

MEL OPIE –1860'S A FAMILY DIASPORA TO LYTTLETON & BEYOND

What started out as quip to the Larkins soon became a heartfelt and well researched introduction into the family history of one of our own, Mel Opie.

The years Mel held centre stage in front of a class room soon became apparent as Mel led us through some one hundred and fifty years of the Opie diaspora. Mel so wondrously demonstrated how far presentation technology has moved on since those days.

Mel started his search into the roots of his family in 2005 it was 3 years later in 2008 Mel first shared his research and three years later that we to were able to see first-hand the culmination of his efforts

Determined not to use the big genealogy web sites and rely instead on his own abilities to dig out from the world wide web the names, places and dates of his kin. Mel describing this challenge as a cryptic crossword. Made perhaps more simple as Opie is not a common surname, but not easy. Names change, spelling changes, written records are often illegible after years of poor storage. Birth certificates were frequently not issued and it's the christening where the first written record was made. Many of the old parish documents have not yet found their way into the public domain where they are in the great genealogy hunt the essential marriage and death records.





So setting up his own template Mel was able to create a diorama of the Opie journey, starting out from the shores of the homeland in 1860 facing a five month perilous sea journey. The cost of steerage passage was £13.6s each or \$3200.00 in 2021. By Mel's account not an altogether pleasant journey with bedding infested with lice and other vermin, the ships rife with rats and plagues. Infant mortality was high on such ventures, reaching as high as 20% in some age groups, surprisingly many of those on board believed themselves to be better fed on board than they were back home. From the docks of Lyttelton the ancestors of Mel dispersed throughout the Canterbury region applying their skills of trade before the one we know as Melville settled here in Christchurch.

Mel's dissertation started with the reference to Bradley Walsh and the Larkin family and finished with the question answered "Who do you think you are?"
