Introduction

Vocational Service:

Through Vocational Service we:

- 1. Serve Others by using our unique skills to address community needs
- 2. Empower others through training and skill development
- 3. Inspire Others to act with integrity by following Rotary's guiding principles.

Establishing and/or participating in Vocational Visits enables Clubs to meet the first and second aspect of Vocational Service:

(1) Serve Others by using our unique skills to address community needs and (2) Empowering others through training and skill development.

Overview

Background

 Vocational Visits are a long-standing Vocational activity across many Clubs around the world. They are an excellent opportunity to further members vocational development/knowledge, find out more about the operation and contribution of local businesses to the community, explore new opportunities for service, enhance the Rotary experience and engage in Fellowship.

Objectives

- To expand members' knowledge about local business and community activities.
- To stimulate discussion and ideas about new opportunities for community service and possible partnerships with local business.
- Create awareness about businesses and organisation that are making a valuable contribution to the local community.

General Approach

- Clubs approach local businesses, organisations or community groups to arrange a visit for members to their premises to learn more about their role and operations in the community.
- Personal contacts between Rotarians or friends of Rotarians and the owner or an employee of the business can be beneficial when organizing a visit.

Visits

- Most visits are conducted late afternoon or early evening.
- Visits usually last about an hour. Clubs conduct between 2 and 6 visits per year.
- Members and partners are generally invited to attend the visit.
- Some Clubs also involve other community groups on the visit such as local school students to expand the students' vocational knowledge and awareness of local job opportunities.
- Some visits are followed up with an opportunity for the owner or an employee/s of the business to attend a Rotary meeting as a guest speaker, furthering the partnership/relationship with the Club and its members.
- Clubs may also extend an invitation to the business to attend the D9800 Business Partnership Breakfasts hosted by the DG throughout the year. Details of these breakfasts are found on the District website and in Networker.

Fellowship

- Following the visits many Clubs organize a dinner at a local restaurant to which the owner and or employees of the business are also invited. (All attendees pay for their own meal).
- As well as an opportunity for Fellowship this can be a great opportunity to discuss in more detail aspects of the visit and possible opportunities for Rotary and the business to work together in the future.

Cost

 This is a low cost activity for Members. The only out of pocket expense is for the meal following the visit to the local business.
