The Future

Our Governor's team is in the process of selecting a group of D9670 members to be part of a Transition Management Team that will be forwarded to Rotary International for their consideration and final selection. Following this, our team will meet with and negotiate an amalgamation with another District, with the aim of a July 1, 2023 implementation date. As yet, the new, amalgamated District number is unknown.

The latest RI direction is that we amalgamate with District 9650 – the District directly to our north. Your elected District Management team look forward to an amicable working relationship to form the new District and secure the future.

Every Rotarian Every Year

The Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY) initiative encourages all Rotary club members to contribute \$100 every year to financially support the Rotary Foundation.



Why not donate \$100 in the name of every Rotarian that renews their club membership each year, from the amount that your club may already be planning to donate to TRF? The members will earn points towards a PHF. It may also encourage them to support their own recurring giving or join the PHS.

End Polio Now



Your donation helps Rotary and its partners reach every child with the polio vaccine. Thanks to the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, your contribution will be tripled, getting us even closer to a polio-free world.

Rotary Citation and Presidential Distinction

We have 20 clubs within reach of attaining a Citation this year, 4 of which should reach their goals with a little tuition – already 1 of those has spoken to me and we have identified great projects that were not registered on-line. One Rotary Club has made it to a Gold Presidential Distinction and we have 2 clubs sitting on Platinum Distinctions requiring just a little bit more effort to attain this achievement.

All activities need to be completed and reported in the Rotary Database of 'My Rotary' by June 30, 2019. Only the Club President and Secretary can do so. Please contact me for advice on how to do this if you need a hand. I have contacted the AG's with the list and they will be willing to help you or drop me a line.

Club Changeovers

Thank you to all the clubs that responded so well to our request for Changeover notification. As District Governor I would love to attend them all, but this is impossible with 47 clubs having them between 1 June and 14 July – many on the same evenings. I also have commitments to the Rotary Convention and to the Australian Rotary Coordinators training.

Past District Governors and Assistant Governors have responded in amazing fashion to lighten the workload. By now all Presidents and President Elects should be aware of who will be attending on behalf of Rotary International.

New Year Resolutions

Each year we should strive to improve on the previous year. Looking through some hard facts in the District for 2018-19 it is encouraging to see that we have been able to increase the number of Clubs that actually plan and record their goals on 'My Rotary'. Without getting too excited over a near 50% increase in goal setting, I do not think anyone would argue that we can still do a lot better.

The challenge is there for the Clubs in 2019-20 to plan and connect with members to see what they really can achieve – set a date with your members for these discussions, record, monitor, adopt the goals and continually review them as the year progresses.

As the 2018-19 Rotary year draws to an end, our Assistant Governors reflect on their Zone Clubs' achievements and projects during the year.

AG AMANDA ROACH ZONE 3



For much of my AG year the focus for all my clubs has been assisting with drought relief. This has been from smaller personal contact offering friendship and a friendly ear to local farmers, to big events such as the golf day organised by RC Muswellbrook which raised well over \$60,000.

There have been some amazing efforts by clubs to source and distribute stock feed to farmers, distribute hampers donated by communities, businesses and

other Rotary Clubs as well as great friendships and collaborative plans developed between groups of Rotary Clubs (such as Muswellbrook/Scone/Merriwa and the two Mudgee Clubs with Rylstone-Kandos).

Clubs and Rotarians on the coast have shown wonderful support for those out west, most notably evident with the "Bugger the Drought" event held in Merriwa which was attended by so many Rotarians who helped out, provided support both personal and financial, and most importantly

took the time to find out how the drought takes its toll on our farming communities.

All clubs were active in assisting farmers with drought relief applications, and some clubs (such as the co-operatives listed) successfully applied for drought relief grants. This money has been managed in collaboration with other agencies in their communities — such an important role as we move into the new world of Rotary where the need to partner with local groups is becoming more apparent for our own and our communities survival.

It has been a pleasure to have frequent conversations and/or visits to the RCs of Merriwa, Muswellbrook, Mudgee and Mudgee Sunrise as their Assistant Governor this year, and I welcome the opportunity to now include Denman as part of Zone 3. Apart from the great Rotarians who populate these clubs and seeing the fantastic community work they are able to manage as well as their own busy lives, for me the icing on the cake is that in all these clubs I have some long-term friends from other parts of my life (and some of those for 40 years!).

I am looking forward to continuing to support these 5 clubs during the next Rotary year and continuing my visits where David and I have been so welcomed.



HIGHLIGHTS—2019 ROTARY COUNCIL OF LEGISLATION

The 2019 Council on Legislation may not have made as many dramatic changes as the Council three years ago did, but it made several decisions that will shape the future of Rotary.



Among the most important, the Council elevated the status of Rotaract clubs. The change broadens the definition of membership in Rotary International to include Rotaract clubs. The change is intended to increase the support that Rotaract clubs receive from RI and to enhance their ability to serve.

"We need to be an inspiration to our young partners, so they will continue doing the great service that they do," said RI President Barry Rassin when he presented the measure. "This sends a strong message that they are truly our partners in service."

In many ways, the Rotaract experience will not change. Rotary clubs will still charter and sponsor Rotaract clubs. Rotaract clubs will still have their own standard constitution and their own unique club experience. Members of a Rotaract club will not be called Rotarians. And Rotaract clubs will not immediately pay dues or receive other benefits, such as the official magazine that Rotary members receive. The Board will determine a dues structure over time.

The measure simply expands the definition of membership in Rotary International to include both Rotary and Rotaract clubs.

Every three years, representatives from Rotary districts around the world meet in Chicago, Illinois, USA, to consider changes to the constitutional documents that govern Rotary International. This year's Council considered more than 100 proposals.

Representatives authorized the Board to pursue changing RI's charitable status to a section 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization under the U.S. Internal Revenue Code. It is presently a 501(c)(4). A task force has been studying the possible change for 18 months and says it will offer benefits that include tax reductions and vendor discounts that will reduce expenses.

Dues increase

As for dues, the Council approved a modest increase of \$1 a year for each of three years, beginning in 2020-21. The

previous Council set dues for 2019-20 at \$34 per half year. With the increase, the dues that clubs pay to RI per member will increase to \$34.50 per half year in 2020-21, \$35 per half year in 2021-22, and \$35.50 per half year in 2022-23. The dues will not be raised again until a future Council votes to change it.

A seemingly small but intensely debated action will reduce the number of nonvoting members at future Councils, by removing past RI presidents and allowing only one RI Board director to attend but not vote.

But in some respects, the Council defined itself as much by what it did not do.

This year's representatives resisted pressure to limit some of the flexibility that the 2016 Council granted clubs, rejecting several measures that would have placed restrictions on clubs. One unsuccessful measure would have required clubs to meet at least 40 times each year.

Many clubs have been using the innovative and flexible club formats to attract new members and meet their current members' needs.

Representatives also rejected proposals to make it optional for members to subscribe to an official Rotary magazine and to reduce the size of the Council by half and have it meet every two years.


Several representatives commented on the democratic nature of the proceedings. Adriana De La Fuente, the representative from District 4170, Mexico said,

"All of the delegates have been very responsible and respectful, no matter what their opinions. That elevates the trust and respect for our organization."

Glen K. Vanderford of District 6760, a member of the Rotary Club of Jackson-Old Hickory, Tennessee, USA, said

"The process allows us to have a road map forward instead of just going day to day. I was excited by the outcome of enhancing Rotaract and that we didn't weaken future Councils, but preserved the ability for everybody to have a voice."

Presidential Message - June 2019





You are working hard to eradicate polio, participating in 4,200 events in more than 100 countries for World Polio Day. And you are carrying out transformative projects that will create lasting change in your communities and in the world.

This year, I also saw how Rotary's work to build peace is bearing fruit. The 98 Rotary Peace Fellows who are studying at our peace centers will soon graduate, joining more than 1,200 others in applying their conflict resolution skills to problems that need solutions. And this month, Esther and I will travel to Hamburg, Germany, for a convention where people of all races, nationalities, religions, and political backgrounds will unite because they want to make the lives of all people better.

Seeing what Rotary means to people — to the communities we serve and to Rotarians themselves — has deepened my affection and admiration for all that Rotary is and does.



Soon it will be time for Esther and me to return home to Nassau. When we get there, I will look out on the vast sea that surrounds our island, and it will remind me of Rotary's limitless possibilities, and of the amazing future that awaits us beyond the horizon. I look forward to sailing there with you.

Holger Knaack selected to be 2020-21 Rotary International President



Holger Knaack, a member of the Rotary Club of Herzogtum Lauenburg-Mölln, Germany, has been selected as president of Rotary International in 2020-21.

The Nominating Committee's decision follows the resignation last month of President-nominee Sushil Gupta due to health reasons. Knaack will officially become president-nominee if no other candidates challenge him by 31 May.

To build a stronger membership, Knaack says Rotary must focus on increasing the number of female members and transitioning Rotaractors into Rotarians.

Knaack believes that the People of Action campaign offers new public awareness possibilities for Rotary. "This campaign conveys our global image while still respecting differences in regions and cultures," he says.

A Rotary member since 1992, Knaack has served Rotary as treasurer, director, moderator, member and chair of several committees, representative for the Council on Legislation, zone coordinator, training leader, and district governor. He is an endowment/major gifts adviser and co-chair of the Host Organization

Committee for the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg.

Knaack is the CEO of Knaack KG, a real estate company. He was previously a partner and general manager of Knaack Enterprises, a 125-year-old family business. He is a founding member of the Civic Foundation of the City of Ratzeburg and served as president of the Golf-Club Gut Grambek. Knaack is also the founder and chair of the Karl Adam Foundation.

Knaack and his wife, Susanne, are Major Donors to The Rotary Foundation and members of the Bequest Society.

A great job by all the volunteer teams in preparing and selling the flowers at various sites around town.








