

Rotary and the United Nations have a shared history of working toward peace and addressing humanitarian issues around the world.

Across Australia Rotary offers this two-day programme for Year 11 students. MUNA simulates sessions of the General Assembly of the United Nations (UN). MUNA encourages young people to learn about other countries and appreciate the inner workings of the UN. This Youth Service Program falls under the Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resoluton Area of Focus.



A team of two students is allocated a member country of the UN. They are required to investigate that country and represent its views as they debate a range of selected resolutions. They also are asked to dress to represent their country's national costume.

The resolutions to be debated are based on some debated in fact by the UN as well as some proposed by the teams. The debates reproduce genuine UN debates, often with a fine flow of rhetoric, points of order, motions of dissent and bloc walkouts! If you are looking for some fun exercise, volunteer to be a runner. You will be kept busy as notes are sent from one "country" to another, trying to do a deal.



Teams must stand and wait to be acknowledged by the Secretary General. Once acknowledged the first words are "Mr / Ms Secretary General, we the delegates of (name of country) wish to (ask for a bloc meeting, propose a variation to a resolution ...)



Fortunately, we don't have to reinvent the wheel thanks to DGE 9810 Daryl Moran. I have a full set of notes with suggestions regarding timelines and checklist, which can be tailored to suit us.

PROPOSED TIMING	
May & June	Form MUNA Committee
Early July	Contact clubs to gauge interest and support
August	Find venue
September	Researching and drafting of resolutions to be debated
October	Drafting of information sheets for schools / clubs / parents / parents' consent
Mid-January	Finalise paperwork Notice to clubs advising dates / costings
7 February 2022	Clubs to approach local high school for participants – Year 11 or 10^* – for program to be held in 7 & 8 May
28 February	Applications open Clubs and schools invited to contact schools to seek a team of two and nominate the team to MUNA Committee
25 March	Applications close
28 March	All documentation to be sent to school / parents for completion and signature along with publication of resolutions to be debated
7 & 8 May	MUNA
	*Year 10 students need to show maturity and high-level of debating skills.

Given that this is a new program to the district, I propose we hold a pilot program with **two or three** areas (14-21 teams) which would help the committee form a better idea of timelines for future programs.
