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## Rotary Club of Unley celebrates 85 years

The Covid-19 delayed celebrations from 17 April were held in fine style in August in a Hollywood setting with both Governor David, Immediate PDG Tim and their partners in attendance. The club also received a congratulatory letter from RI.

Club historian Bob Mills said the club chartered from Adelaide has now 7 daughter clubs and 28 grandaughter clubs as well as 7 District Governors to add to an impressive list. Not to be outdone numerous Councillors and 9 Mayors have been members.

The Thrift Shop was established on Glen Osmond Rd in 1973 and though a number of iterations is now on Unley Road. About \$1.5m in today's currency has been raised.

Of the many club projects, the establishment of a club for War Veterans in 1945 was a highlight. At the Soldiers Memorial Gardens the club progressively provided a flagpole, fountain, Peace garden and rebuilt the Rotunda in 1995 where our annual Carols are held.

SA Police Officer of the Year was launched in 1978. Strong support was provided for indigenous health scholarships and more recently Purple House. There have been significant humanitarian projects overseas in Timor Leste, India, Cambodia, Indonesia and Peru.

DG David mentioned that the club continues to have an annual bowls tournament with its eldest daughter club, Mitcham, and has been doing this for the past 55 years.

#### Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholar Annika Theodoulou

It is with great pleasure that I introduce District 9510's Global Grant scholar, Annika Theodoulou.

With the support of our District, Annika will undertake a Doctor of Philosophy in Evidenced-based Healthcare at the University of Oxford. Because of Covid-19 Annika has delayed her start until Jan 2021 and is also able to at least begin her doctorate remotely from Adelaide. Annika is being mentored by the RCs of Unley and Misbourne Matins in the UK.

Growing-up in Adelaide, Annika attended Unley High School before moving on to study a Bachelor of Health Sciences at the University of Adelaide. Majoring in Pharmacology and Psychology, Annika achieved the highest mark for each and also received the Dean's Certificate of Merit. During her studies, Annika held a keen interest in sport, particularly volleyball. She served as a committee member for the Adelaide University Volleyball Club and went on to captain the Women's Division 1 team, in 2018.



Annika began her research career as a research assistant for a small, non-for-profit musculoskeletal research institute in Adelaide. During her doctorate, Annika will undertake a body of research which aims to improve health through behaviour change. This work will generate new evidence to better inform doctors, patients and policy-makers, with the aim to improve the prevention and treatment of non-communicable disease.

Rotary Foundation Global Scholarships allow very talented and committed people such as Annika to focus their learning on a specific area of need that is expressed in the lives of so many people living in impoverished circumstances. The resources we apply to Scholarship Students are multiplied many times when these scholars make changes to the living conditions of needy people. This outcome represents excellent value for achieving Rotary goals.

### Foodbank at Murray Bridge

Another large purple building associated with Rotary has now appeared at Murray Bridge. This is a new Foodbank opened last month and developed by the RC Mobilong assisted by the RCs of Murray Bridge and Tailem Bend.

Mobilong raised \$25,000 and the other two clubs donated \$5000 each. In addition a private donor gave \$50,000 and BHP \$45,000. All this covered fit out and the first year's operating expenditure.

Two working bees were held at the site and public meetings called for residents, support services, churches, schools and care givers to learn more about the project and for volunteers to work there.

The official opening is planned for October.

The evening started with Neville reminding members of his vision where each member will be part of 'the board'. Neville said, 'with a club of 19 members we should all be decision makers and not have a small few making decisions on behalf of everyone. We need to all be in this together'.

Each member wrote on sticky notes why they are part of Rotary and on another what motivates them as Rotarians. Future meetings will include looking at club branding and social media to highlight their work and to 'sell' the club story of service through fellowship.

The work achieved lends itself to forming a strategic plan which every member has had input into and therefore ownership of. The meeting had a positive vibe with energy I have not seen in the club before.

Understand how to set goals, motivate team members, and learn the skills you need to lead a group to accomplish a goal.



#### Rotary Club of Robinvale - Euston

The Rotary Club of Robinvale – Euston comprises 19 members from the border towns of Robinvale in Victoria and Euston in NSW, both located on the Mighty Murray River near lock 15 – it is truly a border community. The Club has been an active part of the community for 62 years and continues its good work especially in these trying times surrounding the Covid -19 pandemic.

One of the Club's key activities is the running of the monthly Country Markets but due to Covid-19 these have been cancelled. The Club's main fund raiser is its iconic donut van which is a prominent feature at each market, plus every other community event in the district.

Due to Covid-19, the donut van has been sitting idle, BUT early in August the Club decided to do something different – they obtained approval to set up the donut van in the IGA supermarket carpark in Robinvale on a Saturday morning with the hope of giving some of the community the joy of going to a take-away van to buy

the popular donuts.



Well, the response was overwhelming and by 1pm the Club was totally sold out of donuts. President Arthur Cassidy was thrilled to see the public's response to a Rotary initiative during this isolation time and is shown presenting a cheque for \$1,500 towards the Mental Health Program in Robinvale.

## Rotary Club of Waikerie

On Saturday 26th May 1962 a meeting of 23 prospective members was held in the Waikerie Hotel where a decision was made to form the Rotary Club of Waikerie. The club was admitted to membership on 10th August 1962 with 27 members and on Saturday 10th November 1962 the Charter was presented by the District Governor, Mr H H Cartledge in the presence of 350 guests and visitors.

The Sponsor Club was the Rotary Club of Loxton and still today both Clubs have strong membership and ongoing Community Projects.

Rotary in Waikerie enjoys respect and status in our community because of the strength of its membership and the quality of the many projects undertaken by the members.

There also is a long history of support to The Rotary Foundation, Australian Rotary Health Research Foundation, Polio, Shelter Box, Indigenous Health Scholarships and many Australian and International projects. The Club also has been involved in District and International Grants.

The decision in 1964 to open an Opportunity Shop to receive, sort and sell second-hand clothing to those in need from the wider community has proven to be the most strategic decision made by past Rotary members.



Operated as a project by members and partners the turnover has grown from the modest early days (10 years to total \$7,000) to now over \$65,000 per year. This project has also given the "Friends of Rotary" the opportunity for Community Service, Fellowship and Community Support and has provided a stable funding base for the Club to undertake its local and wider projects.
