A Conversation from "the other half"

Hello everyone! It is with pleasure that I make my first contribution to DG David's "Roach Rattlings" Newsletter.

It has been wonderful to interact with so many of you by Zoom or phone over the last few weeks since David took office. Having conversations across our District and communities is such a vital element during this tricky time in world history.

A few things on my mind:

 Please don't forget the coffers are still open for any Clubs or individuals to contribute to Sue Hooper's Partner Project in 2019-2020 which is *Integra* Service Dogs Australia. It was such a disappointment for Sue that COVID19 interrupted her fundraising for such a worthwhile project to support a member or the armed services or emergency service with an assistance dog to make their life more secure and meaningful. This project will run through until the end of Conference in March 2021, so look into club or personal finances to see if there is a little to spare to boost the outcomes we'd like to reach. (Information on how you can donate)

- Speaking of finances and fundraising – everyone is struggling with new ways to make this happen with our current circumstances. Many clubs are wondering how their usual practice will be able to endure, how communities and projects will be supported during a time when our normal practice with big fundraising events and classic BBQs are "off the table" with current Health restrictions and safe practices.
- If and when we get back to more normality, there are so many worthwhile

projects you usually support which will be grateful for anything received, as well as the customary Rotary programs we passionately assist such as The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund, End Polio Now, RAWCS, ROMAC, Rotarians Against Malaria and those new in the spotlight due to our Centenary Project support such as Every Child a Future (joint Australia/New Zealand immunisation across the Oceania region) and End Trachoma — so important for our indigenous communities.

- Look outside the square and see if projects such as tree planting for Dr Jane Goodall's Trillion Trees project, mentoring young people (this can be done by phone and Zoom), calling the elderly on a regular basis, distributing hampers for an NGO or non-profit, providing Bingo via Zoom to an aged care facility there are so many opportunities available!
- Most importantly, examine ways of supporting your Club members first, then your local communities for whom

you provide vital assistance; then look more broadly to at least one national or international project to support. Remember – you can't do what you were doing before the world changed due to the pandemic – but our Clubs and members CAN work to scale to provide meaningful support which will also satisfy our desire to serve. We are all Rotary people wanting to actively do good in the world!

An undertaking I have to mention in preparation for the 2022 District Conference (which will be the last for D9670) is our **Club history project**. We Rotarians are not necessarily great at keeping good records of the wonderful activities and opportunities for service that have happened in our individual Clubs, and as a District. An important aim I have for the last D9670 Conference is to showcase all of the wonderful events, responses and service that has occurred in each Club since their inception. You are all getting plenty of notice about this, because I reckon it will

take some considerable time to collect and put together a PowerPoint or display of some kind to demonstrate your Club's response to the needs of community – here and across the world – to be held in perpetuity in a Cloud and hopefully on a social platform such as Facebook for historical purposes, but also as a reference point for others into the future.

Can I ask that each Club please consider appointing an Historian or team to work on this over the next 18 months? There will be more information roll out over this time.

The flexibility that this style of Club offers shows how our District is opening opportunities for more members of our communities.



Max Humphries, Rotary Club of Cobar

The Rotary Club of Cobar NSW has suffered the loss of its last Charter member, Max Humphries, PHF, PP, who died at Cobar on 17 May 2020 aged 91 years. He was known locally as 'Mister Rotary' and was a member of his Club when he passed away.

As an eight year old boy, he was sent from Sydney to live with an uncle on the land, near Moree, on doctor's advice, as he suffered from asthma and needed clean country air to survive. At the tender age of 12, he became a shepherd and later a jackaroo, then a stockman in the Moree area. A mate invited Max to drive with him to Cobar to look at a Motor Garage business for sale and Max soon became part owner of Cobar Motors and GMH dealership. He married Noeline and they remained at Cobar for the rest of their lives.

A charter Member of Cobar Rotary Club in 1996, Max continued as an active member until about 2016 when he and Noeline entered Cobar's aged care facility.

Sadly, at a Rotary function at Nyngan in 1972, they lost their two year old daughter, Maxine, by drowning in the Bogan River.

Max and Noeline raised Noeline's daughter Marea at Cobar and had the enjoyment of her, her husband and children.

He was President in 1968/69 and, for years, carried on as Club Secretary and toted the battered old Secretary's bag to more meetings than most people attend in a lifetime. He was instrumental in the establishment. by Cobar Rotary, of the Bill Brennan Centre which continues to provide residential flats to locals and served on its committee for many years. He worked on Rotary activities, helping MOW, barbeques, Show gates, local functions and activities and could be counted on at all times. For Rotary and mostly alone, he manned the Cobar Rugby Union gates before the match and cooked the barbeque during the match. He truly earned his reputation as 'Mister Rotary' in Cobar.

He was a keen bowler and served on the Committee of the Cobar Bowling and Golf Club and was the longest serving President of that Club.

Max was an excellent photographer and many of his works still adorn local premises.

Noeline was a superb caterer and did meals for Changeovers and other Rotary activities and every President knew the Club expected that Noeline be invited to bake the Club's birthday cake in February.

She passed away in November 2019, richly remembered for her contribution to her husband's beloved Cobar Rotary. Max and Noeline are buried alongside Maxine.

The pandemic prevented Cobar from giving Max a fitting funeral. Rotary and Cobar Bowling and Golf Club formed a guard of honour at the gates of the cemetery. Suitable commemorations will come in due course.
