





Donations In Kind (DIK) is the program whereby Rotarians and Rotary Clubs source surplus goods and products within Australia that have no further use here. However, these goods are often invaluable to those in needy countries and/ or can be used to support Rotary projects in developing countries.

Goods include medical, dental and hospital equipment, computers, books, toys and school furniture. In SA the goods are stored on a temporary basis at the warehouse facility in Edinburgh where they are checked, sorted and cleaned prior to shipment.

It provides Rotarians, the Public and Corporate Sector with the chance to make a meaningful difference to the lives of people who need our help.

KI BUSHFIRE RECOVERY STORY—CAN YOU HELP?

A Kangaroo Island local in conjunction with Stormbird press seeks support to publish and distribute a book Letting the Summer Go that will assist children dealing with the aftermath of bushfires.

What the book is about:

Letting the Summer Go is born of the deep artistic talent of another Kangaroo Island children's author, Alice Teasdale, who is also from within the island's burn scar (Wisanger) and published by Stormbird Press, the publishing house and brainchild of Margi and Geoff Prideaux (from Gosse) who lost everything in the Black Summer fires. This second fire children's book, after Evie and the Bushfire by Stokes Bay local Becky Westbrook, similarly draws on the experience from within the fire's traumascape, both of Alice's personal experience and that of her friends, charting the story of one family with a young child who lost everything. The child learns about letting the pain go, and that renewal will happen.

The benefits expected to achieve from the book (specifically for children):

Where their first book, *Evie and the Bushfire*, focuses on the immediate aftermath of the fire, this second book, *Letting the Summer Go*, targets loss and renewal over the extended period of recovery.

This book is aiming to support children on the island and across Australia, in fire-affected regions, throughout their long-term fire recovery and assist with their trauma-related mental health recovery as well.

Giving children books that will reflect a deep understanding of their feelings will help them accept that their 'little' feelings are valid to be 'big' and nothing to be ashamed or scared of. The book normalises and creates acceptance around a long recovery journey rather than the child thinking they 'should be ok or over it by now.'

The plan for the launch:

Stormbird Press is a not-for-profit publishing house that intends to publish *Letting the Summer Go* in October 2022, in time for both Christmas and the 2022/23 bushfire season.

The launch is a community-wide invitation to all Kangaroo Island children and their families to learn about book writing and illustrating, learning from and with the author herself, Alice Teasdale, and the illustrator.

Here we can be together as a community to work through post-traumatic experiences and their healing journey, with the children, whilst creatively influencing and inspiring them towards a positive future.

In 1999, Geoff Bailey a member of the Rotary Club of Mitcham, floated the idea with his fellow club members to create a Scholarship Program that would support Indigenous Medical Students through their medical studies to become doctors and then be able support and improve the health of their own people.

Geoff had worked around indigenous people as a pharmacist in Pt Augusta and was acutely aware that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders do not benefit from mainstream health services to the same extent as other Australians for the following reasons:

- Health services are not accessible to many, and particularly in remote, Aboriginal communities.
- Mainstream health services often lack cultural sensitivity and remain unwelcoming places for many Indigenous peoples. The Indigenous health workforce remains disproportionately low when compared to the number of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders that make up the Australian population.

There was no more startling statistic at the time to realize that of the 64,000 qualified medical practitioners in Australia, only 40 were of indigenous descent.

To begin to remedy this, a partnership with the then Minister for Human Services in SA - the Honorable Dean Brown and SA Rotary clubs was formulated and the first 2 medical students of an Indigenous Health Scholarship Program were sponsored in 2000. Australian Rotary Health became involved in 2003 and expanded the Scholarship program nationally and widened the scope to include a range of allied health professions including nursing and midwifery.

Today, SA Health continues to offer the Aboriginal Health Scholarship Program in partnership with SA Rotary clubs through Australian Rotary Health. The program has increased the number of professionally qualified Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people working in the South Australian health sector . The partnership with SA Health and Rotary is in its 22nd year of operation and provides up to \$5,000 per year for full time study (\$2,500 for part-time study) for each recipient. Rotary clubs and its sponsors contribute half of the scholarship amount. (eg \$2,500 for full-time student)



Applications for the 2022 scholarships are now open until 28 February 2022.

Do you need a speaker for your club meeting?

Or are you looking for a great fun and an excellent way to get a group of Rotarians together for a meaningful cause and a day of community connection?

My name is Hilary Carruthers and I am the Assembly Day Coordinator for the <u>Birthing Kit Foundation Australia-</u> <u>BKFA</u>. We work in partnership with the Australian Community and a number of Global Organisations to pack and supply Clean Birth Kits to pregnant women living in rural communities and low-resource settings around the world.

We have recently had a few Rotary Clubs around Australia hold assembly days. An Assembly Day is when volunteers gather to bring the clean birth kits together from the component parts. The supplies arrive in bulk and volunteers assemble them into separate birthing kits, with every kit packed helping to build a better world for women.

Each kit contains 6 disposable components:

- SOAP to wash the birth attendant's hands and the mother's perineum.
- **PLASTIC SHEET** to prevent the mother and newborn coming into contact with the ground or an unhygienic surface.
- GLOVES to cover the birth attendant's hands and provide protection from infections such as HIV for carers and care recipients.



- GAUZE to wipe clear the newborn baby's eyes, and to clean the mother's perineum prior to giving birth.
- **CORD TIES** to cleanly tie the umbilical cord.
- A STERILE BLADE to cut the umbilical cord and reduce risk of newborn tetanus and infection.

We would like to extend this opportunity to as many Rotary Clubs as possible, as we have had great positive feedback from your members. Here is a comment from Phil Smith after he organised an assembly day for the Rotary Club of St Peter's in Adelaide.

"The assembly of the kits took a little over an hour It was lots of fun & judging by the chatter everyone really enjoyed the event. Hands-on events are a great tonic for a Rotary Club."

If you are having a meeting, we are happy to provide a speaker from the board of BKFA.

If you want more information on holding an assembly day, we suggest that you read the <u>Assembly Day Manual</u> which contains everything you need to know. It is a great concept for an end of year celebration/Christmas gathering.
