My Rotary Moment

**Leslie Bissell, 2016-17 President
Rotary Club of Liberal**

My first introduction to Rotary was through my employer. When I interviewed at the agency, I was informed that, should I ever become executive director, I would be expected to join Rotary as had many of the executive directors before me. Every Tuesday at 11:55 sharp I would hear my boss would say, “Time for Rotary” and watch him head out the door for lunch. When he resigned from the agency, it was now my turn to join Rotary.

Perhaps like many of you, my initial impressions of Rotary were of a group of aging men, singing songs, and having lunch at the club. As the months passed, I wondered how I even fit in. Then last year the theme “Be a Gift to the World” hit home for me. I am not in any way a male senior citizen who owns his own business – on the contrary, I am a female 40-something who runs a non-profit agency.

In my day to day interactions with members of my community, I began to realize that my gift to the world was unique. I have the training and position to be able to see the very real needs of our community. I have access to leaders in our schools, college, and the community at large. I also have access to the largest humanitarian organization in the world. Most importantly, I am a member of a club committed to service here in Liberal, KS.

One day I was listening to school personnel share their ever growing concerns about the risk of suicide for our teens and young adults. My heart broke, knowing that resources to address this issue are scarce for both schools and mental health professionals. Later that afternoon, I began to wonder if my club could apply for a district grant to help bring education and resources to those who need it. With the support of the Liberal Rotary Club, we were able to bring suicide prevention training to our community last year. When I asked school personnel if and how they would be able to be involved, I could hear the sigh of relief – someone had heard them and was responding with resources.

In that moment, I became a Rotarian – I could see how I could do good in the world by being just who I am. Since then we have trained at least 120 teachers, first responders, and other community partners about the risk of teen suicide. I am also happy to say that my club has decided to continue the efforts to make Liberal a suicide safer community in 2016-2017 by extending our efforts to increase suicide prevention for our veterans.

Today I am proud to be a Rotarian, because I know it makes a difference not only in southwest Kansas, but around the world.

Rotary at the Kansas State Fair

FISH

A philosophy Rotarians can live by



As we settle in to our new leadership roles in our clubs and in the district, we can't help but think; "How can we better." One philosophy that may help us in Rotary, started in a fish market in Seattle, Washington. The Pike Fish Market made a commitment to be better, but how? The same question that Rotarians are asking themselves. The market's team came up with a four-part philosophy and it caught on and is now used in thousands of organizations globally.



MAKE THEIR DAY – Make their day is taking that little extra step you don't usually take, and it's especially satisfying when people don't expect it or

when they need it most.

PLAY – No matter where you are, there are ways of playing – laughing, joking, smiling, singing, high-fiving fellow Rotarian or simply looking at situations with an easy demeanor. You don't need to (as the Pike Fish Market workers do) throw fish.



CHOOSE YOUR ATTITUDE - Invent an approach to life – an attitude – that inspires you. Take it into life with you every day. You can choose to live more joyfully, responsibly and wholeheartedly. And the next day you can choose again. An the next day



after that, and the day after that... Each day brings many opportunities to make choices about your work life, your personal life and your life as a Rotarian, the first of which is your choice of attitude.

MAKE THEIR DAY – If you want to make someone's day, find someone that you wouldn't normally interact with and offer to help with anything he or she needs.

BE THERE – Being there requires you to let your guard down and experience the openness of an authentic or even difficult conversations. But the relationship that can come from such conversations is well worth the risk.



While this simple philosophy seems like second nature to some of us, it will take a little commitment, work and continuous practice to create this culture in our clubs and around the district. This is where your leadership comes into action. Start with yourself. Reach out to your board with this philosophy. Make this part of your club's meetings. Most important – dedicate yourself to making Rotary the best organization for women and men of your community; the one they want to associate with, the one that is known for excellent service and the one that positively changes your community and our world.

NOTE: There are books written about this philosophy, FISH is found on YouTube, Google "FISH" and you will find many links – all of which will be helpful for your culture building in your club and in your professional life.

Our Greatest Gift to Future Generations

Polio can affect children anywhere. The poliovirus doesn't discriminate based on geography, skin color, or religion. If we don't eradicate polio now, the world could

see cases rebound to 200,000 new cases every year, within 10 years.

I've participated in 27 immunization campaigns, leading 23, throughout Africa and Asia, not because I'm a polio survivor, but because I believe polio eradication will be one of our greatest gifts to future generations.

People sometimes talk about how much money we can save if we eradicate polio. It's reported that we could save \$40 billion to \$50 billion over the next 20 years if we eradicate the disease soon, and the economic impact on families and communities that are affected by polio is staggering. Martin Limbird first joined Rotary in 1984 in Ames, Iowa, and became a charter member of the Murcicle (Indiana) Sunrise Rotary Club in 1994. He served as club president in 2001-2, and, in 2004, his wife Mary Catherine, a cross-cultural trainer and ESL teacher, joined the same club. Martin was appointed to the 2016 Seoul Convention Promotion Committee and as Chief Sergeant at Arms for the 2016 International Assembly. In September, 2010, the Limbirds moved to Fort Collins, Colorado where Mary Catherine is an active member of the Fort Collins Breakfast Rotary Club and PEO, and Martin belongs to the Fort Collins Rotary Club.

DR. CHERYL RUDE

Dr. Rude is a professor of Leadership Studies and Academic Director of Leadership Southwestern, Leadership Southwestern is a nationally recognized program which emphasizes learning and practice. The leadership team is comprised of approximately 40 students from all different majors and activities at the college. Members learn about team dynamics, personal strengths and weaknesses, ethics and styles of leadership which are then practiced through service. Dr. Rude is also the Co-Founder of District 5690 RYLA Camp with the Winfield Rotary Club in 1995. The RYLA partnership with the Leadership Team at Southwestern College is ongoing having held camps for over twenty years.



JUDGE TOM WEBB

Judge Tommy Webb is no stranger to District 5690. He is a past President of the Rotary Club of Sublette and a Past Assistant District Governor for District 5690. Tommy's life story has challenged students, educators, business professionals and government organizations throughout the country. His challenge, "You Can Make A Difference!" has been given at District 5690 RYLA annually.



LESLIE SCHWEITZER

FRIDAY EVENING KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Schweitzer is the Chairman, Founder and President of Friends of American University of Afghanistan, a 501(c)(3) based in Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American University of Afghanistan's (AUAF) Board of Trustees. AUAF is the first not-for-profit, co-ed, private university in the history of Afghanistan. Leslie was instrumental in acquiring funding from the U.S. Defense Department to build the International Center for Afghan Women's Economic Development, a 20,000 square foot building dedicated to women's empowerment. It is built on the International Campus of AUAF in Kabul, and she also envisioned and acquired funding to start the AUAF Business Innovation Hub, to promote entrepreneurship. It is housed inside the center in Kabul and in Herat.

Schweitzer's career in international business and development spans over four decades. She was one of the first American women to do business in China in the 70's and her experience includes Russia, Central Asia, Europe, South and Central America. She is currently the CEO of The Osage Group, focused on business innovation in developing countries. Schweitzer formerly served as the Senior Trade Advisor for the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and led a nationwide trade education program.
