Ambulance Victoria Gets Involved

The pilot program of a new Ambulance Victoria Leaders Mentoring Program is well underway. We have 10 mentees in the program spread across the state, mainly in rural locations and like the VPLMP, 4 Rotary districts are involved. Whilst it is based on the successful VPLMP model, the pilot Ambulance program is different. Ambulance members obviously have a more specialised role, and their interaction with communities reflects that. But AV is keen to build stronger community linkages and to develop a more innovative culture, and that's where our mentoring will add value. AV has committed to the program for 2019/20 with upto 15 mentees drawn from both operational and corporate sectors and so we will be looking for Rotary mentors in early 2019.

Be Collective Replaces "Skillsbank"

We have had a project called "Skillsbank" on the books for a couple of years, but it's a misleading name, which we will drop. We have selected the Be Collective platform which is available free to clubs, clusters and perhaps district for managing volunteers for service projects, including non-Rotarians. The Assistant Governors have been briefed and several clubs are now evaluating Be Collective. Marjorie Gerlinger, Immediate Past District Secretary, has taken on the challenge of helping willing clubs get up to speed. Be Collective technical staff are readily available to help.

It is very flexible ranging from one to three months and is not necessarily reciprocal between Districts. Whilst our first exchange was in the music field, we are looking for candidates who would like to volunteer as an intern in their chosen profession overseas in 2019 with a strong focus on service to the host community.
