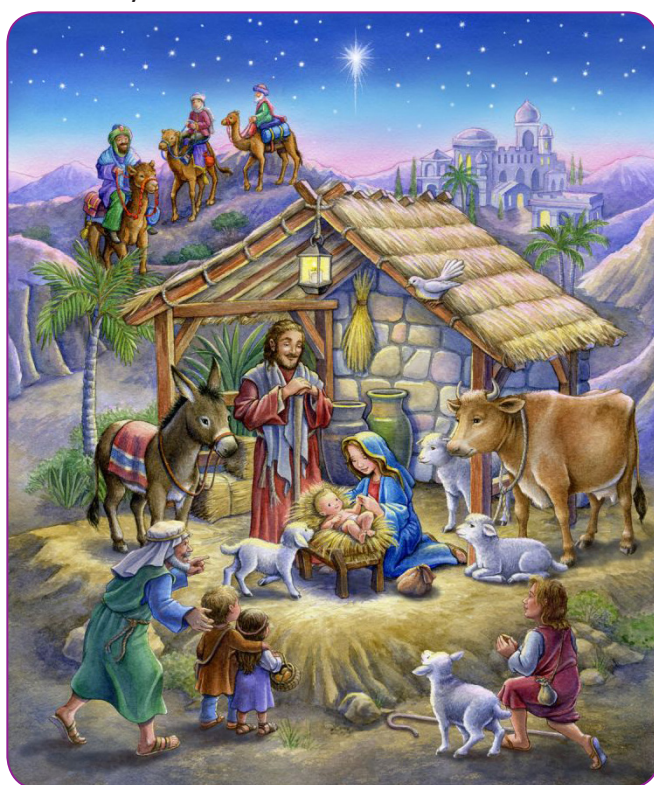

We have also chosen this year support for the **Peter Nelson Leukaemia Research Fellowship Fund**, established by Olympic Gold medallist and former Governor of South Australia, Marjorie Jackson Nelson, in memory of her late husband, Australian Olympic cyclist, Peter Nelson, who died of leukaemia in 1977.

He was at that time a Rotarian with the **Rotary Club of Unley**.

Following his death, Marj together with the Rotary Club of Unley instigated the fund to support researchers in finding a cure for this deadly cancer. For the past 45 years, the fund has supported ten researchers, the latest currently undertaking her research at SAMRI, investigating alternative treatment options for T-Cell acute leukaemia.

Last year more than 4600 adults and 300 children in Australia were diagnosed with leukaemia. This disease categorised into four main types, one being acute leukaemia known as ALL. This is the most common type of childhood leukaemia and the most common childhood cancer. Even with chemotherapy 15% of paediatric patients are at high risk of primary resistance or relapse within five years and up to 40% of adults fail treatments.

The fund neither seeks nor receives government funding and is only made possible through the support of the South Australian community. \$300000.00 is needed to invest into each three-year research term. This year as we Imagine Rotary, we need to continue to build the legacy, supporting Marj in her fundraising efforts, towards the hope, in the near future, researchers finding a cure that will ensure that other families are not robbed of a loved one because of leukaemia.

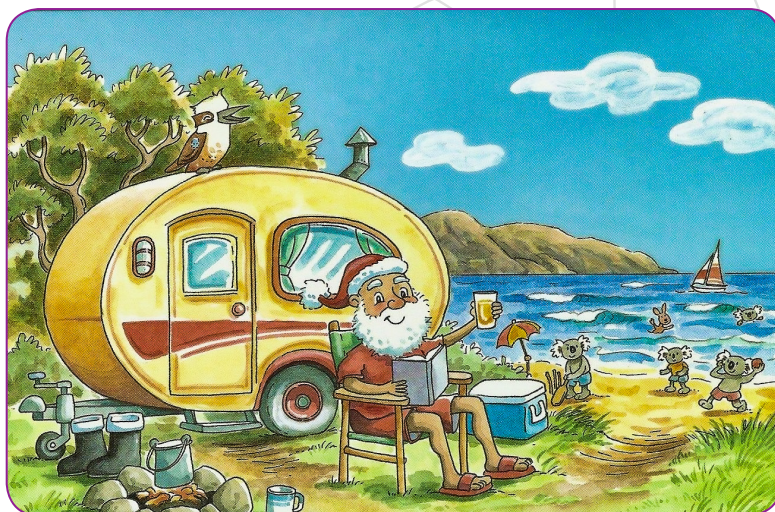


New stories

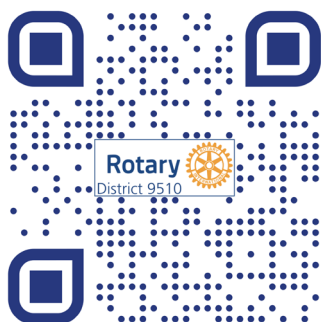

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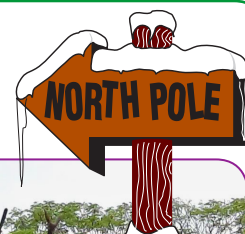
Rotary in action at Christmas pageants

Christmas Pageants are out in force again this year after 2 or 3 years suspension because of COVID-19.

RCs of **Kent Town**, **Magill Sunrise**, **Mobilong** and **Regency Park** joined in with **RC Norwood** to marshal the pageant again this year.

RC Norwood has co-organized this pageant with the Council each year for over 30 years. This year commercial floats were excluded from the pageant to reduce the length of the pageant from around 100 floats to 51 floats, bands, singing and dance troupes.

It was decided it was taking too long for the children to wait for Father Christmas to arrive! Despite the threat of rain over 20,000 spectators watched the hour and half long parade.

Teaspoon of change for a peaceful and polio-free world

On the 7th of November 2022, thanks to the **RC Salisbury**, a celebration dinner was held to say thank you to members and Friends of Rotary Club of Salisbury and their special guest speakers **d'Arcy Lunn**, former D9520 Peace Fellow and the Founder of Teaspoons of Change for Peace as well as an awareness raiser for polio eradication across Rotary in Canada and many other countries; and **Dr Shagufta Perveen** from The Aga Khan University, Karachi, Pakistan, experienced in working with polio vaccinators across Pakistan. **Pakistan is the last country in the world with the wild Polio virus.**

A Teaspoon for Peace is a small but significant action contributing to a culture of positive peace. At the RC Salisbury, polio eradication is one of its top priorities in the 2022-23 Rotary Year. The Club organised this dinner to raise funds for the Polio Eradication Program through **Rotary Foundation**.

It was a night that reminded us all that there is no cure for polio; it can only be prevented by immunisation. The **District Governor Paul Thomas AM** and **Rotary Foundation Chair Marie-louise Lees** pointed out that Rotary and its partners are committed to eliminating poliomyelitis completely from the world. Participation of Rotary International in Polio eradication is a success story. The world has witnessed

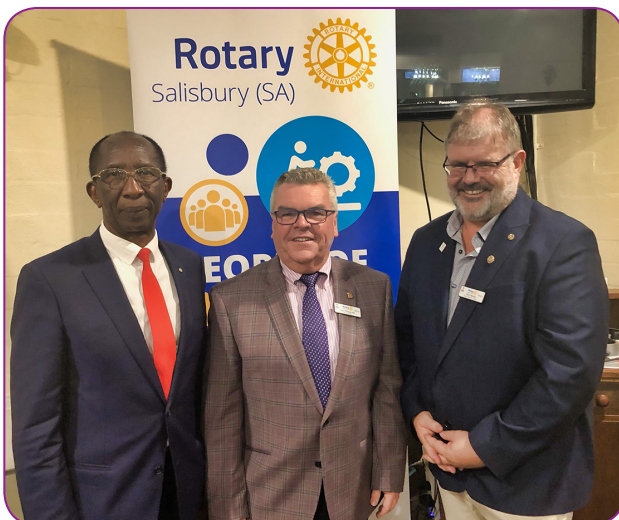


that more than 18 million people are able to walk today who would otherwise have been paralysed, since 1988, when the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was launched. Until polio is totally eradicated, every child is at risk of this highly infectious, potentially life-threatening and paralysing disease.

Success in eradicating polio will mean that no child will have to experience the devastating effects of the disease again. Failure to eradicate polio could cause poliovirus to reappear around the world with up to 200,000 new cases expected every year within 10 years. We are so close to eradicating the virus, but we need to finish the job now, once and for all.

Thanks to **Rick Henke Foundation Director, RC Salisbury**, Rotarians at Rotary Club of Salisbury and sponsors for bringing people together to collect vital funds to support vulnerable children around the world.

Also, many were committed to pay or make a donation to Rotary for the club's community support. The end result was the club 'sold' 19kgs sausages and 11 loaves of bread – and it collected \$523.12 on a day when everything was free!!!

The lead construction contractor, Camco, provided tremendous assistance to the club to organize this event, with support from both Campbelltown and Burnside councils.

YOUTH EXCHANGE - recovering after COVID

The first seeds for Rotary International's Youth Exchange Program were sown by the Rotary Club of Copenhagen, with a small-scale European program started in 1929. A decade later saw the first student exchanges to take place in America. But it was only in 1972, Rotary International (RI) endorsed the program to clubs worldwide as a "worthwhile international activity".

For many years we have considered Youth Exchange as a flagship Rotary program. It is therefore great to see the program restart from the embargo placed on the program due to COVID back in 2020. On the 21st January, 4 students will leave our shores for a life changing experience overseas thanks to the support of their sponsoring Rotary Clubs.

Storm destroys Blackwood's Christmas Fair

RC Blackwood's Christmas Fair had been put on hold during COVID-19 and was all organized to come back bigger and better on Nov 13 2022. Unfortunately the storm that did so much damage and cut off power to over 160,000 customers across SA on Nov 12, did not spare the Christmas Fair.

The fair had been all set up that morning along with a number of traders in anticipation of a record turnout on the Sunday. However, at 3.30 pm that afternoon the storm hit. Fortunately, nobody was injured but the club had a massive clean up the next day helped by the local Scouts.

The club is making claims with the Rotary insurers for over \$25,000 worth of damage to its infrastructure, loss of profits and wasted food.

The November market organized by the **RC Magill Sunrise** also had to be cancelled because the community centre was damaged by falling trees caused by the same storm. Ironically the funds were earmarked for Flood Relief. The club has now designated its December 11 market proceeds for Flood Relief.

Project Discovery Bike Ride for spinal cord injury

The Discovery bike ride #7 organized by **RC Adelaide** and **RC Adelaide Parks** took place over 3 days from Clare to Wallaroo and the Upper Yorke Peninsula. The project was a great success raising over \$81,000 towards spinal cord injury research at SAMRHI through the Neil Sachse Centre. 30 riders, mainly Rotarians, were in the peloton.

The event provided an excellent opportunity to showcase Rotary support for Project Discovery which was amplified by the use of the **Paradise Mazda Rotary Ute** supplied by District 9510 over the 3 days.

In addition to RC Adelaide and Rotary Adelaide Parks, both involved in staging the event, other Clubs that were directly engaged with the ride included the **Rotary clubs of Clare, Northern Yorke Peninsula and Maitland**. DG Paul was able to join the group for a BBQ evening meal in Wallaroo.

2022 is the third year this cycling event has taken place in early November, raising awareness and financial support for the Neil Sachse Spinal Cord Injury Centre here in Adelaide. The Neil Sachse Centre (NSC) at SAHMRI leads benchtop to bedside research on spinal cord injuries – a world renowned centre in research. Project Discovery Classics 7 was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Adelaide, Hurley Hotel Group, PHA Accounts & Advisors, Riverbanks, Midnight anytime Blackout Blinds.

The Train will depart from Keswick on platform 1 on 25th May 2023.

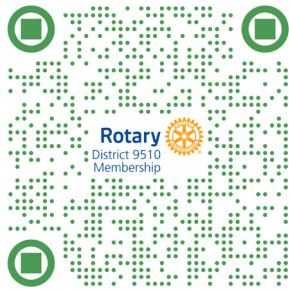

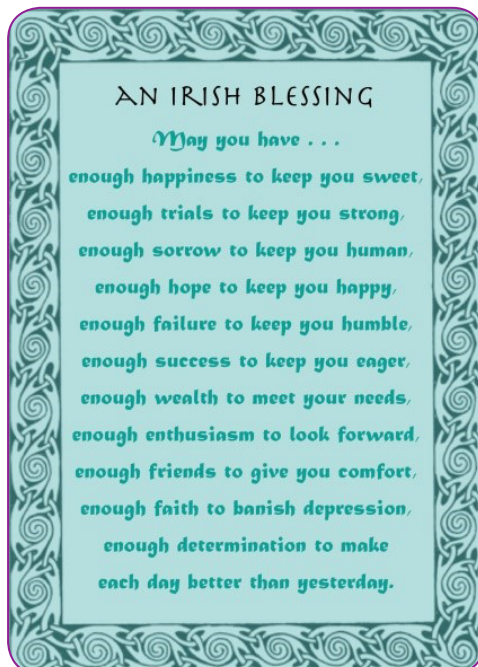


Wow, December is upon us and the silly season has definitely taken over.

Design and Creativity Awards for Eastern Adelaide school students

In 1994 the **RC St Peters**, through its Vocational Service stream, decided to change its focus from recognizing excellence in employment, to recognition of students who demonstrate exceptional skill in the completion of a “hands on” project.

Since 2018, the awards have been renamed the Design and Creativity Awards and promoted through schools within the eastern suburbs catchment area.

The awardees were nominated by their school for displaying excellence in their chosen fields.

Each school’s teacher introduced their students and then the students gave a short but comprehensive report about their year 12 subject.

Jordan Lee from Pembroke School produced an architectural design of a digital virtual tour of his school campus. **Henry Ponte, also from Pembroke** worked with the year 5 to 12 year-old students to create an educational game based on infectious diseases e.g. COVID.

Hermoine Burvill-Holmes from Marden Senior College spent the year using various photographic techniques to produce a three panel series ‘Meaning of Woman’ and **Samuel Jowitt** created a restaurant game design with 3 D presentation.

Benjamin Piper from Prince Alfred College designed and made a metal and timber bar table and **Vasilis Michalakis** designed and set up in his school a facial recognition program using software and coding.

Charlotte Hurt of Loreto College produced clothing in her tech styles project. She drafted the pattern and sewed an intricate dress using Posie Printemps for the flowers. **Natalie Teasdale** created an oil painting highlighting the use of recycled plastics in our oceans.

Antoni Ormsby of St Peter’s College designed a go cart lifter to meet OHS requirements and **Casey Van Heuven** designed a tablet dispenser for his grandfather with a sound alarm to remind him to take his medication.

Hilary Clark of St Peter’s Girls College displayed 3 paintings.

Rotaract Cooking Classes

Rotaract Cooking Classes began online on the 2nd of April 2020 as a response to the COVID pandemic with the Adelaide University Rotaract Club.

The project emerged as an idea from Megan Jane Lamb of the Successful Communities workshops through the Multicultural Communities Council SA and was put into action by then club President, Lenard Sciancalepore.

The project initially started by involving club members of multicultural backgrounds to showcase their cultures through food, however, as popularity grew, the scope of the project broadened to include multicultural community organisations.

Eventually, after COVID lockdowns subsided, the need to continue the cooking classes in a physical location was highlighted and so the team drew their attention to the Adelaide Central Market's community kitchen space and have been holding monthly physical cooking demonstrations since the 13th of May 2021 supported by the City of Adelaide.

The initiative currently rests as a sub-project of the Cultural Night committee and is held in partnership with the Adelaide University Rotaract Club, the Rotaract Club of Adelaide Peace, and the MCCSA's Successful Communities.

The project held its 15th Rotaract Cooking Class on the 16th of November. The cooking classes are typified by their inclusive nature, multicultural performances accompanying an atmosphere of peace, harmony, fun, exotic aromas, music, and cultural appreciation through food.

District 9510 continues to Support Rotary Australasian Centenary Project



Give Every Child A Future

Vaccinating 100,000 children across nine Pacific Island countries

Rotary District 9510 has pledged US\$15,000 of our District Designated Funds to support the final global grant (GG2237468) for this project. This DDF commitment follows contributions of US\$15,000 for both of the two previous years.

Good progress has been made on the implementation of the RGECAF program to introduce the three vaccines into the nine Pacific Island countries.

The latest grant is for the introduction of HPV into Kiribati. The earlier grants for Kiribati were for the introduction of the rotavirus vaccine, which should be completed within the next 12 months. HPV for Kiribati is one of the largest single components of this project with a total budget of USD 1.3 million.

The Australian Government has contributed about 50% of this and we have approximately USD 280k that still needs to be funded.

This is District 9510 Rotarians contributions to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund contributions at work in our Zone and doing good in the world.
