A very big THANK YOU to all the Clubs who were represented at the Conference Resolutions Zoom Meeting on Wednesday 20th April. This was an historic event which has allowed our District to now proceed with finalising the establishment of the 2 companies with limited guarantee to manage our 3 Trust accounts into the future: The Margaret Illukol Company Limited, plus the Algie and Thorkilgaard Youth Company Limited (for both the Lotte Thorkilgaard

Trust and the John Algie Youth Trust). The motions were all accepted by those present, so we can now move to the final stages for company set up with applications also for charitable status and deductible gift receipt status.

As a consequence of the voting this last week, you will have already received the email application for Clubs (the Members of our District) to complete and become members of each of the 2 companies. The \$10 guarantee per Club, per company (so \$20 all up to be a member of both) will be paid by District once the application is returned to me, up until late June this year. Any applications made after 30th June (and into the future) will have to be paid by Clubs, as we will not have access to any D9670 specific money after that date. So please, if your Club would like to become a member shareholder in

either or both companies, complete the forms and return to me ASAP.

IPDG David and I have had some eniovable Club visits over the last month, enjoying good fellowship and friendship, as well as interesting questions and discussion. Early April, we enjoyed the Merriwa Skate Park Complex meeting - a 5 stage project that was a concept in the early 2000's, now finally completed. Rotary Youth Leadership Awards

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is back for the final time for District 9670.

RYLA is for 18–25-year-olds who want to develop their professional skills, such as public speaking, as well as goal-setting, visioning, finances, and mindfulness/mental health. It will be a mixture of theory, as well as hands-on learning.

RYLA will once again be held as a three-day camp on 16-19 June 2022 at Tocal. However, there is a difference this time, with a series of short webinars being held at night, the week after the event, as we can't fit in everything that we want to achieve in the three days.

Registrations being released in the next few days, but spaces are limited

to 20, so you will have to be quick. Clubs will be asked to sponsor the participant, and the participant will also be required to make a small contribution to the program.

The 36 participating schools were keen to get back to evaluating their skills in the STEMM area with encouragement from their dedicated teachers. Due to COVID-19 concerns. we lost four schools this year from our usual full house of forty.



Upper Hunter Project Report

Rotary Clubs of Scone, Muswellbrook, Merriwa and Denman

Some young people from local high schools in the Upper Hunter approached Rotary for assistance with a project.

Students wanted to support five small schools, in the Northern Rivers area, that had not received as much support due to their location after the floods.

The schools include: Blakebrook Public School, Tuntable Creek PS, The Channon PS, Whian Whian PS and Nimbin Central School.

They contacted teachers and obtained a list of things that the 100 students who attend the schools might need in the future. They advertised it to their peers within their schools and collected a large number of the suggested items.

The four Rotary clubs, including Scone, Muswellbrook, Merriwa and Denman have collected them from the schools and will transport them for distribution to the Northern Rivers early in Term 4.

The reason it is so much later than most people would anticipate, is that the students have not been in their own schools and some not in their homes for all of this time.

It is hoped that they might get back to some kind of "normal" soon so we can support them.

This project may continue into the future as the young people would like to "adopt" the five small schools.

It was an excellent joint effort to bring to fruition and great that the young people thought to approach Rotary for assistance.







Zone 8 Pilot Initiative – Regionalization

Since my last report, significant events have occurred to progress this Zone 8 Pilot Initiative. The RI Board has given in principle approval for this Zone 8 Pilot to progress and the Council of Legislation approved in April — "to provide for the administration of clubs in a pilot project".

The following is an extract taken from the Council on Legislation summary of the Resolution:

Club Administration Pilot:

Duane Benton, a member of the Rotary Club of Kansas City and a federal judge, who co-chaired this year's Council, characterized multiple items at this Council as part of Rotary's continued commitment to improving club and organizational flexibility.

An enactment that generated vigorous discussion before passing by a vote of 324 to 150 would allow the RI Board to pilot a new regional governance structure for clubs and Rotarians.

The pilot will be limited to Rotary Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI) as well as clubs and districts in Australia, New Zealand, and the South Pacific for a duration of six years.

Cosponsors of the legislation – the RI Board and the Rotary Club of Merimbula (District 9705) in Australia – stated that the current regional governance structure, put in place over 70 years ago, has grown into a "significant hierarchy" with too many layers and roles.

"It is appropriate to modernize and consider new models that can enhance our efficiency, increase the ability of members to access support, and look at new ways to make volunteer positions more manageable and doable," said Wafer, who spoke on behalf of the RI board.

Representatives who opposed the enactment argued that the plan for the pilot lacks specifics and could reduce the number of districts and put a district governor's role at risk. One representative from District 3490 (Taiwan) expressed concern that the plan could alter the autonomous structure of Rotary clubs, leading to centralized governance and decreasing localized management.

Wafer, reassured Rotarians that the districts and the role of district governors will not be eliminated while the pilot is being implemented. Following a six-year experiment, she said if the findings indicate that the existing model needs to be reverted, the role of district governors will still exist.

"This is not to force fit a new governance structure," Wafer added. "Rather, we try to work in partnership with districts to see what works and what doesn't for a more sustainable future."

Very soon clubs will be briefed on this proposal, and it is important to note that clubs within Zone 8 will be asked

to vote if they wish to be part of a Pilot Initiative.

The proposal does not extinguish Districts and DGs but will move some of the administrative/structural roles and responsibilities to a centralized body.

Clubs will be asked to vote either in August or September if they wish to participate in this Pilot Initiative. The electronic vote will be conducted by RISSPO and requires an acceptance of 66% of the total number of ALL clubs in a District to be in favour of the initiative.

I would like to stress failure to vote will be a NO vote. This vote is extremely important to moving Rotary forward in our Zone.

The Four Rotary Clubs in Dubbo also supported Macquarie Home Stay by collaborating and working together (with other interested community organisations) to create a relaxing, tranquil, garden for the guests, where they can sit with a drink or be with others in a private setting. There was turf laid, a lavender labyrinth, and a memorial rose garden. This is part of the areas, which also included a playground for the children, that was funded by the Rotary Clubs in Dubbo.

It was great to have the four clubs combine for a common cause.

Cobar Rotary Club is still receiving excellent revenue for their can collection and depositing at the Dubbo bulk Return and Earn Centre. This is a great little fundraiser for the club, which is helping the environment and creating awareness about Rotary for the community.

Wellington Rotary Club has continued with their successful Markets and even had the Easter Bunny making an appearance in April.

The Wellington Rotary Club also had a busy Easter by providing lunch for the Morris Registers of Australia as they passed through their town as part of a national rally.
