularly in sewage in poor countries.

While ever it remains, it poses a risk to the health of the population and particularly of children. Vaccination teams in Afghanistan and Pakistan, and also in Nigeria where there was an outbreak last year, have intensified their efforts to get into areas previously impossible because of ongoing conflict. Money is required to support these vaccination teams, and donations to give effect to this work are still being sought.

And the third is closely allied to the second. *End Polio Now* is the District Governor's Partner's project for 2016-17. As we progress towards the end

of the year, Clubs may find that there are funds available which have not been allocated to local projects. Clubs which have such funds to spare are encouraged to send those funds to the District Treasurer as a donation to the Partner's Project. Clubs might even put on a special fundraiser to support the project!



### **ROTARY'S PARLIAMENT**

I referred to the Council on Legislation and the Council on Resolutions in the last newsletter. Clubs were asked to nominate Past District Governors as the District's representative on the Councils. Four PDGs have been nominated, so a ballot to decide who will be the representative and alternate representative is required. Ballot papers to enable a vote to be taken have been distributed to Clubs. Votes are to be submitted at the District Conference, and will be counted after voting closes at 7.30pm on the Saturday evening. The result of the ballot will be announced during the Resolutions Session on the Sunday morning.

### **VALE BART RICHARDSON**

It is with great regret that I advise that Past District Governor Barton Dalyell Richardson OAM, universally known in the District as Bart Richardson, of the Rotary Club of Nelson Bay, died on 11th March, 2017, after a short illness.

Bart was a long-term member of Rotary and was the District Governor of the then District 967 in 1986-87.

At this time no funeral arrangements are known, but it is expected that those details will be published in the Newcastle Herald in the next few days.

### BUSHFIRES

The whole of the State of New South Wales has recently been impacted by uncontrolled fires in rural areas, commonly called bushfires. One of the most disappointing things is that at least some of the fires have apparently been deliberately lit.

This District has been quite severely impacted by these fires. While there has been a sprinkling of fires right throughout the District, the most extensive were the Sir Ivan fire in Dunedoo area which spread east towards Cassilis, and the Kains Flat fire to the north-east of Mudgee which spread to the north. In the Sir Ivan Fire, some 55,000 hectares of land were burnt, and in the Kains Flat, about 7000 hectares were burnt. At this time it is known that 31 houses, 104 out-buildings, a church and a community hall were lost, but the count is still rising as landholders venture back into the central area of the fires. Only 3 houses in the small village of Uarbry remained. There were huge stock losses, something in the order of 10,000 sheep and 2,000 cattle. As well as all that, in excess of 5500 kilometres of fencing was destroyed.

Many people are rallying to assist those who have lost almost everything. Some agencies are accumulating furniture and household goods, others obtaining donations of food, still others are searching out clothing. But finding suitable accommodation for the people who have lost their homes is not an easy task.

Blazeaid, a volunteer organisation which provides labour to assist in refercing after fires and floods, has established bases at Cassilis and Dunedoo. It expects to be operating in those areas for 6 months or perhaps longer. While it supplies labour it does not provide fencing materials. On my rough calculations, a basic 4-plain 1-barb fence on timber posts with steel Y posts and droppers between (OK for cattle but not sheep) would cost about \$1600 per kilometre with no allowance for gates. For 5,500km, that's \$8.8 million. Add to that the estimated replacement costs for houses, sheds, machinery, seed, fertilizer and other property lost and it is not hard to get to \$15 million.

The Rotary Clubs of Mudgee and Mudgee Sunrise have started an appeal for money. In some ways, this is a sensible way of helping because it means that people who qualify for assistance can use it to purchase what they consider is most important for them. Details of how to contribute appear shortly.

What follows is an edited version of a recent statement by Rotarian Margaret Barnes, Campaign Co-ordinator of the Rotary Central West NSW Bushfire Appeal and published in the Mudgee Guardian newspaper:

### HUMOUR
