Falls Among Older Adults: The Silent Daily Crisis



To help call for national action on falls prevention, the Rotary Falls Prevention Project has helped to form the recently launched Falls Prevention Alliance Australia. The Alliance has become a Partner in Service with Rotary South Pacific. In compliment with the Rotary Falls Prevention Project, the Alliance is calling on Rotarians and Rotaractors to become a member of the Alliance and join in its work. Every 2.5 minutes an older person presents to an emergency department because of a fall

The science is clear – many falls are preventable. Just as campaigns for seatbelt use or sun safety have saved lives, simple, proven strategies can make a difference:

- Strength and balance exercises
- Safer home environments (good lighting, removing trip hazards)
- Community awareness and education

Experts believe that with the right investment, including a mass media campaign, a third of falls could be prevented within 12 months. That's a huge potential win for public health.

The Rotary South Pacific Falls Prevention Project has been developed in response to this.

The Project team are preparing a comprehensive toolkit to equip Rotary Clubs and community groups with resources to call for a mass media campaign and to share the falls prevention message in their communities. It will include:

- A dedicated website
- Educational videos and flyers
- Guest speakers for awareness campaigns
- Clear steps for local action

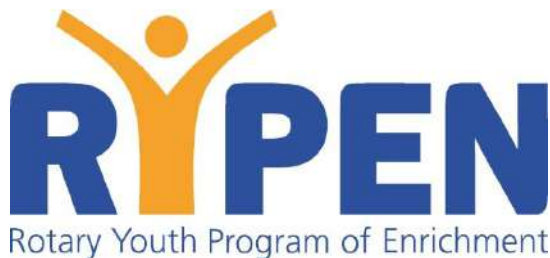

Position Description

A requirement for this position is to have a current Working With Children check and submit a Rotary Volunteer Declaration form to the District Protection Officer for verification.

The role involves monitoring and processing the online applications received via the RYLA9510.org website.

Attend the monthly committee meeting in person or via zoom and report on progress of applications.

Duties include:

- Acknowledging the receipt of each application and checking against the criteria for the program (i.e. age, location)
- To engage with the applicant to collect extra details via email/text/etc.
- Create an applicant details form to be forwarded to a potential sponsor club.
- To find a suitable Rotary Club to sponsor the applicant and liaise for the club to interview them.
- Advise applicants of the results.
- Follow up successful applicants to complete their health and dietary information sheets.
- To supply the program leadership team with applicant information for them to take over engagement with the applicant.
- Attending the first day of program to manage registrations and follow up any non attendees.

Every Rotary Member Has a Story

Behind every membership number is a personal journey — of service, change and connection.

Every Rotarian has a beginning story.

Someone invited them to a meeting.

They attended a project.

They met people who shared their desire to make a difference.

Membership numbers are often discussed across the district, but behind every number is a story like that.

This year in District 9510 we have welcomed over 100 new members into Rotary, while overall membership has moved from 1,773 members at the start of the Rotary year to 1,758 today — a net change of 15 members.

At first glance, a small decline can attract attention. But when we look more closely, the story becomes clearer.

Many of the changes in our membership reflect the natural rhythms of life. So far this year, 21 Rotarians across the district have sadly passed away, leaving behind decades of service, leadership and fellowship within their clubs and communities.

Looking at the longer-term picture reinforces this pattern. Between 2020 and 2025, District 9510 recorded 1,326 membership departures, including 97 Rotarians who passed away and 143 who relocated to another area.

Relocation in particular tells an important story.

When someone moves, they often leave their Rotary club — but that doesn't mean they need to leave Rotary.

For many members, this moment becomes what might be called a “sliding doors moment” in their Rotary journey.

One door closes — but another can open.

With a simple introduction between clubs, a member who might otherwise drift away from Rotary can instead find a new club, new friendships and new opportunities to serve in their new community.

Because when someone leaves a club, it doesn't have to mean they leave Rotary.

Another insight from the data is that sometimes we simply don't know why members leave.

A number of departures are recorded as “None Given.” Wherever possible, it helps clubs to record the reason when a member moves on. Understanding these reasons helps clubs strengthen the Rotary experience and respond to the changing realities of modern volunteering.

Rotary has always reflected the changing stages of people's lives — new members joining, long-serving members completing remarkable journeys of service, and others relocating and continuing their Rotary story elsewhere.

Membership is not simply about numbers.

It is about people, connections and continuity.

Every new Rotarian brings fresh ideas, fresh energy and new opportunities to serve. Every invitation, every conversation and every introduction to another club helps keep that story moving forward.

And I can see that across District 9510, that story continues to unfold — one member, one connection and one opportunity to serve at a time.

A Love Letter to the Unite for Good Summit from PRIP Jennifer Jones

From Nick & Jen, with full hearts

To everyone who shaped this unforgettable weekend—thank you. What we experienced together at the Unite for Good Summit in Horsham was more than a program, more than a gathering. It was a living, breathing reminder of what humanity can be when kindness, courage, and community take centre stage.

From the moment we stepped into Town Hall for the welcome and mix-and-mingle, the tone was set. The room was alive—vibrant flags of Rotary Youth Exchange draped across the space, each one a story, a culture, a young life touched by service. It felt like the world had gathered in one room.

Robyn, our brilliant Master of Ceremonies, guided us with humour, charm, and effortless professionalism. She held the threads of the weekend together with grace.

Then came Marc—the beautiful bogan with a heart as wide as the outback. He made us laugh, then made us think, then made us feel. His message on mental health, wrapped in comedy and honesty, landed deeply.

“I love being human and being able to make mistakes.”

A line that will stay with us.

The Accidental High Notes followed, gifting us the haunting harmony of The Sound of Silence—a perfect metaphor after Marc’s raw vulnerability. A moment of stillness, reflection, and shared breath.

Dr. Luke took us into the world of epigenetics, reminding us that even our genes respond to the stories we live and the environments we create.

Wayne opened his heart and let us in. His story of his son Mac, and the creation of “Smack Talk,” was a powerful call to action for families navigating struggle.

“Mental fitness needs to be every day.”

A truth we all needed to hear.

Then the room erupted with energy as we refused to “sit in silence,” dancing together to Australia’s unofficial anthem. A moment of pure joy.

We celebrated Bendigo bike riders who raised over \$82,000 for cancer—proof that uniting for good and determination can ripple outward in extraordinary ways.

Local project videos reminded us that impact begins at home—from dog parks to community spaces that bring people together.

We honoured our Emergency Community Award recipients—quiet heroes who rarely seek the spotlight.

Mahir shared what it feels like to be on the receiving end of Rotary’s magic. Arriving as a refugee, now a CEO with RAWCS—his story was a testament to what happens when compassion meets opportunity.

Phillipa spoke bravely about complex trauma and the challenges facing Australian men.

A scholarship funded by a cycling ride—another example of generosity in motion—helped make her work possible.

Peter walked us through the life-changing work of ShelterBox.

Misha, CEO of Interplast, shared the story of Pasilio in Tonga and the power of training local medical teams to transform entire communities.

Sam from Beyond Bank reminded us why aligned values matter.
And yes—love to our sponsor, Love a Duck.

Peace Fellow Olivia asked the question humanity has wrestled with forever:
Why do people fight each other?
Her stories—from missing boots to frontline realities—were a sobering reminder of the work still ahead.

Along with Jessie, Dennis, we encouraged us to use the Rotary Foundation boldly, to amplify our impact and dream bigger.

Gary taught us that learning from each other is essential—bushfires don't recognise borders, whether between Portugal and Australia.

Saturday morning's polio walk grounded us in purpose.

Then with polio in her heart, Jessie took us this morning to Everest Base Camp—an epic journey of relentless uphill steps, mirroring the perseverance required in service.

Fleur talked of ripples across oceans which now has water now flowing within Burma.

And finally, Captain David shared how an ordinary grass fire turned to a catastrophic disaster in Natimuk. A compelling and powerful account of the power of community coming together.

To those behind the scenes - please know you are remarkable!

And finally, the three amigos—our fearless organisers—Peter, Christine and Rajeev--pulled off a summit that was nothing short of brilliant. Hats off to each of them. Their vision, dedication, and heart made this weekend possible.

So,

To everyone who spoke, sang, danced, shared, listened, laughed, cried, and connected—thank you.

You reminded us why we show up.

Why we serve.

Why we believe in Rotary.

Why we believe in each other.

Applications for 2027-28 **Rotary Peace Fellowships** are now open and will be accepted until 15 May 2026.

This year, Rotary will award up to 170 funded fellowships for experienced peacebuilders to study at one of Rotary's eight university-based peace centres around the world.

The Rotary Foundation partners with universities in England, Sweden, Japan, the United States and Queensland to offer master's degrees and with universities in Uganda, Türkiye, and India to provide professional development certificates in disciplines related to peace and development. The Rotary Foundation pays for tuition and fees, housing and meals, round-trip transportation, and internship and field-study expenses.

Clubs and members have the power to shape the next generation of peace leaders both by recruiting and recommending peace fellows, and by keeping them engaged during and after their fellowships.

Clubs and districts do not need to provide funding to recommend fellowship candidates. Since the Rotary Peace Centres program began in 2002, more than 1,800 fellows have graduated from our programs to serve as leaders in governments, humanitarian organisations, educational and research institutions, and international organisations such as the United Nations and the World Bank.

Members of your club can help by promoting Rotary Peace Fellowships to **qualified candidates**.

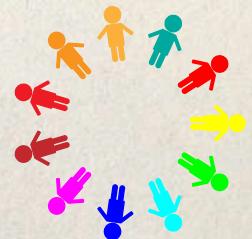

In 2021, Ngawang's father faced every parent's worst nightmare. His seven-year-old daughter, Ngawang had been heating water with a rod heater when it slipped from her hands. She suffered severe burns to her chest and arm after accidentally spilling boiling water on her small body.

Over the next three years, Ngawang endured countless hospital visits, but what she desperately needed was specialist reconstructive surgery, that wasn't available in her small region of Bhutan.

The trauma of the event took a toll on the little girl's mental health, too. Ngawang withdrew from her friends and struggled to keep up with her schoolwork. She felt different from her friends.

Thankfully, an Interplast surgical team arrived in Bhutan and were able to assess Ngawang's injuries. They immediately scheduled her for surgery.

In Bhutan, when a child experiences a burns injury, it can be fatal. The rate of survival is significantly lower than that of a child in Australia. This is simply because they don't have the same medical resources and specialist care and that is why we need your help.

After her surgery, and some ongoing hand therapy Ngawang saw her mobility improve! She was able to rejoin her soccer team, and her family noticed her mood lift and her smile return.
