Hurricane Harvey Relief

Rotary districts collect emergency funds for Hurricane Harvey victims

Rotary clubs along the Gulf Coast of Texas and Louisiana, USA, are collecting emergency relief funds to help flood victims of Hurricane Harvey, which slammed into southeast Texas over the weekend.

Severe rainfall has caused historic flooding along the Texas coast, including in Houston, the fourth largest city by population in the United States. Deluged towns in the region are in desperate need of aid as thousands of residents were forced to flee their homes. About 6.8 million people have been affected by the hurricane, which made landfall on 25 August.

Several districts <u>located along the Gulf coast</u> in Texas and Louisiana have established disaster relief funds, including districts <u>5890</u>, <u>5910</u>, and <u>5930</u> in Texas, and district <u>6200</u> in Louisiana. You can find information about how to contribute to other district funds in Texas on district <u>5840</u>'s website.

"We know that a disaster of this magnitude will require our financial assistance for months into the future," says District 5930 Governor Betty Ramirez-Lara. "Our disaster relief committee will provide support where we believe it can best be used."

<u>ShelterBox</u>, an independent charity and Rotary's project partner, is also providing support to families displaced by the storm. Hundreds of light privacy tents will be deployed to evacuation centers throughout Texas for families to use temporarily.

"Our normal tents and ShelterKits are not appropriate for the conditions families are experiencing in Texas," says James Luxton, ShelterBox operations team leader. "The flooding is covering large swathes of land, and is set to rise even further in the coming days, making indoor shelter the best option."

2018-19 Rotary International President Selected

On September 1, RI President Ian Riseley declared **Barry Rassin** to be Rotary International's President-elect. Rassin is a member of the Rotary Club of East Nassau, New Providence, Bahamas and will take office 1 July 2018.

Barry Rassin earned an MBA in health and hospital administration from the University of Florida, and is the first fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives in the Bahamas. He recently retired after 37 years as president of Doctors Hospital Health System and continues as an adviser. He is a lifetime member of the American Hospital Association and has

served on several boards, including the Quality Council of the Bahamas, Health Education Council, and Employer's Confederation.

A Rotarian since 1980, Rassin has served Rotary as director and is vice chair of The Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees. He was an RI training leader and the aide to 2015-16 RI President K.R. Ravindran.

Rassin received Rotary's highest honor, the Service Above Self Award, as well as other humanitarian awards for his work leading Rotary's relief efforts in Haiti after the 2010 earthquake there. He and his wife, Esther, are Major Donors and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation.

3 Dimensions of Purpose

The Ovation Factor took a vacation last month due to its writer being distracted with travel to China. However, while this writer is still in China, this column appears in our newsletter this month. This short hiatus gave

this writer an opportunity to think of the international nature of Rotary. So, this month's column focuses on what we gain from being a network of engaged individuals in a worldwide force for doing good.

Many of us have visited clubs in other parts of the US. We exchange banners, connect with other American Rotarians, listen to a program in our native language and hopefully realize that Rotary is bigger than our own club. A few of us from our district have had the opportunity to travel to a different country and visit a club during our trav-



els. This experience shows us even more how similar we are to people of different backgrounds and how Rotary ties us together to do good in our world. And yet even fewer of us from across our district have had the opportunity to work

with another club in a different part of the world; an experience that transcends the languages and boarders that divide our world.

While working and living in Shanghai, China I have connected with the Rotary Club of Shanghai. Since 2004, I have had the pleasure of teaching in China seven times. Each time, I get my Rotary fix by attending the Shanghai Club meetings. On occasion, I participated in a service

project; my first was to distribute wheel chairs to needy individuals in a group home. This year, I helped staff the club's outreach display at the Shanghai Expat Expo. These opportunities have given me the chance to

get to know many Rotarians and Rotaractors from around the world; all of whom are living in China and participating in Rotary. Rotarians from Germany, Ireland, Italy, El Salvador, India, Japan and other parts of the world coming together to do good in their adopted home. What a wonderful experience! But more importantly what a way to see firsthand how Rotary has a global impact.

So 'what's your point' you may be asking now. Well, I realize not all of us will be able to travel abroad. However, each Rotarian, each Club and certainly our district can be "international" through hosting a year-long stay of an international high school student who is participating in the Rotary Youth Exchange Program, sponsoring a Global Grant with a district outside the US., serving as hosts to the various international programs such as RITE or Open World, or pulling together a team of Rotarians for a Vocational Exchange. If you're traveling - visit a club. If you are working overseas as a short-term or long-term expat, get involved with a local club. Invite expats in your community to become a Rotarian in your club.

Our global network of Rotarians gives us a unique chance to be a world leader in our communities and expose our fellow Kansans to cultures and people many of whom will only read about in geography books or newspapers. Help Rotary promote global peace through becoming "international" across our district.


