Visit to Cashmere Rotary

It is always a pleasure to hear a fellow member present a talk about their history and their work. It expands ones knowledge of them. Tonight was no exception. Out of Africa was the title of our newest member, Geoff Bailey's address.

Geoff was born 1951, raised and educated in Cape Town, South Africa, which he described as having a Mediterranean climate. He said to know Southern Africa one must understand the history and he told us of the earliest appearance of man with the Hottentots, Bushmen and other indigenous peoples.

Cape Town was settled in 1650 first by the Dutch who established refreshment stations for their ships plying trade to and from the Dutch East Indies. The British settled there in 1700 forcing the Dutch to migrate North via the many famous



treks to get away from the British. It is now one of the three capital cities serving as the seat of Parliament of the Republic.of South Africa.

Geoff talked with love of the country - its birds, animals and wildlife parks. He showed us their position on a map, Kruger (the size of Belgium), Kalahari and others. He showed us pictures of some of the animals roaming the vast parks cheetahs, giraffes, jackals, and oryx (a large antelope species).

Geoff has two sisters still living in South Africa. He was educated in a co-ed high school similar to Cashmere High School and graduated with a Masters degree in Chemistry from the University of Cape Town. He was heading th Texas USA to undertake a PhD but changed direction and completed an MBA (by correspondence) from the University of South Africa.

At this stage he was married to Jeanie who was completing her PhD in Marine Biology. Geoff was in charge of Research for South Africa's Physical and Chemical Oceanography interfacing with the Fishing Industry and supporting the management of South Africa fisheries.

He showed pictures of a large 76 metre fishing vessel which assessed the biomass of fish to set the quotas for fishing and an icebreaker which took him to the Research station in Antarctica.

In 2003 Jeanie was headhunted by New Zealand's NIWA to carry out research into NZ's green lipped mussel and the family emigrated to New Zealand. After settling in Christchurch, Geoff now in his 50's went back to university, at Lincoln completing a post grad. diploma in soil, plant and animal science and went on to work on a dairy farm in Dunsandel. Geoff is now retired but enjoys driving for Uber.

Jeanie and Geoff have three grown up children. A son who is a graduate of the University of Canterbury's Engineering School, a daughter who graduated as a nurse from University of Otago and younger son who is a builder in Christchurch.

Geoff says he is grateful for the family's new life here in New Zealand - the opportunities and education the family have had could never been attained to the same extent in South Africa.

I believe we will be enthralled with more stories from Geoff in the future.
