March 29, 1973-American Military forces withdrew from Vietnam and in 2017 this date had been designated as the National Vietnam War Veterans Day. In honor of Vietnam veterans-the State of New Jersey has awarded those veterans the following medals: the NJ Vietnam Service Medal for those who were on active duty in any branch of the armed forces of the U.S. in Vietnam, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia or the contiguous waters or airspace on or after Dec. 31, 1960 to May 7, 1975 and the NJ POW-MIA Medal which can be acquired by the next of kin or surviving spouse. There is no fee or charge to receive these medals. Because of COVID-the medals can be requested through the mail. Contact the N.J. Dept. Of Military and Veterans Affairs, ATTN: DVS-VBB (awards) P.O. Box 340, Trenton, NJ 08625-0340. Since a number of our clubs are working with veterans and families-this information would be of value to them. Note that we will be honoring men and women of the armed services at our district conference.
