From the DG's desk

Well done! I also note that lately there have been a number of Paul Harris Fellows awarded around the clubs - and note with

Vocational and Community service are wonderful ways to acknowledge members within our communities who are doing great work – how about using some of these wellearned PH points to bring recognition to these community folk, and club members who are the "quiet achievers"?

In January an inaugural Zoom meeting was held to determine whether we have interested people who would like to be part of a **Diversity, Equity and Inclusion** working party to develop processes for this important focus in our Rotary future. I was very pleased to have some very enthusiastic Rotarians willing to work with me in establishing this, which we will take into District 9660 for implementation in July 2022.

Our congratulations go to RIPE Jennifer Jones on the release of her Rotary Theme for 2022-2023 "**Imagine Rotary**". What an appropriate and wonderful theme for our District as we become D9660 – I have emphasised to you all many times that this is a great opportunity for capturing the talent and creativity of two great districts moving forward, indeed imagining what the possibilities can be for a district with great vision. Of course, Jennifer Jones has an important focus on "Diversity, Equity and Inclusion" so it is timely for us to develop this focus ourselves – let's look at how our own Clubs can reflect our communities and be truly representing our area as we take on board this important message for our future.

On the issue of leadership, training for the first D9660 Management Team will commence soon, along with "PETS" and other Board position education. This is an exciting time as we move forward. Information will be circulated to clubs, with dates for the District Training already booked.

FYI: the journey with transitioning the three Trusts - Margaret Illukol, Lotte Thorkilgaard and John H Algie - is all going well in terms of moving to a new model of management. Shortly I will release information about this in a more formalised way, as well as advertising when our Conference Resolutions Session/Meeting will be held to finalise the necessary issues around this proposed structure.

Thank you to all who have contributed to this process.

It was with a heavy heart that our committee made the decision to cancel the face-to-face Conference in Newcastle this coming March. Obviously the current COVID situation played largely into this decision, with implications of extremely low uptake for registration by our Rotarians. But never fear!!! We are currently working very hard on a new

model for having conference activities on-line and in gathered groups, as well as plans for an opportunity at some date this year to say our in-person farewell to D9670, meet up with old friends and CELEBRATE our history. There will be further information available very soon.



Imagine... Rotarians building a world beyond war

February's Rotary focus is on projects and activities that increase understanding, tolerance and acceptance across nations and cultures.

Each of our 7 areas of focus helps build peace goodwill and understanding however, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) also supports specific projects to build peace and help transform conflict in our communities around the world. This includes Youth education initiatives, training and specialist services to help integrate vulnerable groups such as at-risk youth, refugees, and those affected by conflict and violence. The Foundation also supports Peace Fellowships and funds global Peace Centres – including one at the University of Queensland.

Every Club has the power to shape the next generation of peace leaders by seeking out and nominating suitable candidates to become <u>Peace Fellows</u> by studying for <u>a master's degree</u> in <u>peace and conflict resolution</u>. *However, it must be noted that Master's Fellowship recipients may not study at a Rotary Peace Centre in their home countries*.

Rotary also supports an ongoing Peace Pole program. Since 1955 more than 200,000 Peace Poles have In 2021 Australian Rotary clubs partnered with 100 local schools to erect numbered Peace Poles to mark 100 years of Rotary. Once the Peace Poles were installed, each School is invited to participate in the United Nations World Peace Day Ceremonies on the third Tuesday in September each year.

Rotary also has an <u>Action Group for</u> <u>Peace</u> and they have a great 5-minute video on our Peace building initiatives that you might share with your club this February.

The District would love to know about what your club's done to support global peace.

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Our Fellowships

The Rotary Peace Fellowship is designed for leaders with work experience in peace and development. Our fellows are committed to community and international service and the pursuit of peace. Each year, The Rotary Foundation awards up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 80 for certificate studies at premier universities. The Master's degree programs study peace and development issues with researchinformed teaching and a diverse student body. The programs last 15-24 months and include a two to threeyear month field study, which the participants design themselves.

Professional The Development is a onecertificate program vear blended learning program, whereby experienced peace and development professionals with diverse backgrounds gain practical skills to promote peace within their communities and across the globe. Fellows complete field studies and the also design and carry out a social change initiative. This program is intended for working professionals.

The 2023-24 Rotary Peace Fellowship application will be available in February 2022. Every year, districts must submit their endorsed applications to the Rotary Foundation by 1 July. Review district endorsement instructions.

Our Approach

We see peace not as an abstract concept but as a living, dynamic

expression of human development. Peacebuilding is a cornerstone of our mission as a humanitarian service organisation and it is one of our seven areas of focus – the channels of activity through which our members make their mark on the world. Our programs, grants and fellowships focus on creating environments where peace can be built and maintained. Rotary believes that if concerned citizens work together to create peace locally, lasting change can happen globally.

Today... Over 70 million people are displaced as a result of conflict, violence, persecution and human rights violations. Half of them are children.

We refuse to accept conflict as a way of life. Rotary projects provide training that fosters understanding and provides communities with the skills to resolve conflicts.

By carrying out projects and supporting peace fellowships and scholarships, our members take action to address the underlying cause of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education and unequal distribution of resources.

Our commitment to peacebuilding today answers new challenges: how we can make the greatest possible impact and how we can achieve our vision of lasting change. We are approaching the concept of peace with greater cohesion and inclusivity, broadening the scope of what we mean by peacebuilding and finding more ways for people to get involved.


Rotary creates environments where peace can happen.

Rotary's Four Roles in Promoting Peace

Rotary and its members are:

- Practitioners: our work fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, improving the health of mothers and children, supporting education and growing local economies directly builds the optimal conditions for peaceful societies.
- **Educators:** our Rotary Peace Centres have trained over 1,300 Peace Fellows to become effective catalysts for peace through careers in government, education and international organisations.
- Mediators: our members have negotiated humanitarian ceasefires in areas of conflict to allow polio vaccinators to reach children who are at risk.
- Advocates: our members have an integral role as respected, impartial participants during peace processes and in postconflict reconstruction. We focus on creating communities and convening groups that are connected, inclusive and resilient.

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Drought Communities Outreach Program

In September 2021 DG Amanda requested that the District Natural Disasters Relief Committee participate in the ongoing DCOP Program operating from RAWCS.

The Committee accepted the challenge to roll out the program to provide a total of $200 \times 500 debit cards to Farmers affected by drought or recovering from drought in the 9670 District.

The Committee identified 17 Clubs in the District that were in drought affected areas and encouraged those Clubs to participate in the program.

A total of 5 Clubs in the District opted to support this project to assist the farmers

The Committee were able to distribute the project details and Application forms to these Clubs and following some active work by the participating Clubs the Committee received some 103 applications from Rylstone -Kandos, Cobar, Dungog, Mudgee Sun Rise, and Scone Clubs.

The Committee were assisted with this project by Carol Coffey and Georgina Anderson who took care of submitting the completed Farmer Applications to RAWCS and Brian Coffey and Peter Comino who assisted the Committee with their extensive knowledge of the ongoing DCOP Project.

Sadly, despite widely advertising the program both local club level and at the District Level we were not able to use the 200 cards offered.

RAWCS had requested that we halt the program in December 2021 so that They would be able to consolidate funding and look at further options for this project.

The District Natural Disaster Relief Committee is now looking to encouraging Clubs in the District who experienced flooding in their areas prior to Christmas to reach out to local residents who have been affected by the floods to see if they would like some support from Rotary.

The Committee still has funds available to support resident affected by this flooding if necessary.

Looking back – moving forward ...

Rotary Day at the United Nations pushes peace from concept to reality

On the 99th anniversary of the end of World War I, more than 1,200 people gathered in Geneva, Switzerland, for Rotary Day at the United Nations.

Representing 87 countries, they convened on Saturday, 11 November 2017, at the Palais des Nations, originally the home of the League of Nations, and dedicated themselves to the theme introduced by Rotary President Ian H. S. Riseley: *"Peace: Making a Difference."*

Rotary International honoured six champions of peace at the United Nations on 11 November.

"The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace have always been among Rotary's primary goals," said Riseley. "It is past time for all of us to recognise the potential of all of our Rotary service to build peace, and approach that service with peacebuilding in mind." For the first time in its 13-year history, Rotary Day at the UN was held outside of New York.

Rotary Day concluded Geneva Peace Week, during which John Hewko, general secretary of Rotary International, noted the "close and longstanding ties between Rotary and the UN in (their) mutual pursuit of peace and international understanding."

Rotary members "can transform a concept like peace to a reality through service," said Ed Futa, Dean of the Rotary Representatives to the United Nations. "Peace needs to be lived rather than preached."

During a Rotary Day highlight, Hewko introduced Rotary's 2017 **People of Action: Champions of Peace**. He praised them as "an embodiment of the range and impact of our organisation's work," and saluted them for providing "a roadmap for what more peaceful, resilient societies look like."

Rotary honoured six individuals, who each made brief remarks. They were Rotary members or Rotary Peace Centres alumni who have done outstanding work for peace, professionally or as volunteers.

Later, the six honourees participated in workshops devoted to sustainability and peace, as well as a workshop on education, science, and peace designed by and for young leaders in which Rotaract members from around the world played a prominent role.

Dr. Michel Zaffran, the director of polio eradication at the World Health Organization, provided an update on efforts to eradicate polio. They noted the tremendous progress made by Rotary, WHO, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and other partners in eliminating 99 percent of all global incidences of polio.

Returning the focus to peace, Zaffran said: "This same international relationship (that's eradicating polio)," he said, "can be used to achieve world peace."

Zaffran was joined Her Excellency Mitsuko Shino, the deputy permanent representative of Japan to the international organizations in Geneva and co-chair of Global Polio Eradication Initiative's Polio Partners Group.

In his keynote address, Riseley made a similar observation. "The work of polio eradication, has taught us . . . that when you have enough people working together, when you understand the problems and the processes, when you combine and leverage your resources, when you set a plan and set your targets — you can indeed move mountains," he said. "And the need for action, and cooperation, is greater now than ever before."

have moved here with an enriched background from being members of other Rotary Districts, we want to know about the Rotarians who have


continued their membership for 50
