


Members are representative from across our whole area, which is very pleasing. 



# Announcing an Extraordinary Gift to the Rotary Peace Centers



*How fortunate The Rotary Foundation is to have people who believe in our causes and are willing to use some of their own resources to support our work. There's no question that our Foundation would have come to naught if not for the sustenance that so many provide, and it's so gratifying to note that there are now more who are striving to emulate them.*

*It's for that reason that I want you to learn of the extraordinary gift — a pledge of \$15.5 million — that the Otto and Fran Walter Foundation has made to The Rotary Foundation so that we can establish one of our Rotary Peace Centers in the Middle East or North Africa.*

*It's long been a stated desire of many Rotarians to establish a peace center in this region. Mainly because of three elements — water, oil, and religion — the*

*Middle East has often been a cauldron of conflict. We believe that with social understanding and political goodwill, there's still hope for peace and harmony in the Middle East. This is one way that Rotary can make a tangible contribution.*

*I am pleased to share the story of Otto and Fran Walter, the extraordinary people whose generosity made this possible.*

*The new center will be named the Otto and Fran Walter Rotary Peace Center. We hope to open it in 2026 and will begin the site selection process shortly.*

*I express our deep appreciation to the Otto and Fran Walter Foundation for this exemplary and hugely generous gift. I also want to record with sincere gratitude the efforts of Past District Governor Martha "Marty" Helman and her spouse, Frank, whose singular efforts brought this gift to fruition.*

The Otto and Fran Walter Foundation has pledged \$15.5 million to The Rotary Foundation to start a Rotary Peace Center in the Middle East or North Africa.

The new center will offer a professional development certificate program focused on peacebuilding and development issues in the region. This generous gift from the Walter Foundation, which is based in Boothbay Harbor, Maine, USA, will fund the center's startup costs and operating expenses, as well as an endowment that will provide peace fellowships in perpetuity for up to 40 students to study there each year.

"Rotary has, for a long time, looked at how we can make a tangible contribution to the one area of the world where the element of peace has seemed so elusive," says Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair K.R. Ravindran. "Now that opportunity has come our way, thanks to the immense generosity of the Otto and Fran Walter Foundation. We will take full advantage to create a center where we can inspire our peace fellows to give flight to their spirit and equip them to be able to support action that will bring about peace and goodwill in a troubled region."

The Rotary Foundation will select a partner institution to host the Otto and Fran Walter Rotary Peace Center in 2024, and the first Rotary Peace Fellows are expected to start studying there in January 2026.

Otto and Fran Walter established their family foundation to promote peace and other charitable causes, and their mission lives on even after their deaths. Otto was born in Germany in 1907 and worked as a lawyer there. When totalitarianism arose in Europe, the Nazi government enacted the Nuremberg laws, which pushed Jewish professionals out of their jobs. Summarily disbarred,

Otto worked briefly as a law clerk before emigrating to the United States in 1936. He and his parents settled in New York.

His law degree wasn't recognized in the U.S., so Otto improved his English and started professional training. He earned a license as a certified public accountant and opened an accounting firm. But he never stopped believing that he could work as a lawyer again. Eventually, he sold his accounting firm and entered law school at New York Law School, graduating in 1954. The next year, he started a law firm which, with the support of his wife, Fran, steadily grew to employ 40 lawyers.


Through his legal work, Otto helped promote peace and improve relations between Germany and the U.S. After the Nuremberg laws were repealed, he became licensed to practice law in Germany and served as an adviser to the German Ministry of Finance during the negotiations of a 1954 U.S.-German income tax treaty. Otto and Fran focused on their philanthropic foundation later in their lives, becoming personally involved in the grants that they were able to fund. Otto became a member of the Rotary Club of New York City.

After Otto and Fran both died in 2003, Rotarian Frank Helman, a law colleague and friend, became president and director of their Foundation. He and his wife, Martha "Marty" Helman, the current president of the foundation, helped shepherd the \$15.5 million gift to The Rotary Foundation. The Helmans are both members of the Rotary Club of Boothbay Harbor.

"The Walter Foundation can imagine no better way to remember Otto and Fran and their legacy than through a Rotary Peace Center in the Middle East — a part of the world that has been torn by conflict," says Marty, who also serves

as chair of The Rotary Foundation's Peace Major Gifts Initiative Committee. "The Walter Foundation is a small family foundation; we needed the partnership with Rotary to create a world-class peace center."

Since the first Rotary Peace Fellows began their studies in 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,400 fellows who now work in more than 115 countries. Many serve as leaders in government, nongovernmental organizations, the military, education, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and World Bank.

"Lest we forget". Our very special one day in the year, ANZAC Day, has been and gone for another year, but we never forget the sacrifices our veterans make to keep us safe.





In his speech, His Excellency spoke of the many activities involving Rotary at the time, including having presided over the opening ceremony for the Aussie Peace Walk and unveiling the 100th Rotary Peace Pole. He went on to say that he and Mrs Hurley were delighted to be Ambassadors of the Rotary Centenary Year and in a position to shine a light on its outstanding contributions to many societies.

*“Humanity in Action is beautifully presented, meticulously researched*

The book also provides a superb coverage of what Rotary ‘is’ and ‘plans to be’ in the future. At the time of writing, there is only a week to go before the **Lake Mac Autumn Fair**.



Working closely with Maitland City Council and with the assistance of a Community Grant, a series of events were planned beginning with the hanging of our great Centenary Banners in the Maitland CBD which have really promoted and recognised Rotary as a service organisation in the Lower Hunter.

Each club also organised a display of their club's history or community programs in their local library or art gallery to demonstrate the strong community service that Rotary has performed locally over many years. A Baton Relay was held at the new Maitland Athletics Centre and was well attended by members of the 5 clubs, our District Governor David and DGE Amanda as well as local politicians, who all participated in assisting each of the 5 clubs achieve their goal of 100 laps for 100 years of service. ## From the Archives

Report of the **Annual Conference of the 32nd District** – Rotary International. Held at Newcastle **21-23 May 1955** (some 66 years ago and the same date as our Virtual Conference!)

The following is a short extract from the Conference Report.

The Conference was held at the City Hall in Newcastle, commencing with an official dinner held on the Friday evening with 313 Rotarians, Rotaryannes and guests at the dinner.

Seymour Shaw – PDG District 29 – addressed the Conference on *'Highlights in Rotary Development'* and stated there was no other organization or institution which appealed so much to what he termed 'commonality' of man. He went on to say *'I hope that Rotary and Rotarians, no matter how large the memberships of Rotary may grow, will never allow pomp and ceremony to take the place of the simple ideas and procedures and the outlook on life which Paul Harris taught and practised'*.

The first session on the Saturday ended with the screening of the Golden Anniversary film, *'The Great Adventure'*.
