

# Thank you IPDG Nalongo Rosetti Nabbumba

On 29th June 2021 The Morning Crew, a group of morning loving Rotarians hosted a momentous

fellowship to say Asanteni (thank you) to Immediate Past District Governor (IPDG) Nalongo Rosetti Nabbumba Nayenga na Karibuni (welcome) to District Governors (DGs) Young of D9214 and John of D9213. The fellowship opened by District Governor Elect (DGE) Mike Kennedy Ssebalu and moderated by Past Assistant Governor (Maama Bubbles) Jane Kabugo, attracted a whooping over 250 Rotarians. The conversation that ensued justified the interest, love and appreciation showed to our leaders! In this article, we take the opportunity to say a very big thank you to IPDG Nalongo Rosetti!

Despite a very abnormal year challenged by COVID 19, Nalongo and her dream team did exceedingly well! During the period, the district brought on board over five hundred (500) new Rotarians, thirteen (13) and Sixteen (16) good quality Rotary and Rotaract Clubs respectively out of a target of ten (10) each. The District also received Five Million Eight Hundred Thousand US Dollars (5.8M) in Global Grants against a target of Four Million (4M).

In addition to the illustrious quantitative achievements, the District hosted a very successful Zone 22 Institute that saw leaders from all member districts come to Uganda, learn from each other and enjoy the camaraderie of District 9211. Then there was the innovative glamourous, majestic and celebrating women "Bubble" District Conference and Assembly themed "The end of an Era and Beginning of New Dawn". At this event D9211 celebrated the year's achievements as well as the birth of the two new districts D9213 \$ D9214 from which PDG Rosetti got her name of Nalongo (mother of twins)

Rotary is great at providing opportunities for innovations. During the year, Governor Rosetti introduced the FAN (Fitness and Nutrition) campaign that saw most of us take to exercise and good nutrition. Normally Rotarians look after other people and forget about themselves. This campaign inspired Rotarians to focus on their health and wellness so they can be in good health to serve humanity well. As a result, clubs and Rotarians happily and passionately embraced the campaign and many good testimonies have been told. Then there was the Rotary Roses, a new fellowship that evolved out of an Award program introduced for growing women in Rotary. Both these initiatives have since become international, improved the image of our district, changed the lives of Rotarians and the communities we serve, and attracted new Rotarians.

Finally yet importantly, we say a very big thank you to PDG Rosetti for the support given to our new DGs Young & John as they prepared to lead in this Serve to Change Lives year 2021/2022. Both Young and John shared about her constant checking in to ensure they were very ready. Governor Rosetti also had key advice in the few remaining hours to the end of the Rotary Year. She implored clubs to ensure they update their achievements in the Rotary International system (Rotary Club Central), transfer any foundation contributions collected, and finally pay all outstanding dues to ensure the two baby districts start with clubs in good standing.

Such is the leadership of our dear PDG Rosetti! She praised her team that she said was of the highest quality possible! We praise her for the excellent achievements against all odds. We look forward to having her as the Zone 28 Assistant TRF Coordinator. She will also be the District 9213 Trainer!

So our journey starts here as the District's strategic goals beckon to us.







# Managing the Transition from D9211 to D9214

During the District Conference and Assembly hosted in Mombasa, the then District Governor Geeta Manek delivered two babies namely Rotary District 9211 and 9212. She has since assumed the prestigious name 'Nalongo' (Mother of two)!

Since that time District 9211 has made strong strides and achieved positions of fame like being the best giving District in Africa; securing its position among the fastest growing districts in the world and of course producing the Rotary International President Elect in the name of Sam F Owori (RIP). Despite the tragedy that befell us, we are consoled that we managed to produce a rotarian worth the respect of the global leadership acclaim.

A few years ago, the district leadership realized that we were continuing to perform so well and were convinced that District 9211 would produce two districts. Special appreciation is extended to PDGs Emmanuel, Bob, Ken, Shamilla, Xavier, Jayesh and their teams for spearheading this growth. A team that was selected to handle the details came up with recommendations and action points to have the two districts. Another Nalongo in the names of PDG Rosette Nabbumba has produced two districts in the names D9213 and D9214.

Several meetings have been held to look at what 9214 would be in the next five years. A strategic plan has been developed in line with the Rotary International strategic guidelines. The new leadership has discussed these issues at length. Several clubs have given

their feedback and this is what we shall look at in the next five years, with a possibility of creating another 'Nalongo' or hopefully a 'Salongo.' this time around.

The District leadership is in place with a District Governor (DG Young), a District Governor Elect (DGE Peace) and a District Governor Nominee (DGN Francisco). The 2021/22 teams have been fully constituted. The three Governors and their teams continue to hold joint meetings to ensure an exotic preparation and continuity.

We plan to grow by a minimum of 250 quality Rotarians per year for a start and achieve a retention of 75% at the beginning. The more the hands in service, the better the service delivery. We shall focus on achieving 43% Lady Rotarians as well as attracting the young Rotarians aged 40 years and below; notwithstanding the need for tested ideas of the senior citizens. The search for corporate partnerships will continue to grow. There must be a deliberate effort in all clubs to improve the diversity of their memberships. \*Each one bring one\* shall be our focus.

Rotary is known for solving problems of the world. This has been done with support of more than 4 billion US dollars since 1917. This money has always come from us and has been invested wisely. The returns have seen us spend an average of 100 million US dollars in the recent past around the world.

The idea of a ZERO giving club is expected to be out of date. Each one of us will strive to **DO GOOD IN THE WORLD** by contributing something towards our initial target of 150,000 U.S dollars. The initial target of utilizing 1.3 million U.S dollars will continue to grow over the years. The cost of living going higher especially during this pandemic should indicate to us that the cost of loving needs to increase as well.

Our youth, the Rotaractors, have now been elevated to being partners. This partnership will be expected to match what is being done in Rotary. Planning and working with the youth will help the Rotarians grow a good breed of successors. The Rotaractors' transiting into Rotary will be as a result of what they see us Rotarians doing. Our youth will be requested to support their younger siblings, the Interactors. The energies so far displayed by Rotaractors can only be harnessed in this e-world.

We do not have a choice about adaptability. In the past, it could have been easier to be a BBC (technologically noncompliant) and you continue to live. Today's world requires us to be e-literate. It requires us to know that online meetings can take us where we may not physically go soon. These meetings will help us bridge the gap in communities. The District International service team will continue to look for partners for us. Our public relations will have a big bearing on how we tap into this reality. We shall keep our brand standards and utilize all available media.

The days of small projects should be considered gone. We need to consider impactful projects. We need to look at joint activities with our sister clubs and baby clubs. We need to share the successes some clubs have achieved to train others. The leadership has provided Grant support and formulation officers and cadets. The choice to use or lose them is entirely ours. Our target of utilizing USD 1.5m every year can only be achieved when we qualify for Global Grants; when our stewardship is unquestionable and when we don't take ages to submit reports. Periodic visits by the stewardship teams to ongoing global grants projects will be encouraged. We don't need postmortem observations in implementation.

Training of Rotarians shall be key to improve on knowledge. The position of a Monitoring and Evaluation officer at all clubs shall be encouraged.

The imaginary line between Districts 9213 and 9214 shall be bridged with the continued good relationships, visits and support to one another. We shall be ears on the ground to bench mark good practices from other districts and also loud those great ideas from those who are willing to bring them on table to further the growth of our district 9214.

Let us all commit to serve to change lives.

Looking at the history of the clubs that constitute D9214 we will need to focus on training and mentorship. We need to make

sure that our Presidents are not Presidents for prestige or recognition, but they really truly understand the meaning of Rotary and service.

The strength of Rotary is its strong systems. We already have our processes and procedures in place, they will guide and lead us. More so we have strong and passionate leaders that understand why they are where they are and how to guide and lead us.

To ensure we manage this change effectively we shall focus on channeling the district's strategy to the club and individual member level. It is paramount that we identify model clubs so that they can play an active role in supporting clubs that lack behind or fail to understand the true spirit of Rotary.

#### How can every Rotarian play an active role to make sure D9214 has a successful maidan year?

Let me challenge every club to have each Rotarian pledge in this first month of our Rotary year how much they will contribute

# The Journey of D9211 and the Birth of D9214

In the Rotary Year 2011-12, in the then District 9200 (which consisted of Rotary Clubs in Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, South Sudan, Tanzania and Uganda), it was proposed that the district needs to be re-organised as it had grown too large both in terms of number of clubs and number of members. In the Rotary world, reorganizing a district by splitting into 2 new districts is always welcome as a definite sign of growth. There is also reorganization involving combining districts when numbers fall.

It was clear from the earliest discussions that Kenya and Uganda would be in separate districts due to the number of clubs & members in each country, while Eritrea, Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Tanzania would have the option of joining either Kenya or Uganda in the formation of the new districts.

The Tanzanian leadership deliberated on the matter and recommended joining Uganda which was duly approved by all clubs in Tanzania. The basic reasons were a greater identification in Tanzania with Uganda and the very good cooperation between Tanzanian and Ugandan Rotary leadership.

The new District 9211 thus came into being made up of clubs and members from Tanzania and Uganda.

In 2012-13 – the reorganization task gathered pace under the then DG of D9211 Geeta Manek. PDG Emmanuel Katongole moved to the role of District Governor Elect and I was District Governor Nominee. The first District strategy planning meeting was held in Tanga and first DTTS of D9211 was conducted in Zanzibar. D9211 was formally born on 1st July 2013 with 115 clubs & 2,939 members and has grown from strength to strength. It was therefore inevitable that the same conversations that developed in 2012 would come up again in 2019-20, that the district was becoming too big and required re-organization.

Today D9211 has grown to 190 clubs and 5,550 members, becoming the 11th largest Rotary district out of the 528 districts in the world.

Bulk of the spectacular growth has taken place in Uganda which started with 76 clubs & 2,261 members on 1st July 2013 and has 142 clubs & 4,772 members today, a 111% growth in membership. The greatest growth has come from Kampala and its suburbs while the other areas have seen modest growth. Rotary in Uganda is perceived as the organization to be part of by professionals, businesspeople and most important by many in public service. Further, participation by key members of the government, the parliament of Uganda and the national leadership has added very significant value. A lot of the recognition and appreciation from the national leadership

has originated from the outstanding projects like the Blood Bank, Cancer Hospital and many others made possible by the popular Cancer Run that was fashioned on the Rotary Dar Marathon in Tanzania. Many women have joined, ensuring good gender balance and have also brought in a fresh perspective with many in Rotary leadership positions. Also encouraging is that the membership increasingly consists of young established professionals from the private and public sectors. Credit must be given to the Rotary leadership in Uganda for their strategic actions and commitment to Rotary. Overall, the future looks bright for Rotary in Uganda.

Growth in Tanzania has been very slow starting with 39 clubs & 678 members on 1st July 2013 to 48 clubs and 778 members today. The bulk of the growth is in Dar es Salaam, Kilimanjaro and Arusha. The total would have been higher had it not been for the loss of over 15 clubs over the years largely because of mismatched expectations from the formation stage leading to a drop in membership and eventual closure. This was a critical lesson that led to change in approach to formation of new clubs. The Rotary Dar Marathon and its outstanding projects like the Cancer Hospital, Entrepreneurship Centre, Water for Schools etc., for the first time raised the profile of Rotary leading to increased recognition, participation and corporate support. Official recognition for the same however was underwhelming. Membership in Tanzania is largely composed of private sector professionals and businesspeople, with participation from the public sector and national leadership remaining a challenge. One of the most promising trends though is that club closures have stopped, and some clubs are making very positive efforts to grow and set up new clubs.

Over the past few years, almost all growth both in Tanzania and Uganda has come from extension efforts (formation of new clubs), with very little growth from existing clubs. This implies that greater effort is necessary in all clubs to focus on the value proposition of Rotary (Community Service, Fellowship, Personal Development and Networking), to enhance member engagement with the objective of retention and attracting new members.

The split of D9211 was initially a concern and more specifically regarding the position of Tanzania. Uganda, on its own, is capable of splitting into 2 districts (minimum requirement is 1,100 members) but Rotary in Tanzania could not form its own district. The discussions and the final decision with the excellent cooperation of Rotary leadership in Uganda made it possible to split the district into D9213 being a wholly Uganda district and D9214 a district made up of Tanzania and part of Uganda.

D9214 will start with 99 Rotary clubs with 2,358 members and 56 Rotaract Clubs with 927 members. Going forth all reports of clubs and members will be a combination of Rotary and Rotaract as they now have the same status. While Uganda is likely to see sustained growth, a greater focus is now required on Tanzania both in terms of club extension and club growth. This will require customising the Rotary value proposition to be attractive to potential & existing members and using the flexibility recently provided by RI in membership types and club types to develop alternative models to traditional clubs that will appeal to a larger section of society.

One thing that Tanzania can be proud of is that while in D9211 and with a much smaller membership, the community service projects carried out by Tanzanian clubs attracted almost 50% of the overall funding and the projects carried out were cited as some of the best. We are good at serving the community, so let us now encourage more people to join so that we can significantly increase our ability to "Serve To Change Lives", the RI theme that D9214 will start its journey with.

# **Introducing DG Young Kimaro**

For the first edition of our UBUNTU newsletter, Rotarian Hamza Kasongo, also a member of the public image committee of the district 9214 held a virtual interview with DG Young Kimaro. In this interview DG Young takes us through her personal life journey as well as her Rotary journey. In addition, the DG speaks of her District Position goals.

### DG Young's personal life

**Rtn. Hamza:** You are far from your birthplace Seoul, Korea. Kindly tell us how you arrived at your home Mwika?

**DG Young:**I ended up in Mwika after meeting a very special person when I was a student at a graduate school in America which I was attending with Fulbright scholarship and he with Rockefeller.

**Rtn. Hamza:** How did you meet this special person?

**DG Young:** I was a political science student who passionately disliked politics. The only reason I studied it was because of my father whose dream was that I follow his footsteps into politics.

The only way I could keep myself from half interest in my graduate studies was African politics. In the 1960s, many African countries were becoming independent. Many leaders like Kwame Nkuruma, Jomo Kenyatta, Seku Toure and Mwalimu Julius Nyerere, captivated my young mind with their speeches and writings.

When I was looking for Mwalimu Nyerere's "Education for Self Sufficiency," a friend got me in touch with a Tanzanian student on campus. I called him and behold, he had it.

**Rtn. Hamza:** You have mentioned several leaders of yesteryears that intrigued you. How come you invested so much on the late Mwalimu Nyerere?

**DG Young:** It was his African socialism. His dream of a society without rigid social strata and everyone being equal, at least as I understood it then, was very appealing to me, as a young rebel who objected to rigid social strata and sense of entitlement that comes with it. Those were the times when ideology democracy, communism, socialism, imperialism – were hot topics that added to political tensions around the world.

**Rtn. Hamza:** I am curious to know when and where you met to receive your book from the Tanzanian student?

**DG Young:** It was at the State University of New York, in Binghamton, N.Y., in U.S.A. He brought the book to me. After a week, he demanded it back. When we ran into each other in the library, to my surprise he was quite charming and asked me out.

**Rtn. Hamza:** This is quite exciting, so afterwards you went on and got married. Kindly share the name of your husband?

DG Young: Kimaro. Sadikiel Kimaro.

**Rtn. Hamza:** Please tell us a bit about your marriage. How was it received by your families and friends?

**DG Young:** It came as a shock to both families. In those days, Koreans kept very much to themselves. Marrying outsiders, even if they are Chinese or Japanese whose looks and culture are very similar, was still frowned upon. A few years above, a friend of my brothers who married a Japanese woman and was disowned by his family.

My family almost succeeded in separating us. But I had a second thought. I have only one life to live. Should I not take charge and decide what was right for me? So, I went against their wishes. Over the years they got to know and love him, perhaps too much because now, if Kimaro and I have an argument, they all gang up on his side.

**Rtn. Hamza:** After you completed school, what was next for you two as newlyweds?

**DG Young:** Kimaro was away from his home, Mwika, for 10 years and he didn't waste even a day after his PhD dissertation was defended. But before leaving the U.S., he did have interviews with the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.

After teaching economics at the University of Dar es Salaam for few months, he became disillusioned. Then the country was so steeped in socialism, he felt that economics he had studied in the U.S. had little relevance there.

Meanwhile, unbeknownst to us, the IMF was trying to reach him with a job offer. By luck a neighbor, who happened to be working in that telex office, saw the last and final attempt by the IMF to reach Kimaro. He rushed the telex to us in person. We packed up and returned to the U.S., despite my emotional protests.

**Rtn. Hamza:** When you arrived in Tanzania, what was your first impression of it?

**DG Young:** I Korea in 1971 was one of the poorest

countries in the world. Its per capita income was lower than Tanzania then. I was enchanted by the houses I saw in Moshi and the beautiful Livingstone hotel we stayed overnight. The following morning, Mount Kilimanjaro revealed itself in all its snowy glory, towering over Moshi. That took my breath away. It was love at first sight.

**Rtn. Hamza:** Upon arriving at Moshi and Mwika, how was your transition?

**DG Young:** When we arrived in Moshi, no one was at the airport to meet us. We had been delayed by a week in the U.S., and had no means of contacting them. His family, after having waited for us day after day at the airport, had just given up and returned to Mwika.

The road trip up the muddy slopes of the mountain in a cranky old sedan taxi was quite an adventure. When we finally arrived at Kimaro's home, a loud cry rang through the farm alerting all of our arrival.

Kimaro's mother was the first to reach the car. She took our little infant into her arms and began to sing and dance with the baby cradled in her arms. That so touching. My father in-law, when he was offered the baby, shook his head and put hands behind his back. After we had settled in, he came, having washed off sweat and soil from farming and dressed in clean clothes. He stretched out for the baby. That said it all.

### DG Young on her Rotary Journey

Rtn. Hamza: How and when did you join Rotary?

**DG Young:** I was encouraged by two people: the then DG Stephen Mwanje and Kimaro.

When DG Mwanje came for his visit to Moshi club, he stayed with us. At that time, I had joined a Lion's club in Moshi, following my father's footsteps, and was its incoming president.

DG Mwanje challenged Kimaro to start a Rotary club in Mwika. He wished I would be the club's charter president, but no. I disagreed. It should be a person from Mwika. Indeed, Kimaro recruited into Rotary a prominent medical doctor, Professor John Shao, a son of Mwika, who was heading the regional hospital, Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre, in Moshi. He rightly became RC Mwika's Charter President. As for DG Mwanje, he kept his promise and came to charter our club.

**Rtn. Hamza:** How come you left the position to become the president and start the club from scratch?

**DG Young:** Our main wish, when we returned to Tanzania, was to give back. At that time, we were living in Moshi, as Mwika had no internet

connection then. Lions club kept me occupied in service in communities around Moshi and beyond. When the opportunity came to do service in Mwika through a new Rotary club there, it was an opportunity I could not miss.

**Rtn. Hamza:** What projects that were executed well by you and your club and are still memorable to you?

**DG Young:** Three stand out.

Foot bridge projects, for one. The slopes of Kilimanjaro are full of streams. Villagers depend on tree trunks laid across the streams with, at times, wooden planks placed over them. But with high humidity and frequent rains they rot through in no time or get carried away in flash floods. Each year, several people were known lost their lives by falling from the bridge.

During the long rains, when rains last for 3-4 months, children may miss school, villagers cannot take their produce to the market, health centers, though they are visible from across the stream, cannot be reached, etc. RC Mwika decided to change that with concrete bridges.

At the first opening of the bridge, it was as usual. Rotary Club President cut the ribbon. Then we came up with ideas to enhance villagers' sense ownership of the footbridge. At the second opening, the club President invited the village head to cut the ribbon with her. At the third opening, we adopted an MOU and had it read out and signed by the village chair, quoting the moving very words spoken by a village priest at the second opening. "This bridge was built by the villagers of Lole with help from Rotary Clubs of Chico and Mwika. The bridge ours and we will keep it in good shape for our children and our children's children." From the fourth opening on, a plaque which are placed by the bridge head inscribed that the bridge was "built by the villagers", with support from Rotary Clubs and Mwika residents. We have so far built eight concrete bridges.

We have so far completed seven computer projects. For that, schools had to meet several pre-conditions: (1) a separate room is set aside for a computer lab, (2) the door and windows of the room are grilled for security, (3) furnished appropriately for computers, (4) the room has electricity connection, (5) computer lab fee charges have been approved by the school board, (6) provision has been made for the fees to be set aside to cover computer lab operation and maintenance costs. We realized later that (7) a staff is assigned fulltime to manage the computer lab should be added.

The third was a school mentoring project to improve school management. Five poorest performing primary schools in the area among 24

were twinned with five best performing ones.

We held retreats in poor performing schools. Students, parents, teachers, and management were grouped separately into focus groups to make everyone feels free to express their views. Two representatives each of students, parents, teachers and management from their high performing twin schools participated to share their experiences.

In the morning, these four groups met in different rooms, discussing what they thought were reasons for poor school performance and came up with recommendations for actions the school should take to address these problems. In the afternoon, all groups assembled and shared their findings and recommendations for actions.

This was repeated in three rounds, six months apart. The exercise unearthed many disturbing happenings in schools. To our surprises, students pleaded their teachers to give them homework. They complained of some teachers coming to school drunk. Some would be away from the classroom for hours, or send them on errands to the market or send them to their farms to do work. These misdeeds being brought out into the open did bring about change for the better..

### **DG Young on District 9214**

**Rtn. Hamza:** For those who are not familiar with Rotary, what is all this district splitting about?

**DG Young:** Rotary is thriving in Africa; Rotary is growing unlike the First World where Rotary has become aged and shrinking.

Since Rotary came to Uganda and Tanzania, we have undergone redistricting, many at times, even within my short Rotary memory, I recall we had been District 9200, then 9211 and now 9214. Each time it was caused by growth in membership. This time also. Membership in District 9211 had grown to 5,000+ members and more than 180 Rotary clubs, too large for one district to handle. So again, we are splitting into two districts.

Uganda could have become two independent districts on its own, but their Rotary heart led them to keep one part of it to remain with Tanzania till we grow into our own district. Before long, we hope Tanzania too will grow into its own district and grow further to have more than one district. Yes, we should grow more to change more lives.

**Rtn. Hamza:** When you take your role as the DG, what is your vision?

**DG Young:** My vision for D9214 is to call for teamwork at all levels and youth focus. But before we go into that I would like re-emphasize that "Rotary is What Rotary Does." We recognize that "the" actors who shape our District and Rotary are

our clubs are at the center of what our District is. We, District officers, are here solely to support, encourage and enable clubs to do more to save lives.

Teamwork at all levels – within clubs, across clubs, across district committees, and across districts – where sharing, collaboration, brainstorming together will enable us to arrive at better solutions and achieve more than we could ever do on our own.

Youth focus. The district takes collaboration with the Rotaracts beyond Rotary International's recommendation that every district have Rotaract presence in District committees, and clubs Boards.

All Rotaract District Leaders are incorporated into the District Team to deliberate and make decisions together with Rotarians so that we are all on the same page and the signals given to Rotarians and Rotaracts are consistent.

We will continue to promote Rotaract

Rotary joint projects, and enable them to gain hands-on experience in projects from conceptualization and planning, to implementation and management.

We encourage youthful club leadership to reenergize clubs and make them vibrant and innovative, combining them with experience and insights of senior Rotarians to support and guide them.

**Rtn. Hamza:** As we come to the end of this interview, what words do you have for fellow Rotarians and friends of Rotary?

**DG Young:** For fellow Rotarians, let's do more to get the good work of Rotary known to the general public. Let's reach out to the leadership in our communities, to those leaders who are known for their integrity and commitment to the good of the community. Let's join hands with them so that together we can achieve more.

Let's do more to get the good work of Rotary known to our members, to make them feel good, to become energized and inspired to stay engaged.

To those who are not sure whether they want to commit themselves to become a Rotarian, I would like say "You don't know what they are missing."

What we Rotarians give of our expertise, time and money to serve is so small compared to what service to humanity gives us in return. There is a strong sense of meaning to our lives and inner peace. Then we have the luxury of being surrounded by the caring company of Rotary family, and humbling encounters with so many admirable Rotarians who live by their values. What more can we ask for?

It is very impactful watching Rotarians getting involved in innovative activities that are catalyzing the change and development of our community. Together with Rotarian and UBUNTU writer Catherinerose Barretto who was the TEDxOysterbay Lead Curator, we bring to you an insight of the TEDXOysterbay event that took place in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania and brought the Dar Es Salaam community as well as many Rotarians.

Mahatma Gandhi said "The future depends on what you do today", let's take a step back and think what are we doing today to grow the leadership we need in our Rotary community? Does this mean setting up an elaborate project, or could it be something as simple as providing a learning and networking opportunity? The Rotary Club of Bahari Dar es Salaam saw TEDxOysterbay 2021 as an opportunity to inspire and motivate future leaders in their personal and professional journeys.

The current economic climate and the Covid 19 pandemic drew the TEDxOysterbay team to focus on immediate needs closest to home. The team took a step back and looked at the big picture: Why should we, as a society, continue to invest in our sustainable wellbeing and development? How can we work across borders, barriers and political boundaries to make positive change? And what returns can we expect on our investments? Featuring talks by some of Tanzania's most inspired thinkers and doers, TEDxOysterbay looked at what changes have taken place around us, what we can learn, and what more needs to be done to ensure the health and well-being of future This year's TEDxOysterbay generations. speakers included storytellers, musicians, a psychologist, a creative entrepreneur, a molecular biologist, a techpreneur, a chef and a 10 year old poet.

Through their sponsorship of 10 Rotaractors to attend TEDxOysterbay 2021, RC Bahari recognised that the TEDx experience would provide a vibrant and engaging space for Rotaractors who are on their own leadership and professional journeys, and give them the opportunity to engage with diverse people and knowledge. This was an event held in the city, easily accessible by various modes of transport, where Rotarians would also be present - providing an opportunity to strengthen the relationship between Rotarians and Rotarctors. Rotaractors also had the opportunity to see Rotarian, Next Generation Director and molecular biologist Brian Tarimo on the TEDxOysterbay 2021 stage. What better way to model the leadership we need, by showing that it is indeed possible?

Rotarian Brian Tarimo is a research scientist at Ifakara Health Institute (IHI). Brian is trained in molecular biology and bioinformatics and his research focuses on mosquitoes that transmit diseases such as Malaria and Dengue. Brian leverages his knowledge and skills to understand why certain mosquitoes are better than others at transmitting these diseases by looking at the complex interaction between mosquitoes and the parasite they carry. Through his research, Brian hopes to gather novel insights that will lead into the identification of potential new strategies such as drugs or vaccines for the control of vector borne diseases.

The Rotaractors who attended TEDxOysterbay said it was an eye opening experience, where they were able to connect and engage with a very diverse group of people, some whom they might otherwise not encounter in their day-to-day life. They enjoyed engaging with and learning from Rotarians, and were inspired by the TEDx speakers and their ideas. Some were even motivated to join the TEDx community, and apply to speak at the next TEDx!

However, we have not let this become our downfall but an opportunity for us to learn and come back stronger.

It has not been easy for me as the President to accept this hard fall, I felt like I had lost everything, disappointed and utterly ashamed of the loss, but I had to think about the timeline and the limited funding that we have gained throughout this challenging time as many people have been affected by the pandemic since 2020 till currently and my team. As the President, I have not let this drag us behind, but I have allowed this to become a life lesson. I have learned that you should keep moving with your head up high no matter what as you punch through the harsh obstacles thrown through your path.

We are soon to finish this project and hand over the books to Mtakuja Beach Secondary School and accomplish our goal in combating one of the Sustainable development goals endorsed by the United Nations. I hope this won't be the last to hear from the DIS and Hopac Rotary Interact club as we are ready to make changes for more future leaders.

#### **Disease Prevention And Control**

In the area of disease prevention and control we saved a life by supporting a heart operation for a student worth Ugs: 15 million and also Enhanced the safety of health workers by providing 700 face shields to Kiruddu National Referral hospital and St. Francis Hospital Nsambya.

We appreciate our partners in service RC Wobulenzi, RC Calgary, RC Vienna, RC Burlington, RC Muyenga Sunday Sunset and RC Muyenga Tankhill. Member participation in projects was commendable with over 400 hours invested in club projects.

We maintained close collaboration with our rotaract clubs by conducting joint projects and fellowships as well as supporting Rotaract youth leadership programs like RYLA and ROTA. Our membership growth has been minimal with a total headcount of 122 members. Attracting and nurturing new members was a challenge due to the limited physical interaction. On the upside we managed to start up a new club RC Butabika Royals making it a total of 13 RCM sponsored clubs todate.

At the district and international level we were able to host the World Polio Day celebrations. Our Past District Governor's PDG Emmanuel Katongole and Kenneth Wycliff Mugisha were Co-Chairs for the Africa Zone 20 Institute successfully held at Munyonyo Commonwealth Resort in December 2020. PDG Emmanuel was also appointed as the RI President Special representative at the DCA in Accra as well as the Chair Peace Major Gifts Initiative for 2021-22. He was also appointed among the African Centennial Rotary Heroes. The District Chair Monitoring and Evaluation, Vice Country Chair and Two Assistant Governor's for D9214 have been appointed from Rotary Club of Muyenga. These appointments reflect the quality of the Rotary Club of Muyenga membership profile.



All in all, we have more to celebrate and we believe that we have opened opportunities for our community and ourselves. Our ability to adapt to the requirements of the new normal, focus on member engagement, great collaboration with partners and utilization of synergies has enabled Rotary Club of Muyenga to remain afloat and achieve great milestones this year.




As the president of RC Nsangi, I do expect a lot from my members as we have plans and goals to achieve this year.


