
Message from District Governor Dean Kennedy

Important Rotary dates for club membership figures

Received from RI Membership Minute newsletter, April 18, 2017—Important!

Please note this important change that affects your Rotary membership figures:

If you have new members you want counted in your membership achievements for the current Rotary year, they must now be reported to RI on or before 30 June.

- Members <u>added</u> with 1 July 2017 effective dates will no longer be included in your annual 1 July 2017 membership start number, but they will be billed on the 1 July 2017 club invoice and counted toward 2017-18 membership growth.
- Members <u>terminated</u> with effective dates on or before 1 July 2017 will reduce your club's 2016-17 membership achievement, reduce your 1 July 2017 membership start number, and will not be billed on the 1 July 2017 club invoice.

As a result, it is possible for your club's July 2017 annual membership start number to be lower than your July 2017 invoice if new members were added with a 1 July 2017 effective date.

In summary, beginning immediately with the 2016-17 Rotary year, new members added on or before 30 June will count toward the current Rotary year, while members added with 1 July effective dates will count toward the new Rotary year. We hope this simplifies your reporting and reflects your membership more accurately.

Rotary Foundation 2017 Rotary Fiscal Year-end Deadlines

Please note the following for Rotary Foundation (TRF) Contributions:

- Credit Cards: Online via www.rotary.org must be authorized prior to 30 June 2016, midnight (CST).
 Fax: (+1-847-328-5260), phone (866-976-8279), or mail to RI Headquarters—must be received prior to close of business on 30 June 2017. For security purposes, do not send credit contributions electronically.
- Checks: must be *postmarked* on or before Friday, June 30, 2017 and received by The Rotary Foundation by July 7, 2016. Checks must be *dated* no later than June 30, 20176.
- Wire transfers: Must be initiated prior to Friday, June 30, 2017 and received by Monday, July 3, 2017.

Please do NOT send in checks for the 201-18 Rotary year until July 1. 2017. All checks received with June postmarks go toward 2016-17 contributions.


Rotary's role in achieving peace: Members explore topic with EU officials

The meeting was the first of its kind at the EU and was modeled after the tradition of Rotary Day at the United Nations. Rotary members, EU officials, and business leaders at the two-hour event asked how business and civil society organizations like Rotary can work with the EU to achieve the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals and build more peaceful and stable societies.

The event was coordinated with the European Commission and organized by Michel Coomans and Hugo-Maria Schally, RI representatives to the EU, with the support of Kathleen Van Rysseghem, Philippe Vanstalle, and Nathalie Huyghebaert, the governors of the Rotary districts in Belgium and Luxembourg.

"At Rotary, we believe that we can only respond by forming smart partnerships in which the EU, governments, civil society, the private sector, and other organizations all play an important role. This is why the growing relationship between Rotary and the European Union is a cause for optimism," said Hewko.

Because the EU supports the global polio eradication effort, organizers of Rotary at the European Union are confident that there are other opportunities for collaboration between the organizations.

Rotarians Being Servant Leaders—compelling reasons

Robert Greenleaf popularized the term – SERVANT LEADERSHIP in 1970. He defined a Servant Leader as "The servant-leader is servant first...It begins with the natural feeling that one wants to serve, to



serve first. Then conscious choice brings one to aspire to lead. The difference manifests itself in the care taken by the servant-first to make sure that other people's highest priority needs are being served. The best test, and difficult to administer, is: Do those served grow as persons? Do they, while being served, become healthier, wiser, freer, more autonomous, more likely themselves to become servants? And, what is the effect on the least privileged in the society? Will they benefit or at least not be further deprived?"

Marcel Schwantes, in his *Inc.* online article gives 10 convincing reasons to consider servant leadership – according to his research. His opening statement says, "Servant leadership is a powerhouse leadership style that will transform your culture and impact your bottom line." For those of us in Rotary, we can look at transforming our club and impacting our membership and communities.

- 1. Organizational effectiveness is high
- 2. Servant leadership pumps up the team with confidence, which leads to high-performance
- Servant leadership leads to more helping and creative employees
- Cleveland Clinic study increasing employee engagement and improving patient satisfaction by "hardwiring" servant leadership into the culture
- 5. Greater job satisfaction
- 6. The Jason's Deli Study increasing job performance, customer service and employee retention
- Because these successful organizations operate as servant leadership cultures – Chick-fil-A, Home Depot,

U.S. Marine Corps, UPS, Ritz Carlton, Whole Foods, Starbucks, Southwest Airlines

- 8. The incredible turnaround of Popeye's Louisiana Kitchen seeing tremendous growth by every measure
- Datron World Communication where in five years turned a \$10 million company into a \$200 million company
- 10. Servant leadership companies outperformed *Good to Great* companies!

Our clubs are not that different from our businesses; we want engaged Rotarians, impact on our communities, satisfaction of those we serve, and growth. Using the 10 characteristics of servant leadership (Google the characteristics) will drive our clubs to increasing success in all metrics.

Schwantes concludes with the quote from Angela Ahrendts of Apple "Everyone talks about building a relationship with your customer. I think you build one with your employees first." Perhaps Rotarians should change this quote to read "Rotarians talk about building a relationship with your service partners. I believe we build one with our fellow Rotarians first."

April 19.


