We each have something to offer, be we should only have expectations – of what we can do.


I think of the lyrics to that hymn that may be familiar to many of us:

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## **Edwardstown Rotary mentors a new enterprise**

For many years the **RC Edwardstown** bookshop paid a commercial removalist to remove the large number of donations that were unsuitable for resale. This cost the Club many hundreds of dollars over the years

and was not always satisfactory.

Richard Cocking & Guy Dollman (right) were setting up a lawn mowing and general maintenance business. Now Richard & Guy collect the books & take them to FibreCycle, where they are made into kitty litter - the boys get paid for the books they collect and deliver, and the Bookshop has no disposal costs - a win/win all

round. Their story over the past 2 years as they have worked with the Bookshop has been an inspirational project for the club, and with support from Club members have developed a successful microbusiness for

Richard and Guy.

Back in September 2020, it was decided to find an alternative to the cost the Club was paying (\$25/week) to dispose of books that were unable to be sold.

FibreCycle pay Guy and Richard by the tonne for recycled materials, and with the proceeds, they have been able to purchase a 2.5 tonne trailer in order to expand their business, to now include recycling scrap metal as well. The books that are recycled are made into kitty litter and sold as Breeders Choice Cat Litter sold through Coles.

## **Membership Matters**



Welcome to August, Membership and Extension Month for Rotary International. This is a good time to reflect on the RI President's Theme for the year — "IMAGINE ROTARY". Imagine what the perfect club looks like for you. Imagine what your club will look like in 5-10 years, or even next year. Imagine what more you could be getting out of being in Rotary.

The first four Rotarians met on 23rd February 1905. When looking at this photo I wonder what Paul Harris would think of Rotary today. Did he ever imagine Rotary would be so well

recognised and respected in the community? Did he imagine how far Rotary's reach would really stretch?

Paul Harris had great vision. It was his ability to "imagine Rotary" that has allowed Rotary to be an international organisation.

It is now our turn to "Imagine Rotary". We hear a lot about change and, for some of us, that can be scary. Imagine if change never happened in Rotary, it would have died out with these four men. When we reflect on our own Rotary journeys, we have experienced lots of changes. Some big, some small. Nothing was meant to stay the same. Without change, there is no growth.

As an organisation, we need to apply a new lens to how we look at Rotary and get creative. Traditional Clubs are great and they are the foundation of what Rotary has been built on, however, even traditional Clubs have grown and evolved over the years. Rotary International has recognised that, whilst traditional Clubs hold significant importance in our Rotary history, there are also new opportunities to create different types of Clubs. With our changing world, people have less time available and in our digital world, we can also be more available. Specific causes have become more important for people who are time poor and want to do good in a particular area of focus. Cause-based Clubs are becoming more suitable for those who are time poor but still want to do good in the world. Satellite Clubs are a great resource for people who want to focus on action rather than administration.

August is the time to explore your community and find out what people want. How can we engage people in our community in Rotary? There is no quick fix or simple answer. Every community is different and has individual needs. When out in the community are you selling your Rotary product? Do you promote Rotary within your networks? If you are talking to someone in the community, do you know what Rotary has to offer them beyond what your particular Club is doing? Rotary International has many free resources to

access through my.rotary.org to assist you and your Club, to analyse your Club's performance, reinvigorate your Club, participate in personal development activities, and even start a new Club.

During this month I invite you to take the time to evaluate what is important to you and your Club in the hopes you can invigorate your Clubs to create growth.



## Mildura Senior College student wins valuable Rotary scholarship

The new \$3000 scholarship will be awarded annually to one Sunraysia student beginning their first year of Tertiary study. Tess was presented with her certificate and \$3000 cheque at the **Red Cliffs Rotary** meeting on Wednesday 6th July. Tess was thrilled with her success and generous in her appreciation of the assistance provided.

The scholarship, supported by Rotary Clubs across Sunraysia, and a project of The Rotary Club of Red Cliffs, aims to raise the level of awareness and understanding of issues facing the Murray Darling Basin.

The scholarship is open to any Year 12 student in Sunraysia to follow a Tertiary course that will increase this knowledge and understanding in the community. These young people will be the next leaders in our community and it is important that the health of our river system is in good hands. There are few things more important for Sunraysia than the continued health of our life blood, the rivers.

Andrew Banks, Assistant Principal at Mildura Senior College replied to the news of Tess's award by saying "this is fantastic news. We can't thank your organisation enough for making this scholarship possible and with such a poignant local theme, it will definitely have impact for our region in the long term."

Sunraysia schools with a senior year programme will be approached in the latter part of 2022 with news of application procedures for the next Sunraysia Rotary River Health Scholarship.








The Clubs in Barossa and in Whyalla received grants for Birthing Kits.
