Message from District Governor Dean Kennedy



Spring is here and with Spring unfortunately comes disasters. Within District 5690 we have had a major disaster with the fires in many locations of Kansas and Oklahoma. Rotarians in many of

our communities have seen the loss of home, business, and possessions for those in their communities. I would encourage each club in the District to discuss this disaster and determine how their club can best assist using our "Service Above Self" motto. So many times we think about doing good in the world that we overlook that we can do that good right at home. It is my understanding from Jade in Hutchinson that financial assistance to rebuild is what is needed now. The United Way of Reno County is assisting with this and Ashland Community Foundation is working in Clark County as well as many others that you might find.

We have several important events coming up with PETS in WICHITA, District Assembly in Dodge City, and Rotary/Southwestern RYLA Leadership Camp in Winfield. All of the dates and information are listed in this newsletter. I encourage each of you to get involved in these events. Each Rotary Club has a scholarship to send one student to



Rotary/Southwestern Leadership Camp so all you have to do is find the student who can be a Freshman, Sophomore, or Junior in High School and get them to camp. Now is the time to act on each of these events.

Rotary bylaws require the RI Board to complete a comprehensive review of the 34 Rotary zones no less often than every eight years to ensure that each zone has an approximately equal number of Rotarians. The Board's previous review of the zones occurred in 2008 so it is again time for that review. It is almost certain that we will see a change of zones in the United States during this time based on our decline in membership. This will also be a time that they will look at Districts. Many Districts in the world currently have 3 times the number of clubs and members compared to District 5690. As RI President John Germ has stated before. "we have to keep Rotary relevant" which means we need to change with the times and change is coming.

In the membership report for February 28, 2017 District 5690 was the only district of the 15 districts in our region that did not show a decline in membership. Wait, before we celebrate it is important to note that we



More than a century later, this philosophy inspired the member benefit program Rotary Global Rewards, launched 1 July 2015. In addition to receiving special offers on a variety of products and services, members can offer discounts from their own businesses, giving Rotarians an opportunity to save money, while supporting fellow Rotarians locally and globally.

Focus and increase humanitarian service


More than 35,000 active projects were posted to Rotary Showcase, an online site that allows Rotarians and Rotaractors to share stories of their clubs' successful projects. This reflects Rotarian contributions of more than 12 million volunteer hours. over \$380 million in cash donations, and almost \$265 million in in-kind donations that fuel our efforts to improve the quality of life in communities worldwide.

Enhance public image and awareness

Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio received coverage from major media outlets, including the BBC, People magazine, and The New York Times. Pope Francis even recognized our efforts during a Jubilee audience in April. By showcasing Rotary on global platforms, we share our story with the public and make our causes even more visible.

Clubs and districts now have resources to effectively tell the stories of their projects and achievements. The Rotary Brand Center offers the templates and tools needed to prepare visual and digital materials, with many new resources to come.

RYLA—Rotary Youth Leadership Camp Coming SOON!



Some people may define a leader as one who is in charge of a group or activity. However, a true leader is a servant first. Rotary Leadership Camp offers an opportunity to discuss the possibilities and responsibilities of being a servant leader, and highlights what Rotary is doing in different communities!

In response to survey results, RI has been working to improve the learning experience for club leaders. First, the September mailing of club officer manuals to district governors-elect will move to July this year. The manual Lead Your Club: President will be the only club resource mailed. Other resources will be emailed or appear online.

Second, club officers responded in surveys that they're not always aware of the resources available as they take office (see graphic below), and that they would prefer taking an online course to help begin their year.

To assist club officers, online courses for each role will debut in the <u>Learning Center</u> in July. The courses will include specific manuals and additional resources for their role. We hope these courses will provide support whenever your club officers want it.

Also, this change will improve club officers' access to key information. An online course allows us to post the latest information as it becomes available.

Please update your training calendars to reflect the earlier mailing date for club resources, and look for the new club officer courses.

Our club will also help make dinner for Ronald McDonald the Midtown Ronald McDonald House in March.


