## **SHARING IDEAS-THE CLUB CORNER**

OUR NEW THOUGHT SHOWS ALL THE HARD WORK AND EFFORT THAT CLUBS ARE EXHIBITING IN SERVICE TO OTHERS.

Hillsborough-continued their long tradition of supporting their town's Social Services Department by donating thousands of dollars in the form of gift cards and sorting donated gifts for families in need. They also remembered members of the military branches through the laying of wreaths on the graves of veterans in their local cemeteries.

Newark-donated monies for the purchase of cooking pots for the Maasai Girls Fund.

Hamilton Club-donated paper products for Mobile Wheels of Hamilton in addition to kitchen towels, oven mitts and hot pads for the clients of Mobile Meals. They also worked with the Hamilton Police Dept in the Toys for Tots program and collected food items for 24 days for eight local food pantries.

Morristown-worked with the Westfield Club in funding and distribution of clothing for Homeless Vets Program at Lyons Vets Center and also collected funds to help the Interfaith Food Pantry. In addition, they serve meals at Mt, Bethel Church's Table of Hope, provided gifts to two mothers and their children through the Battered Women's Shelter, helped the Salvation Army with the annual bell-ringing program with close to \$1,000 dollars collected, purchased socks for men at Homeless Solutions and re-opened their grants program due to a successful 50/50 fundraiser.

Clinton Sunrise-will be hosting a Cardboard Boat Race in July right before the Great Hunterdon Duckie Race. Proceeds from the Duck Race will go to the Cancer Support Center of Central New Jersey.



Dunellen/Green Brook- is sponsoring a Winter Coat Drive along with scarves/gloves/hatsongoing until Feb 15. Check with the club for drop-off check points.

Plainsboro-North and South Brunswick-hosted a virtual run to encourage fitness and health with progress tracked using a mobile app. More than 100 participants signed in and raised over \$2000 and they also held a blanket drive partnering with Project Linus for a smooth distribution to those in need. They also organized a clothing and shoe drive with over 100 bags of clothes and shoes collected. Their Interact Club ran a Farm to Table fundraiser collecting over \$1000 -the vegetables were handpicked from Hallock's Farm in New Egypt.



Nutley Club-wrapped poinsettias and delivered them to the senior center with some going to town offices to show support. They are also raising funds for their projects by selling popcorn and items from the Pampered Chef.

Fanwood-Scotch Plains-Thanks to member and community involvement-the club raised over \$12,000 for masks sold at the local Farmer's Market and which is still going strong, \$9,000 was raised for health care providers at Overlook Hospital for PPE. They also ran a Toys for Tots program which was an overwhelming success due to community and member donations-children received items they wanted and enough money was raised to give each family a \$100 gift card for essentials at ShopRite. For their Day of Service-they are holding a Winter Hat and Glove Collection to benefit Boys and Girls Clubs of Union County which ends on the 18<sup>th</sup> of January.

Newton Club-They are releasing \$75,000 from their restricted fund for a new cardiac lab over a three- year period in increments of 25,000 dollars each in 2020/2021/and 2022. They are also engaged in a Global Grant in Sri Lanka involving Children's Heart surgeries.

Branchville-sent 358 Christmas/Holiday cards to victims of violence or their family members. This was the first year for this endeavor.

Roselle-Roselle Park-held a Community Winter Sock Drive led by Rotarian Courtney Washington. Hundreds of socks were collected and donated to The Elizabeth Coalition for the Homeless and the Elmora Presbyterian Church Food Kitchen for those in need.



Branchburg-is partnering with other veteran organizations and hopes to present more than \$76,000 to provide special services for needy veterans. They have raised \$32,000 worth of food to the Somerset County Food Bank. They are also celebrating three decades of Humanitarian Service in Nepal through the ASHA Project which provides thousands of dollars each year for health camps, school supplies, education scholarships to home building projects, micro-credit loans to helping needy children.

Dare to Be Great Global EClub-This club is very active and is embarking on an International Debate Competition, a Become an Expert/Write a Book Program, a Read-a- Thon, several Youth Summits, a Global Song Contest, and much more. Elizabeth-held its first Virtual Taste of Elizabeth which raised approximately \$5,000. They also doated toys and clothing to 12 local children with the Angel Tree through the Salvation Army. Their sponsored <u>Linden Satellite Club</u> held a Kids Coat Drive benefitting The Apostles House and also hosted two toy drives with the Apostles House and the Linden Fire Department's Toys for Tots.
