Many of those who live in the South Australian part of our District, consider the month of March as "mad March". I may consider it "Mayhem March", Kathryn and I



Rajeev and his wife Priya will offer their stewardship to District 9510 during 2025/2026. Their G-train journey begins, as will their learning. I know that you join me in firstly offering congratulations, but also ensuring them of our genuine support for the tasks ahead.

Learning is life-long, particularly with Rotary. Not only to ourselves, but we strive to provide learning opportunities to all, throughout many less fortunate areas of the world, as well as supporting school programmes in our own communities. Some clubs provide curriculum support and others are involve with breakfast programmes.



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Over the first weekend of March we had the pleasure of hosting within the District, Past RI President, current Chair of Trustees, Ian Riseley OAM and his wife, PDG Juliet. The Rotary Clubs of St Peters and Adelaide worked together to have a weekend focused on the Environment, coupled with a philanthropic evening at Adelaide Oval to provide an insight into the work of our charity the Rotary Foundation.

The word Environment can open up many a conversation. When we consider it in the context of the Rotary Seven Areas of Focus, we think of nature, the rivers, tree planting. Yet if I turn to my trusty Collins English Dictionary, rather than the internet — I am provided with: 1. external conditions or surroundings, especially those in which we work and live 2. Ecology, the external surroundings in which a plant or animal lives, which tend to influence its development and behaviour. 3. The state of being environed; encirclement.



There is no doubt that Ian Riseley had a keen interest on the Ecology when considering Environment – he asked us back in 2017-2018 to each plant a tree. There were many trees planted throughout the world. During the Environment Forum held at Charles Campbell College we were exposed to some of the projects here in our District. The Rotary Club of Adelaide propagating and growing trees, Jack's Farm a project of the Rotary Club of St Peters. The Rotary Club of Glenelg project eliminated plastic straws from the cafés and restaurants of Jetty Road.

The ongoing work at Calperum Station was highlighted. The work there has been long and challenging, but is obviously a "labour of love".

The forum was followed up on the Sunday, with a visit to the Rotary Club of Seaford and their morning meeting at the Wetland Vineyard.



This is a well operated commercial eco vineyard, where the Micro Bat Boxes built by the **Rotary Club of Seaford** members and have been placed in trees around the vines. It was amazing to hear the story of the Micro Bats and what bugs they keep away from the grapes.



We also had the opportunity of sharing with the members of the **Rotary Club of Goolwa**, where past RI President Ian planted the tree number 101 in Centenary Park, Goolwa.

Back in 2017-2018, Ian Riseley chose the theme Rotary – Make a Difference. In announcing that theme he was to say "We'll answer the question - what is Rotary? Whether we're building a new playground or a new school, improving medical care or sanitation, training conflict mediators or midwives, we know that the work we do will change people's lives – in a way large & small – for the better."

In 2023, we are still maintaining this emphasis, but what I am witnessing as we visit the projects of our clubs is that first part of the Collins English Dictionary interpretation for Environment exemplified: 1. external conditions or surroundings, especially

those in which we work and live. Clubs and members have provided a wonderful, happy cohesive, inviting, supportive atmosphere around the tasks that they are undertaking. The "environment" is electric.

It is pleasing to appreciate that Rotarians and Rotaractors are not just dinner mates or the casual "club acquaintance" – they are friends. It has been our current RI President Jennifer Jones this year who has asked that we invest in our members, make them feel valued. Kathryn and I see this time and time again. We too have been welcomed, as if we "have been" long-time friends. I use the term "have been" with a sense of confidence that it has been altered to "are life-long friends".



As the month of March progressed, our interaction with members varied in location, BBQ or dining room dinner, dancing to laying the tables for the **Mildura Deakin** Longest Lunch. Now I do point out that the dancing and the laying of tables, is quite a different event – there was not dancing on tables!



Peace Building & Conflict Prevention was certainly the focus of Harmony Day. A number of Peace Poles were unveiled throughout the District. Kathryn and I had the pleasure of sharing the multicultural activities in **Whyalla** for Harmony Day and with His Worship the Mayor, pleased to unveil peace Pole #23 in Whyalla Rotary Park.

These events brought together in harmony some who once would have been State enemies. In colourful costumes, people stood as one and sang John Lennon's

Imagine.

Our late Queen Elizabeth in her Christmas broadcast 1954 said "When it is night and wind and rain beat upon the window, the family is most conscious of the warmth and peacefulness that surround the pleasant fireside. So our Commonwealth hearth becomes more precious than ever before by the contrast between its homely security and the storm which sometimes seems to be brewing outside, in the darkness of uncertainty and doubt that envelopes the whole world".

The residents of Whyalla were no doubt aware how precious their new "environment" is. But many members throughout our District have shared this thinking as they have rallied to support those whose lives have been torn apart in Ukraine, as have those displaced and effected by the Turkiye/Syrian earthquake or much closer to home — New Zealand. Life can become fragile overnight — an act of nature, the "environment" is shattered. But Rotary Imagine and respond!

As we begin Holy week, Kathryn and I extend to you all, our best wishes for a happy, safe and enjoyable Easter!





Protecting the Environment Weekend



On Saturday 11th March, CATE (Calperum And The Environment) and the RC St Peters Environment Committee hosted a forum 'Protecting the Environment' at Charles Campbell College.

Environmental projects from across the District were presented including 'Jack's Farm' a long term project of the **RC St Peters.** Other clubs presented projects from Calperum Station near Renmark, where 31 clubs are involved, saving Mallee emu wrens, bushfire restoration of fencing and other environmental work by **RC Onkaparinga**, growing trees for life and reducing the use of plastic straws in **Glenelg** by replacing them with Rotary branded paper straws at food and drink outlets in the tourist precinct.

Past RI President Ian Riseley AM and Chair of the Trustees of the Rotary Foundation, addressed the gathering and commenced by saying that everyone present at the forum was there because they care about the environment.

He stated that Rotary founder Paul Harris planted trees in Chicago.

Past Rotary International President Paulo V.C. Costa made the environment one of his

primary causes more than 30 years ago, creating a Preserve Planet Earth program and committee to examine ways that clubs and members could plan and carry out environmental initiatives.

During Ian Riseley's Presidency in 2017-18, he asked that Rotarians plant 1.2 M trees, one for each Rotarian in the world. The Rotary community took him up on that challenge and planted many times

More recently Rotary's newest area of focus is Protecting the Environment, which will enable Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact.

On Sunday 12th March, PRIP Ian Riseley AM and his wife PDG Juliet, DG Paul Thomas and several Rotarians visited two regional projects





The first was at Tatachilla winery hosted by the RC Seaford. Their project in conjunction, with the winery, is building microbat box homes. These small bats eat insects, allowing the vine growers to avoid spraying insecticides. The project also included shrub planting to attract birds and other animals that also eat insects to reduce the pest population in the vineyard.



The second stop was at Goolwa where the RC Goolwa

has been extremely busy with native revegetation tree planting. Because of the limestone base, digging holes is fraught with difficulty with only one in three holes successful for tree polanting. PRIP President Ian Riseley planted the club's 101st tree to add to their current 100 collection.




Past President Ian said the breadth and depth of environmental projects in D9510 far surpasses anything he has seen before.

Membership Matters



Hello everyone

We are working on a new way to follow up membership leads. Some of you may already know that membership leads are sent through from Rotary International and are people who have expressed an interest in joining Rotary.

Previously, there has not been a lot of structure in how we follow up these leads which has resulted in many opportunities being overlooked. Well this is changing and we seem to be having a modicum of success.

As leads are uploaded through Rotary International, the potential candidates are contacted by the Membership Director to determine the wants and needs of the candidate. Once these needs have been assessed it is then determined which Area/Club would best meet the needs of the candidate.

The Membership Director then contacts the Area Governor for the determined Area and a discussion is had to specify which Club is most suited. The Area Governor contacts the candidate to arrange a meeting and further discuss how Rotary can meet their needs and then arranges for the candidate to connect with the relevant Club. The Membership Director also connects with the President of the determined Club to advise of the candidate's interest in attending their Club. This process creates an opportunity for the candidate to connect with several points of contact and provide support to them should they have any questions.

As mentioned, there has been success following this process. Where the system breaks down is the lack of contact details available on ClubRunner. Several opportunities have been missed due to not being able to contact Area Governors and/or Presidents as their details have not been added to ClubRunner. ClubRunner is an integral tool we can all use to access relevant information when needing to contact Clubs/members however it is also a very important tool for the District to use for reporting and collating information. When information is not up to date, reports are not accurate and it limits availability for access to information.

I ask all members, especially members in leadership roles to update their contact details via ClubRunner, preferably phone numbers or, at a minimum, email addresses. This will hopefully increase opportunities when connecting potential members to Clubs. We all know how important new members are.

If ClubRunner isn't your forte I am more than happy for you to email your details to me and I can upload them for you or ask a member in your Club. Please don't hesitate to reach out. We are more than happy to help.

The coming months are looking to be very exciting so watch this space. I look forward to sharing some exciting activities in the membership area. Renovation of Rotary House Calperum

As the flooding recedes teams of Rotarians have been travelling to Calperum to renovate Rotary House (the original homestead now used to house Rotary clubs working on projects at Calperum) and other buildings.

The levee is immediately alongside Rotary House and it was touch and go as to whether the river would breech it. All the furniture was removed from the house and adjacent accommodation buildings and the levee height was raised. The water stopped rising just centimetres from the top of the bank.

With the furniture out it was decided to install a floating floor throughout as well paint the interior of the entire house.

Rotarians from the following clubs – Adelaide, Edwardstown, Magill Sunrise, McLaren Vale, Regency Park, Unley and Walkerville volunteered and formed a number of teams in late February early March to complete the job.

Paint Supplies at Hendon donated all the paint and Bunnings at Berri provided much of the flooring at half price.

Deidre Hughes Citizen of the Year Victor Harbor


The RC Encounter Bay successfully nominated its member Deidre Hughes because she exemplifies the ideals of 'Service above Self' in three areas:

- 1. Service to the community through Rotary and Rotary initiatives.
- 2. Commitment to opportunities for the aged through employment and Probus.
- 3. Leadership and training across the Southern Fleurieu and beyond in relation to health services and the training of young people.

In 2006, Deidre Hughes was the very first woman to be accepted into the RC Encounter Bay, pioneering and creating a pathway for those to follow. She was quickly accepted as she demonstrated outstanding skills, commitment, organisation and initiative in a range of service areas. She was elected President in 2009, and by 2011 had been elected as Assistant Governor for D9520. She was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow for her substantial assistance to the club and in supporting and guiding clubs across the district. Her clear focus was on building better communities, with service being the key to all activities and projects that were undertaken.

In 2014 Deidre Hughes for the next 4 years, initiated, developed, directed and managed the markets at Goolwa and Port Elliot two weekends a month. The markets raised \$80,000 each year for club distribution. A \$40,000 grant was made towards the creation of a men's shed. Other significant projects funded included computers for the disadvantaged, and driver education programs for students. Many local community organisations received support in the way of funds during this period of club history. The club has now awarded her two Paul Harris sapphire pins for her continuing achievements in the community through Rotary.

As if her many and varied roles in Rotary were not enough, Deidre sought opportunities in her retirement to provide activities for the elderly in Victor Harbor. She became a foundation member of the Victor Harbor/Granite Island Probus Club.



She was President of the club of 100 members in 2016, and for the next four years she became the Rotary District Probus Chair, travelling to clubs as far afield as Mildura and Broken Hill to create and support new clubs.
