#### The season of Change


It was Benjamin Disraeli who wrote "Change is inevitable. Change is constant". Our District like all other Rotary Districts around the globe have been celebrating club

At the District "Changeover", I had the opportunity of again sharing the video that had been prepared by John Harmer, which we shared



Rotary has been supporting the concept of "give every child a future" – with this in mind she wanted to support Childhood Cancer, who don't receive Government Funding but provide vital support to young people and their respective families battling the long pathway of treatment for cancer. Coupled with this; in the endeavour to find better treatments and possibly a cure for Leukaemia she has also elected to support the Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fund.

Privately we committed to attempt to raise about \$10,000 each for these charities – this target was well

But it also exemplifies the words explaining the theme of current RI President Gordon McInally – "The gaol is to restore hope – to help the world heal from destructive conflicts, and in turn, to help us achieve lasting change for ourselves".

I began my term as District Governor sharing the anthem written by John Lennon – "Imagine"

I bookend that experience by also sharing the words of John Lennon – Count your age by friends not years

Count your life by smiles not tears.

It has been a privilege to serve, and I am ever "Proud of our past – Confident of the future". In this season of change we have a new District Governor Craig Dowling, supported by Kiki and a new Rotary year ahead!





We will create Hope in the World as we celebrate the centenary of Rotary in D9510.

## **RICON 23 - My Convention Adventure**

So, I wasn't going to miss out on experiencing an International Rotary Convention in my own backyard, the question was where to stay and how to get there. After airport pickups, motorhome collections and stocking of provisions, our International guests were set for the trip and on May 3rd a total of 44 Rotarians and 24 vehicles hit the road.

One of the most important events of muster is happy hour, yes, there may be wine involved, but it's actually our very necessary briefing for the next day's travel plans (and a fair bit of socialising).

Our itinerary was a loop through Victoria and South Australia returning in time for Convention attendance. Each leg we were divided into travel groups of a few vehicles. Our trip included stopovers in Lorne, Port Campbell, Port Fairy, Mt Gambier, Kingston SE, Victor Harbor, West Beach (Adelaide), Renmark, Mildura, Swan Hill, Echuca, Bendigo, Ballarat and then back at Braybrook, Melbourne.

It was not only a chance to showcase both South Australia and Victoria to our international guests, but for the rest of us to enjoy it as well. It was the opportunity to meet fellow Rotarians and learn what the differences and similarities were between the Rotary clubs and Districts we belonged to. Build new friendships across states and oceans. Meet fellow Rotarians in many of our destinations, attend their meetings and see their club passions and projects. A fellowship that extended beyond just the RVFR members.

We arrived back in Melbourne on May 24th with some heading to hotels for the convention, others having to head off, and the rest of us staying on at Braybrook to attend the Convention. My bonus was my daughter flying in to stay with me and attending the Convention and meeting the RVFR's too.

Catching buses, trains & trams, dodging roadworks, getting to meet with fellow Rotarians of the world, socialising, seeing the many passions of Rotarians in the House of Friendship, attending events, presentations, hearing the stories of Rotarians and learning so much more about the organisation I belong to ...... it was inspiring.



And I got to have an adventure just getting there.....finally arriving home on June 4th, what an amazing 5 weeks of Rotary! Proving sometimes taking the longer road means you gain so much more. And finally a special thanks to muster boss John Spath and his great team of helpers who had been planning this adventure for more than 2 years, an outstanding success. Thanks for having me along.

"This Book has saved lives"


One of the best 'Community Service projects' that was started in our District is the **Emergency Medical Information Book**. Today the distribution Australia wide is more than 1.6 million.

## How should we use the 23—24 Presidential Theme?

In order to maintain a consistent public image and visual identity, Rotary International has asked all Clubs to use the Presidential Theme only when communicating with other Rotary members; (e.g. in an email signature, PowerPoint presentation, on the District web site, etc) and refrain from using it when promoting Rotary on any media, particularly web sites and social media, to anyone outside of Rotary.

There are two versions of the Theme, horizontal and vertical. RI wants clubs to create a lockup using the Rotary logo lockup template in the Brand Centre, to combine the horizontal version with a simplified Club logo that meets their visual identity requirements. This is their preferred use of the Theme.

The horizontal version can only be used in a lockup (as shown below left for D9510) and never on its own. (the D9510 lockup PNG file is available for download at the bottom of this article)
RI prefers clubs and Districts to use the full colour version of the Theme lockup, but all Black and all White versions are also available, just ask the Public Image team.







The vertical version cannot be used in a lockup, but it can be used on its own, as shown above (right), when the lockup is not feasible; so long as a Club, District or Zone logo is in the same field of view. (i.e. close by)

## How to make a lockup of the Theme with your club logo

- **STEP 1** Download the horizontal Theme in PNG format (attached) and remember where you put it. You will need it in step 3.
- **STEP 2** Download and read the 2023-24 Presidential Theme Branding Guidelines (attached) which explains in more detail how RI wants us to use the Theme; and shows some examples.
- **STEP 3** Use the Rotary logo lockup template in the Brand Centre to create a lockup of your simplified club logo with the horizontal theme that you downloaded in step 1. If you are not familiar with this template, these are the steps to follow: <a href="https://brandcenter.rotary.org/en-us/">https://brandcenter.rotary.org/en-us/</a>

Scroll down to templates and select view.

Select logo lockups in logo systems.

Select Rotary logo lockup template

Select create and wait for the template to load

In the template, under choose logo arrangement: choose simplified logo, full colour, and insert your club name.

Then, under Add text or logo / Type: choose upload partner logo, click the tiny blue icon that appears, browse for the Theme that you saved in step 1, and select it.

Then, under Download file: select the file format that you want. PNG is best for desktop publishing. Professional printers will need it in PDF, together with a copy of the Theme Branding Guidelines which contains the colour palette.

The Theme lockup with your club logo should automatically download when you confirm the file format.


Remember that in 3 years half of the money donated returns to our District to fund District and Global Grant Projects.
