



Awarded to the Club which has had the best




This club is actively involved in a "Return and Earn" - bottle/ can recycling program. The club established a recycling program in conjunction with the caravan park in the local community. They have developed machinery, structures, and operational processes to collect and bag the bottles and cans. The bags are loaded onto a trailer and then taken by club members to Dubbo to the collection point. This is a 600klm round trip. This initiative earns the club many thousands of dollars and is a great environment program for the local area. The club implemented this program as soon as the "Return and Earn" became available - it has not only become a profitable project for the Club, but also a valuable project for the town in presentation and tidiness which is acknowledged by Council, shopkeepers, and many residents, earning the Rotary Club respect and awards. Funds earned are dispersed across a wide range of Club projects.

The project now involves mentoring and partnership with the local Girls Guides Association.

This club established the first Rota Kids program (a group of about 25 primary students) in the District through a partnership with St Catherine's Catholic College in Singleton.

The club members mentors the Rota Kids on a fortnightly basis.

This is an excellent partnership between the school and the local club in the promotion of youth volunteering for the wellbeing of the local community and beyond.

The Rota Kids have continued with the initiative of "Lids for Lilly" where the school and the Rotary club recycles plastic lids for the creation of prosthetic hands.

The students also engage in other initiatives within the school and community context.



# Lismore & Northern Rivers Project & Shirt Fundraiser

This is the story about a group that went to Lismore during the week commencing 14th May, and the idea that was put to the Rotary Club of Kurri Kurri to raise more funds for the Northern Rivers area.

Dennis Pitt, who runs Spectrum Sports Science, and Ross Osland came up with an idea that we should go up to the Northern Rivers area to donate much needed sporting goods and essentials to people affected in the area.

We received fantastic sponsorship from a large number of companies and individuals. We had a wish list of items for the schools that we would be visiting.

There were seven of us who travelled up on Saturday 14th May to Evans Head (the only place that had accommodation) – Dennis Pitt and his wife, Janine, Ross Osland,

Will Furber, Brian Foster, Vanessa Price, Hilary Tearle and Myself (Paul Hughes).

We attended several Sporting clubs in Lismore:

- · Lismore Little Athletics
- · Lismore Netball
- · Lismore Rugby League
- · Woodburn Soccer
- · Coraki Hockey Club, and
- · Evans Head Touch Football.

We also attended Schools in the area, some of which had been re-located because of the damage to their schools:-

- Evans Head K12 to High School
- Woodburn Catholic school, relocated to Evans Head Catholic Church

- Wardell Public School, relocated to Alstonville Public school
- Lismore South Public school, relocated to Goonellabah Public School
- · Lismore Public School
- · Coraki Catholic School
- · Coraki Public School
- Woodburn Public School
- Empire Vale School, relocated to Southern Cross Public at Ballina
- Broadwater Public School, relocated to Evans River High School.

Each school had been contacted before we went up and asked what gear they needed to bring a little bit of normality back into the school and, with the money that was donated by sponsors, we were able to fulfil their wishes! We also met with locals from around the towns and, hearing some of the stories, it is hard to fathom what they went through not once but twice!

Families that had to escape through the roof of their homes. People living in caravans and tents with no power or water. One lady that we spoke to was telling us that her house is now only the studs with tin on the roof – no walls or lining – and the water was 9 meters deep!

We gave microwaves, cooking utensils and electrical gear to people that had nothing except some clothes and a sleeping bag. The ladies made up small bags for every student with pens, hi-lighters, sunblock, hat and, of course, Freddo Frogs!

We did strapping courses, with the help from Maxiplast strapping, to all the sporting clubs that we attended. It was a truly long and rewarding 5 days.

On our return, Mr Steven Carpenter from *Hunter Valley Promotions* contacted the Rotary Club of Kurri Kurri and explained his idea of making shirts and selling them, with all the money coming through the Rotary Club of Kurri Kurri to be distributed up in the Northern Rivers, Lismore area. Steven was caught up in the Tsunami in the Philippines, losing members of his family, and this is why he wishes to help people in the Northern Rivers area.

He has obtained 20 sponsors to put in money to cover the costs of all the shirts and the shirts will be sold for \$50.00 each, with 100% of the money going to the project. Shirts should be here by the end of June.

# **Update On Regionalisation Pilot**



For the past three years a group of Rotarians and Rotaractors have been working on a pilot project to consider how we can enhance Rotary and Rotaract and ensure we remain relevant for the future while also addressing some of the challenges we have been facing for a while.

In February 2022, the Rotary International (RI) Board gave its approval in principle to proceed with the pilot, subject to approval by clubs. A second green light was the Council on Legislation approval for changes of governance in April 2022. We are now one of just two regional pilots in the Rotary world looking to explore, develop and test new ways of operating.

What are we seeking to achieve through regionalisation? We want to ensure the best support possible to Rotary clubs and Rotaract clubs. Through a less layered and more devolved contemporary approach members can continue to do what they do best – projects and connections/fellowship. We aim to reduce duplication and streamline processes, encourage even broader and more collaboration in areas such as public image, marketing Rotary, partnering with business, government and service partners, and make

leadership roles more attractive and doable.

To do this, we envisage a Regional Council for Zone 8 and Rotary Australia and Rotary New Zealand (Oceania) bodies to be formed. An Interim Regional Council with limited roles will likely start on 1 July 2023, with a final model in place by 1 July 2026. Monitoring and evaluating how the changes are delivering benefit are an important part of the project. We don't know yet exactly what the final model will look like and you will have your chance to have a say.

It is important that you, our fellow Rotarians, are consulted throughout this process.In fact, the project cannot proceed without the support of members and clubs.

The third green light needed to proceed is support of Rotary clubs and Rotaract clubs, a condition of the RI Board's approval. Support of clubs will be shown through a vote, which will happen in September 2022, with a vote first of clubs then of districts.

From mid-June right through to August 2022, every club and member will have the chance to hear about what is proposed, to have their say and to ask questions. Each district has a District Regionalisation Representative who is coordinating the briefing of clubs.

Being a pilot gives us the chance to shape our own Rotary and Rotaract futures.

Dear Presidents.

As we are coming towards the end of another Rotary year, I am sure many of you are thinking about your donations to the many Rotary causes who are all in need of funds. District 9670 is well represented with both the ROMAC Medical Director and the Eastern Region ROMAC Chair.

ROMAC is certainly one of those causes and as such I would be delighted if you could consider ROMAC in your end of year financial giving.

ROMAC is a wholly voluntary organisation and as such we are totally reliant on donated funds for our work. We are very grateful that the surgeons, nurses and allied health staff give their time pro bono but we need to reimburse the hospitals, manage transport, visas and incidentals when the patient and his or her carer are in Australia or New Zealand. Accommodation is often managed by the host clubs but occasionally we require public accommodation for our carers whilst the child is in hospital.

I know many Rotarians are great supporters of ROMAC and this note is an aide memoire to emphasise the need for funding so as to continue with our important work.

Over the last couple of years we have not been able to have any children in Australia or New Zealand for treatment as a result of Covid 19 but we do have a waiting list and are hoping that we will be able to start accepting the children before too long.
