

Dear fellow Rotarians, partners and friends of Rotary,

Service above Self

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong" were the words expressed by our late Queen Elizabeth II,

on her twenty-first birthday, then as the Princess Elizabeth as part of a speech broadcast from Cape Town, South Africa. Dedicating her life to service of the Commonwealth.



We have over the past month mourned our late Queen Elizabeth II in various ways; watched hours of television

commentary; signed condolence books and reflected on a long life well lived. Her dedication to humanitarian causes and unwavering commitment to peace and the environment deeply inspired Rotary members around the world, especially those

in the Commonwealth Countries.

While the late Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh was an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Windsor and Eton and also the Windsor St George, the Queen herself was a supporter of Rotary's polio eradication and humanitarian missions.

The late Queen Elizabeth II received the Rotary International Award of Honour, our organisations highest recognition, in December 2013 on the occasion of the 60th Anniversary of her coronation. Following the 70th Anniversary of that coronation we have joined the international community in offering our condolences to the Royal Family and shared with them the loss.

It was an honour for me on behalf of Rotary D9510 to attend the State Service of Thanksgiving for Her Majesty the Queen at St Peter's Cathedral on Tuesday Evening 20 September. The Most Reverend Geoffrey Smith, Archbishop of Adelaide and Primate of Australia in his Address, spoke of The Queen's "Service above Self". Together we sang the hymn: "I vow to thee. My country, all earthly things above, entire and whole and perfect, the service of my love:"

During the service, there was time for reflection and my reflections compared and paralleled the "Service above Self" that I continually witness as I move around our clubs in D9510.

I am continually hearing – "we are a small club, but doing our best". Believe me, I've "aged" hearing the phrase – "size doesn't matter"!?! And it doesn't, Vincent Van Gogh wrote, "Great things are done by a series of small things brought together".

This is certainly the case for Rotary D9510.

I visited Roxby District club for a "packed weekend" mid-September – a smallish club, "with BIG punches" in their community. A real eye opener in this "oasis in the desert", where Rotary is very visible – with its recognised logo throughout that community.



While visiting the community Dog Park, being shown the table and chairs that have been put in by the Rotary Club of Roxby District, which will soon be shaded by shelters subsidised from the surplus fund's grants; we were approached by a lady who asked

"are you from Rotary – thankyou for what you are doing, it really is appreciated".

I was also at Loxton for the celebration of the new Satellite Club of Loxton Community.

A group of seventeen people have been drawn together with the particular interest in serving to improve the lives of young people and those who experience disabilities.









Kathryn and I, returned to Loxton a week later to attend the performance of "Kick off ya Boots", a supposed amateur performance by Littletown production, sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of the Riverland.

Yet it was far from amateur – a professional insight into rural life, as they tackle the tough topics of succession, drought, financial security and unspoken truths as they go about their farming lives. I applaud all those involved, especially the Rotary Clubs who have contributed the financial support from the toils of their service, to enable this story to be told. I would like to see the production toured to other parts of our district – the message is strong, delivered with musical talent and humour!

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St Peters Rotarians and volunteers of varying experience, age, ability, gender but with a desire to serve assemble each Saturday morning at the Rotary – on-Linde Shed Sale. Its not your usual "shed sale", the



pleasant wafting smell of cooking sausages and onions is the welcoming greeting. A shed filled with "someone's trash that is literally turned into treasure".

Lovely coffee on offer and tempting pancakes, it was like a swarm of bees around a honey pot, from the front doors to the back. A happy group of people, going about their respective task. But it was also obviously a meeting place, a meeting place for the young and the elderly, the busy and the lonely.

The mural on the front door depicts "a wonderful world" – it was a place of pleasure brought about by what looked like a "labour of love".

September has also brought about the return after the Covid 19 hiatus — RYLA, RYPEN and the Rotary Youth Challenge Sail. Rotary has for many years invested in youth programmes. It is hard to Imagine how quickly a young person responds, being involved with these programmes. Timidly they handed over their mobile phones at the commencement — yet at the end, they beamed confidence, conversing freely, caring and considerate.

The young "trainee sailors" embarked the One and All with the same caution that I had seen at RYLA and RYPEN. But these were young people, in many cases who have grown up not being able to depend upon someone else, they have had to be their own master. The Rotary Youth Sailing Challenge builds upon a foundation of resilience, responsibility, respect, reliance and relationships. It was amazing to see as the vessel cast away from the dock, how quickly barriers had been broken and conversations and cooperation was evident among the newly formed "watch" group.

With all of these programmes over the past month, Rotarians were giving of their time freely to invest in the nurturing and nourishment of our youth. But what excited me, was the interest that these young people on the completing of their respective Rotary experience, were asking how to become involved more with Rotary.

This desire to be involved was fuelled by a desire to serve – in some cases for a specific cause.

It has been said: "The best way to find yourself, is to lose yourself in the service of others". These young people are grasping this thinking. Will it be that they too "declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service."

My quiet reflections of our late Queen Elizabeth II as I sat in the splendour of St Peter's Cathedral drew me to your "Service above Self".

May our late Queen Elizabeth II rest in eternal peace as we remain Proud of our Past-Confident of the Future"!

A child's cancer diagnosis is devastating news for everyone!



This year we have chosen two separate, but similar charities. The charity highlighted this month – **Childhood Cancer Association**. South Australian based, not receiving state or federal government funding.

They support children and their families throughout the cancer journey. https://youtu.be/60SpMledWbo

Every week another child from SA, NT, regional Victoria & NSW (our Rotary District) is referred to them for support. Ranging from counselling, emergency accommodation, education support, or physical, mental, spiritual or social needs – all provided at no cost to the families; enabled by the generous support from corporate, business and individuals. \$1.3 million is needed each year to provide these services.

Just last year, 56 children diagnosed with cancer were referred – 11 children relapsed, 12 sadly died and over 400 families were provided with ongoing support.

We are hoping that each club within D9510 can help by providing a "Hospital Support Package", an investment of \$410.00. This bag suitably labelled with a Rotary luggage tag, contains essential

items in readiness for the unexpected stay in hospital. It includes the Childhood Cancer Association mascot dog – Elliot.

Elliot can be purchased separately - providing a great gift or your own way of supporting the cause. Small Elliot is \$15 or large \$30. We have these ready and available.

It is a tough ask for the new Monarch to grieve his mother's passing and at the same time find a new source of energy to enable him to fulfil his new role.

However we are both proud and encouraged that we have yet another Rotarian committed to Service above Self.



Regency Park Packing Hygiene kits for End Trachoma

RC Regency Park recently packed 30 family hygiene packs that were sent to Alice Springs and then west to schools at Kintore, Areyonga and Yuendumu. Each pack contains 4 Face Washer & Hand Towel



matching sets – in 4 different colours, 4 Bars of Soap, 2 child size toothbrushes & 3 adult sized toothbrushes, a tooth brush holder/cup, a large & a small toothpaste, shampoo & conditioner in one 1 750ml or 2 350ml, a brush, 2 x deodorant (Roll-on), 4 pocket tissues, 2 750ml reusable drink bottles and 4 beanies.

The End Trachoma 2020 project was part

of the regional Rotary Centennial celebrations to rid Australia of trachoma. Australia is the only developed country in the world with trachoma cases. While the project did not quite hit its target that year because COVID intervened but trachoma in children has been steadily reduced to somewhere between 3 and 4% in children from 5 to 9 years.

It has been completely eliminated in SA but there are still cases in Queensland, Northern Territory and Western Australia. 9510 clubs have been focused on the Northern Territory and Regency Park's previous school project at Canteen Creek is now trachoma free.

It is part of 72 schools targeted by Rotary clubs across Australia that are now trachoma free. In all 3600 hygiene kits have been distributed as part of this project so we are expecting many more schools to be reporting trachoma free in the next few months. We fully expect Kintore, Areyonga and Yuendumu to join them.

Loxton forms the district's first Rotary Satellite club

The first Rotary Satellite Club for District 9510 was established at Loxton during the **RC Loxton's** first meeting in September.

Earlier in the year as part of a membership drive, the RC Loxton went to its community to ask what they thought of the Club, and what activities it should undertake.

Although responses were positive – the community liked what Rotary stood for and had achieved, but they were still not enthused about joining as members.

When asked what the Club could be doing more of, the subjects of youth well-being and disability support were recurring themes. In raising these issues, around a dozen people put their hands up to be actively involved if projects with that focus were established – but still not as members. However, the RC Loxton was well aware that with an ageing membership

and gradually dwindling numbers, taking on significant new projects without an increase in personnel was not realistic.

Club member and DG Elect, Craig Dowling, was aware how satellite clubs worked and recognised the potential of this scenario. So, when the prospect of forming an independent Rotary Satellite Club attached to the RC Loxton was offered, rather than joining the established Club, 15 community members put their names down to be involved.



10 members were inducted, several others committed to join

So, on Wednesday the 14th September 2022, at meeting #3240 for the 64-year-old RC Loxton, the brand-new Loxton Rotary Satellite Club was born.

DG Paul Thomas conducted the induction and, as befits the significance of the occasion, the local Member of Parliament, Tim Whetstone, presented each new member with their Rotary pin and welcome pack.

History was made!

Morialta expands its Community Workshop

The **RC Morialta** has been operating a workshop in Campbelltown which has been so successful it has run out of room. It has been meeting the needs on mainly retired folk within the local community.

After extensive community consultations and meetings with City of Campbelltown, the club has decided to expand the workshop at a cost of \$126,000. In partnership with the Council, the Club has embarked on fund raising and was delighted to receive a cheque for \$10,000 from its neighbour and 'mother' club **RC**

Campbelltown.

A survey conducted in 2020 showed the workshop's members to be 87% male, 13% female; 61% aged between 70 and 85 years of whom 29% are 80 and over, 92% retired. 83% reside in Campbelltown city council area; 87% valued social interaction, and 76% being active and useful and 53% said they had skills they wanted to share.

Social interaction and doing something useful rated the highest reason for joining closely followed by desire to share skills; 29% expressed boredom at home. A significant number expressed desire to acquire new skills in all aspects of woodwork.

80-90% members rated equally satisfaction from producing goods, social interaction, friendship, shared activity and being useful, followed by sharing skill sets.

Significantly 30% reported an improvement in wellbeing and a similar number said family and friends had noted an improvement. 100 % were satisfied with their membership and 97% rated it as very satisfied.

The workshop is open four days a week and 59% of members said they attended once a week and 28% twice a week; 80% spent 3 hours per visit, 28% 4 hours or more.



Adelaide Peace Rotaract Charters

The latest Rotaract Club in the district, currently located in West Torrens, has held a number of meetings in August/September and was formally chartered at the African Village Centre restaurant on 28 September. The club chartered with 37 members.

They formed a partnership with the City of West Torrens and the Mayor has attended a meeting and welcomed the club into the Council area.

It has four strategic foci -Peace, the Environment, Business Networking and Applied Leadership. The Club will take part in the Adelaide Pride March.

The Club has two meetings a month on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays. The first is a Zoom meeting and the second in person at the African Village Centre restaurant 2A Northcote St Torrensville.

New members always welcome.



SA Police Officer of the Year 2022

CONGRATULATIONS go to Superintendent Mark Syrus, named the winner of the Rotary Club of Unley, SA Police Officer of the Year Award for 2022.

This award was established in 1978 in partnership with SAPOL to recognize outstanding service of police officers to the community and has been running for 44 years.

It is a community-based award where nominations are sought from the general public and organisations all over the state. It looks for officers who exceed the requirements of duty, volunteer in a significant way to give back to the community with courtesy, courage, kindness, understanding and compassion. This may be in the face of tragedy, trauma, natural disasters, or community development.

After 42 years of service at SAPOL, Mark is currently the Officer in Charge of the expansive Yorke Mid North Local Service Area. There were thirteen excellent nominations from across the state and Mark, nominated by David Wark of the Operation Flinders Foundation, was chosen for his outstanding record of community service to this organization since 1996. He has been deeply involved with organizing character and skills building 8-day Treks in the Flinders Ranges, as well as leading teams of at-risk young people Treks designed to transform their lives to become valued members of the community.

His direct and indirect influence, leadership, compassion, and experience has had an enormous impact on developing the self-esteem, motivation, resilience, ambition, leadership, teamwork, and responsibility, of thousands of young people over the 25 years of voluntary service which is regarded by Operation Flinders as unquestionable.

- 5. Collaborate with the 2024 District Conference Committee & District Rotary Foundation committee to weave the Centenary into the 2024 conference and End Polio Ute Relay.

In May 2022, Rachel Wills from the Rotary Club of Waikerie joined the committee in this role.

Both Heidi and Rachel have been in discussion about the best way to present the Centenary activities and projects to all clubs. Whilst not physically possible to get around to all clubs in the district plus the 7 SA clubs in District 9780, we aim to provide a slide show presentation that can be shown to members at meetings as well as organizing zoom meetings where possible.

There will be a centenary website and social media pages that will have updates and access to information of the different projects and celebrations planned.

ANNOUNCING THE 2022 POLIO MOVIE EVENT — THE LOST KING

For many years, the **Polio Movie Event** has been a very popular way for clubs to raise funds for **Rotary's number one priority, Ending Polio**. It's also an opportunity for Rotary members and people in our communities to have some fun together.

This year's movie is The Lost King, the story of the rediscovery, by an amateur historian, of the five centuries old remains of Richard III... in a Leicester carpark. Critics describe it as "an incredible and inspiring true story about perseverance and not taking no for an answer".

The movie will be released to the Australia and New Zealand public on Boxing Day, but the great news is that a pre-release of the movie is available for Rotary clubs during the week of *Thursday 1st to Wednesday 7th December*.

To arrange an event, talk to the group booking person at your cinema and make sure they plan to offer this movie to the public once it's released. The cinema can then make all the arrangements to source the movie from the distributor, Transmission Films — clubs don't need to get involved in that. The amount paid to the cinema is usually about \$10 per seat (that's up to the cinema) and a typical ticket price might be \$20 - and that's up to you. Please see the Movie Conditions below.

Movie Conditions:

- * All Rotary screenings must take place between 1st and 7th December.
- * You'll need to book your screening directly with your cinema.
- * Your cinema must seek approval from the movie distributor, Transmission Films, and tickets are not to be sold prior to approval.
- * Tickets can only be sold between Tuesday 1st November and Monday 21st November this is to ensure that the distributor has sufficient time to ship the film to your cinema.
- * If a session sells out, another can be added.
- * Only cinemas that have accounts with Transmission Films can participate.
- * The movie is distributed in Digital Cinema Package (DCP) format and this format can only be played at cinemas.

In order to participate, your cinema must have booked the film for a season of public screenings.
