It is up to leaders to ensure that Rotary is a harassment-free area according to Katey Halliday, a member of Rotary International's Inaugural DEI Task Force. She is also a project officer and training facilitator in the DEI Branch of the South Australia Police.

SHARING IDEAS-THE CLUB CORNER

We are telling our stories which highlights all the hard work and effort that clubs are exhibiting in service to others.

The Rotary Clubs of Denville (Denville Sunrise and the Rotary Club of Denville) spearheaded the renovation of a basketball court at Peer Place, an affordable housing complex. They worked with JCP&L, the Morris County Housing Authority and Denville Social Services and local vendors. Plans are on the drawing board for the renovation of Santaland in the spring and summer.

The Newark Club has presented some interesting programs to include a presentation by Amed Moukoro who visited his home in West Africa and commented on his family's involvement in Rotary. Rotarian Nakeicha Wilson discussed the Rockhouse Foundation and its efforts in Jamaica and will hear a talk by Bridges Outreach. They also plan to hold PHF inductions sometime in February. AG Richard Russo and PE Sophia Modu will be cited for attaining PHF+1 status and Rotarians Gail Alba and Joseph Casale will attain PHF+ 3 citations. The South Amboy-Sayreville Club completed a Blood Drive with the American Red Cross. They are encouraging new members to join so that they can become a club with 100% Paul Harris Fellows-as they were in the past.

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Club is pleased to announce that one of their members, Gene Janotti, has been appointed a trustee for the Union County College Foundation. UCC is located in Cranford. They are planning a fundraiser for April and more details are forthcoming.

The Nutley Club is working to help the VFW fix the exterior around the building with park benches donated by the town and also working with the town to replace the concrete around the flagpole and adding 5 smaller ones to for each branch of service. They are also working on several fundraisers-one is a virtual Trivia Night for March. They are also collaborating with Interact with a Sock Drive. The Robbinsville Hamilton Club has been involved in several initiatives: Collecting of pajamas to support Lala and Mimi's Pajama Project to provide this necessity to children in need-check with President Tom Damm for locations to ship pajamas. The club partnered with Be Kind, Inc. to deliver more than 700 coats, 150 hats and assorted cold weather gear to Sandro's Coat Rack. They were also involved in providing winter survival kits and socks to the Rescue Mission of Trenton and 400 unwrapped toys and puzzles to three local organizations. The club also provided food for its Send Hunger Packing project for the Mercer Street Friends Food Bank.

The Newton Club worked with Landscape Architect David Wright to design and construct new walls, paver walkway and plant shrubbery around the club's food booth at the Sussex County Farm and Horse Show at the NJ State Fair grounds.

The Union and Kenilworth Clubs joined together to induct four Paul Harris Fellows-Norman Woolley and Julie D'Aloia of the Union Club and Kristin Boyle and Nova Vitug-Thomas of the Kenilworth Club. Telina Cuppari was welcomed as an honorary member of the Kenilworth Club. Richard Fisher of the Union Club sponsored the Paul Harris Fellows.
