Freshman, Sophomore, or Junior year in high school. The cost is only \$300 per student and includes housing and meals. Now, that's a deal!

At RYLA Camp, students will learn the about the concepts of servant leadership. They will discover that they cannot truly be a leader without first being a servant. Students will learn about the importance of motivation and teamwork by participating in a group service project. They will set goals to help make a difference in their schools. They will learn about what Rotarians and Rotary Clubs are doing to make their communities a better place to live. And, of course, there will plenty of time for fun activities like dodge ball, a cookout, a movie, swimming, and ice cream!

RYLA Camp falls during the same week as several other statewide youth leadership events, which may preclude your club from sending some of the more visible youth leaders in your community. In January, we had 61 members in our club, an increase of about 40 percent from the beginning of the Rotary year in July, when we had 43. Our success has been based on two ingredients: encouraging friendships and promoting fun in Rotary.

But just as important to our growth has been a systematic and continuous follow up with potential new members. Too often a potential new member is approached once and then forgotten. Every club needs a champion or champions willing to take the extra time to stay in communication with *every potential new member*. I am often asked where I find all these potential new members. Our sources grow as we come up with new ideas. Below are some of the practical ways we have found members:

Follow up on RI membership leads:

Prior to my year as District 5060 membership chair, I discovered that <u>some of the membership leads sent to us by</u> <u>RI (https://my.rotary.org/en/document/connectmembership-leads</u>) were never contacted. I decided to work my way back in time through the leads, going as far back as several years, to see if any of these individuals were still interested in Rotary.

One gentleman in particular had never been contacted and was enthusiastic to be invited as my guest. Not only did he join, but he asked if his business partner could also be considered for membership. Of course my answer was "yes" and now both are members. These are people who took the time and made the effort to contact Rotary International.

Get referrals from other clubs:

I have found that sometimes a member of another club crosses paths with a co-worker who they think would be a good Rotarian, but because they are co-workers, or they have a boss-employee relationship, they don't want to invite them to be a member of their club. If something were to happen at work, it could create awkward situations in the club. Yet that person might be a great fit for another Rotary club. So I routinely go through the membership lists for the other clubs in my area and ask for referrals. I know this works because we have Kyle as a member of our club who was referred to us by a member of another club.

Find leads in your local newspaper:



The Wenatchee Confluence Rotary Club's new members class of October 2018. Membership chair Rob Tidd says do something to make new members feel special, like framing their certificates and interviewing them during their induction.

I get excited every day to see who I might find as a potential member in my daily newspaper. Our newspaper includes information about the movers and shakers in our community, the recently retired, new home purchasers, and new businesses. The list is endless. I craft specific letters and follow up in 30 days. Often it is not even necessary to follow up because the recipient is touched by the letter and accepts the invitation for lunch at my club. I know this works because we have Jeff in our club because he responded to my letter.

Keep organized with a spreadsheet:

I created a spreadsheet with a list of potential new members, and set up a schedule to follow up with these people. My list includes recommendations from club members in my club, people who have given presentations at my club, former Rotarians who left other Rotary clubs in my area due to dissatisfaction or lack of engagement with their former Rotary club, and recipients of the letters I mentioned above. Systematic and continuous follow up is so important. This list helps me stay on track to make sure no one is forgotten.

I hope you find this information helpful. May you also be successful in your quest for new members.

Rotary Teaming: Bonding, Building or Development?

Rotarians gather and meet, serve, and fellowship; but why do we do this? We do this to bond as Rotarians, to network as professionals and to meet a need in our community as caring citizens. What we are doing is team-



ing; coming together as a group of people to reach a common goal. However, teaming really has three levels according to Michelle Cummings of Training Wheels. Ms. Cummings identifies three levels of teaming as:

- **Team Bonding** refers to fun, recreational programs that may involve some networking and rapport build-ing.
- **Team Building** offers teams the opportunity for growth, reflection, and potential ongoing learning.
- **Team Development** is ongoing 'deep-dive' work that focuses on behavior change and team performance.

All three serve a useful purpose, but it's important to know what each level entails.

Team Bonding

- Is designed around a simpler goal or outcome of having a good time.
- May follow a specific schedule but is not catered to an end goal.
- Typically, does not require reflection time.
- Can act as a stand-alone event.

Team Building

- Is designed around a goal or outcome as identified by Rotary or your community.
- Has intentionality.
- Is designed and/or facilitated by trained facilitator with skills in facilitation techniques.
- Allows for built-in reflection time where Rotarians reflect on their experience.

• May include follow-up work.

factor Team Development

- Is designed around long-term, targeted organizational goals.
- Has a multi-phase curriculum including behavioral assessments.
- Includes a minimum of one program a quarter and ongoing coaching for team members.
- Is facilitated by an experienced facilitator who works closely with the club and perhaps Rotary International.
- Outcomes include behavioral and organizational change.

It's important for Rotary leaders to clearly define club goals for each activity. This then will drive the level of teaming your leadership will use. Remember, there's nothing worse than a Rotarian, community partner, or prospective member expecting one thing and your Club delivering another. And the flip side of that, Rotarians, community partners and perspective members can sometimes expect your Club to deliver something outside its capabilities. Establishing what is realistic with your fellow Rotarians, discussing outcomes with a community partner or in your club's orientation can help all have a positive Rotary experience. These three teaming categories are easy for your club's leadership to incorporate into its planning and goal setting process.



Rotary Club of Colby After School Program—A Community Project

The After School Program has been in existence a number of years and was started with grant funds the school received. The Colby Public Schools, USD #315 coordinates the After School Program. It is held Monday-Thursday for students in Kindergarten through 6th grade. The program is open from after school until 5:30 p.m. Fall 2018 enrollment for the program was 165 students.

After the original grant funds were depleted and school funding was so tight, it was questionable whether the program could continue. Area businesses and organizations, including Colby Rotary Club, rallied and donated funds to ensure this valuable community program would continue. The program is free to students who qualify for free lunch status. There is also a reduced fee (\$20 per month) for students who qualify for reduced lunches. The regular monthly cost is \$45.00 per student. These fees help offset the cost of the program.

There is a program coordinator and multiple school staff members who rotate each week and assist each day at the program. The goal of the program is to provide students with a structured environment while their parents are still at work. Many students would not have a place to go until their parents get off work. The program saves valuable time for the parents as well, not having to leave their job to pick their child up immediately after school as they can remain at work and pick their child up after the end of their regular work day.

The students that attend have a snack, do a structured activity and also receive help with homework. The Colby Community College men's basket-



ball team members have been regular visitors which is a highlight for the students.

The students have an annual spaghetti supper and craft sale to help raise funds to sustain the program. The K-State Research and Extension organization helps with this annually. Colby Rotary Club and the Colby/Thomas County Chamber of Commerce partner each year on a golf tournament as a fund-raiser for both organizations. As part of the registration for the tournament, a community organization is selected annually to be the recipient of a donation each golf team has the option of contributing to. In 2018, the After School Program was the designated recipient for these donations.

Several years ago, Colby Rotary Club also presented the 'Andy & Elmer's Apple Dumpling Adventure' books to the After School Program . The books are a Rotary Literacy Project and promote the ideals of the 4-way test.

Rotary Club of Colby 2018-19 Service Project

WHO IS...?WHO WAS...? Book Series is a new project introduced to our club this year. The books are a series of biographies on a variety of inspirational people such as presidents, entrepreneurs, leaders, and other well-known present day and historical figures. The project is timely as this year's Rotary International theme is "Be the Inspiration." The books arrived recently at Pioneer Memorial Library and our goal to provide the full set of 150 books for the whole community has been reached

. The club purchased a display stand and there is a sign with the display that reads: "Be the Inspiration—Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Colby."




Global Grant in Colombia for Hospital

Both Districts 5690 and 5670 have committed \$2,500 from their District Designated Funds (DDF) to support a \$63,000 grant assisting the Cucuta, Colombia Erasmo Meoz Hospital. Partner clubs are RC San Jose de Cucuta in Colombia and RC Houston Baytown.

The hospital serves areas in both Colombians and Venezuelans "living" in Cucuta due to its location on the border. The absence of pediatric medical equipment requires immediate assistance due to the number of Venezuelans requiring hospitalization and surgical and emergency care not available in Venezuela.



Rotary Club of Wichita Launches History Book



The Rotary Club of Wichita celebrated the launch of its just released history book of our club. It is titled "This Is the Wichita Rotary Built: The Making of a Legacy!"

Members of the Rotary Club of Wichita have written a book about the influence the chapter has had in the city's history.

"This is the Wichita Rotary Built:

The Making of a Legacy!" a 55-page book, was given to members at Monday's Rotary Club meeting at Botanica. It was written by Bob Hamrick with contributions by the club's History Committee. Those members, in addition to Hamrick, are Clark Bastian, Eric Cale, Bill Gardner, Arlen Honts, Jan Luth and Eric Melgren.

Bastian, past club president (2009-10), catalogued more than 24,000 pages of information on the club and its contributions to Wichita.

"Wichita Rotary began like a social arm of the Chamber of Commerce," Bastian said in a statement. "But it quickly became a movement of movers and shakers, determined to help Wichita develop economically and culturally. It was a special privilege to combine historical images from Rotary files with the stories about the club's dedication to improving Wichita literally changing the dynamics of this community."



The RC Wichita has more than 400 members and was the 30th Rotary club chartered in 1911. Additional copies will be provided to public libraries.
