Additionally, we will be hosting a Rotary-UN Model Day in conjunction with the Peacebuilding Conference at the South Shore Cultural Center for a diverse group of local high school students. Students will be focused on two resolutions related to equity in education and teaching peacebuilding skills in elementary and high schools. Students will begin their research on their assigned countries in February and will come prepared to present, debate, caucus, amend, and vote on resolutions. The student caucus leaders selected by the students will present their resolutions at the end of the day to Rotary President Ian Riseley, Rotarians, and Community Leaders attending the Conference.

Presidential Message

Rotary International President Ian Riseley's Message - December 2017:

"Seventy-two years ago, the United Nations was founded "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war ... [and] to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbors." Despite those worthy aspirations, and generations of investment in achieving them, the "scourge of war" is still with us: Last year, more than 102,000 people died in 49 armed conflicts around the world. Some of those conflicts were in their fifth decade or beyond. Terrorism, intolerance, and extremism; the refugee crisis; and environmental degradation are now global challenges.

Collectively, we seem further than ever from achieving the goals that were set with such ambition and on peace but on *peacebuilding*: We will share ways that we can work to build peace through the service of our Rotary clubs and districts. Five of the one-day conferences will illuminate the connections between peace and another area of focus. The first conference, in Vancouver, B.C., will explore the link between peace and another sphere of great concern to us in Rotary: environmental sustainability. Dear fellow Rotarians,

As we pass the halfway point of this Rotary year, it's time to take stock of what we've achieved so far and what we still have to do. The Rotary Citation is not only an honor, but also a useful tool that helps clubs plan their service. Club leaders will receive an achievement guide by email in mid-March, with valuable resources to help you reach your goals. If you're on track to receive a citation, congratulations! Your club is well on its way to a very productive year.

Here in Evanston, we are working hard to achieve the goals that Rotarians have laid out for us. In a Rotarywide survey of Rotarians and Rotaractors, 90% of respondents asked for improved training, better methods to connect with other clubs, more planning resources, and better online tools. In response, your 2016 Council on Legislation passed a \$4 dues increase that is now allowing us to invest in the improved resources, processes, and technology you've asked for.

One of the many improvements we've made (and are continuing to make) has been to Rotary Club Central, which has been completely redesigned to be faster and easier to navigate. As you already know, this year we are asking all Rotary clubs to submit two numbers to Rotary: the number of volunteer hours worked and the money invested in service. The fastest and easiest way to submit these numbers is through Rotary Club Central. If you're already tracking your projects using Rotary Club Central, make sure you've entered the number of volunteer hours and amount spent for each project you're tracking. Otherwise, remember to enter those two key numbers in the Goal Center, under the Rotary Citation tab.

On 23 January we unveiled changes to the global grant reporting section of the Grant Center. You'll find that the report has an updated look, its content has been aligned with the global grant application, and the financial portion will be much simpler to use. We hope these changes will make it easier for clubs to report on the tremendous work that they accomplish through global grants.

One of the new initiatives I'm most excited about in this Rotary year is the Group Cultural Exchange program, a type of Rotary Friendship Exchange that brings together international teams of Rotarians, non-Rotarians, and young professionals. Annual Fund Giving Setting Records!

You continue to set a new record for Annual Fund giving this year. Last year, at this time, clubs had given a total of \$101,623 to the Annual Fund. This year, that total is \$104,859.07. We are well on our way to breaking the \$200,000 ceiling.

Our goal continues to be to have every club have 100% of its members donate *something to* the Annual Fund. We hope each member will give \$25 or more, but the important thing is to have everyone part of the wonderful work of The Rotary Foundation.

At the end of last year, we had 13 clubs where every member had given something to the Annual Fund. So far this year, we already have five clubs either there or almost there: Bad Axe, Birch Run, Frankenmuth Morning, Oscoda, and Saginaw Sunrise.

Since early January, Cass City, Clare, and Frankenmuth have made major increases in the number of members contributing.

Rod Bieber has begun again tracking the clubs with the highest per capita giving. Eileen will track the clubs with close to 100% giving. Treasurers, send in that money you have accumulated. Rotarians, give a lot and give often. The competition is heating up. Let's set new records!

New Year in the Battle Against Polio By Chair Chuck Cusick

We have begun a new year of our battle to eradicate polio. Afghanistan has reported three cases of the wild poliovirus, the only cases reported thus far this year!

Pakistan and Afghanistan have scheduled polio immunization days for early February. Pakistan aims to vaccinate 37 million children, Afghanistan will vaccinate across 24 provinces. This joint effort should interrupt transmission of the virus across the border.







\$200,000 goal for 2017-2018






Annual Contributions as of February 1, 2018


PolioPlus Progress Report

Trip to Zambia — Room for More!

Rotarians from our district are planning a trip to Zambia. We are looking for a few more travelers to join us. The Rotary Club of Mt. Pleasant, with participation from several other clubs, has completed four Global Grants with the Ndola Mukuba Rotary Club in Zambia. A fifth project is underway.

For several years, the Ndola Mukuba Club has been inviting us to visit them and see our projects. Paul Siers is organizing a trip. We will depart on June 1st and return on June 12th or 13th.

We will spend three days in Ndola, a couple of days in Lusaka (the capital), and several days at Victoria Falls in Livingstone, where we can take part in a lion encounter, a rhino walk, and a boat safari. Back in Lusaka, we may visit Lower Zambesi National Park, a game reserve, a reptile park, Parliament, and museums. At each stop, participants will have the chance to choose what they want to see. We are making contact with Mutinta (now Anina) Sondesi Williams, our former Global Scholar, and we may make a side trip to her home.

Estimated cost for the air fares to and from all cities is about \$2,400. We are still making final arrangements and are open to changes desired by the travelers.

Aral Sea Global Scholar — Funded by our District

In the December issue of this *District Dispatch*, we reported that our district committed \$22,500 of District Designated Funds for a Global Scholar from Kazakhstan to take part in a special master's degree program offered through the University for Peace in Costa Rica, Oregon State University and Delft Institute for Water Education in the Netherlands.

Recruitment has been taking place for this scholar. Mt. Pleasant club member Tony Delillo is married to a woman from Kazakhstan ,and she has been helping Rotary International recruit candidates for this scholarship and master's degree program.

The Aral Sea basin is in Central Asia. It is surrounded by Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Afghanistan and Iran. Rivers feeding into the Aral Sea were diverted for irrigation and other projects starting in the 1960's when most of the countries were part of the Soviet Union. The size of the sea has shrunk disastrously since then.

Rotary has been trying to bring representatives of the countries together to cooperate with water policy planning. It has organized and supported two gatherings, which have been pretty successful.

The next step for Rotary has been to recruit a cohort of master's degree students from six of the affected countries to pursue studies in the science of water as well as the policy of water. Our district is privileged to be one of the sponsors of this innovative effort.

The float highlighted our six areas of focus: Peace and Conflict Prevention/ Resolution, Disease Prevention and Treatment, Water and Sanitation, Maternal and Child Health, Basic Education and Literacy, and Economic and Community Development.

We were able to purchase seats to watch the parade, We arrived at 7 AM on a beautiful, sunny Pasadena morning. Perfect day for a parade. I have to say that watching the parade live was everything I hoped it would be. Helping decorate the float only made it better. I'd do it again in an instant!

Connie M. Deford is the current Secretary and a Charter Member of the Bay City Morning Rotary Club. She was also the club's first Secretary in 1990 and served as President in 1993/1994. She is a Paul Harris Fellow +1.

Connie is the retired City Clerk of Bay City, Michigan. Her certification as a CMC (Certified Municipal Clerk) was from Michigan State University. She was voted Michigan City Clerk of the Year and was the recipient of the prestigious Quill Award from the International Institute of Municipal Clerks, the Bay County Bar Association Liberty Bell Award, and the Michigan Municipal League Award of Merit.

Currently, she serves as a Professional Registered Parliamentarian and meeting consultant. She is a Past President of the Michigan Unit of Registered Parliamentarians, the Michigan State Association of Parliamentarians, and the National Association of Parliamentarians (NAP). Every six years since 1989, she is required to renew her "Professional" designation with NAP. Currently she serves that organization as Chairman of the Ethics Committee. Connie serves clients and teaches parliamentary procedure to local, state, national, and international organizations throughout the United States and Canada.

In 1992, Connie was appointed as the first Administrative Assistant with Rotary District 6310. She remains in that position, having served in the administrations of District Governors Georgene Hildebrand, Duane Reyhl, Delores Brock, Michael Kelly, Cheryl Peterson, and now Patricia Post.

Within her duties as Administrative Assistant, Connie maintains records for the district and records minutes of the Annual Meeting, monthly Executive Committee meetings, and The Rotary Foundation quarterly meetings. She also prepares and distributes the district monthly newsletter, the *District Dispatch*.

Each year, before the start of the Rotary year, she works with the incoming District Governor and prepares and has published the District Directory. She orders and distributes badges each year, with the Rotary International President's logo, to all officers and committee chairs. In conjunction with the Annual Meeting, she is responsible for obtaining information from clubs for the Yellow Rose Ceremony; and if voting is necessary at that meeting, she assists the clubs with designation of electors for votes requiring that designation.

As the *ex officio* parliamentarian for the district, she reviews club constitutions and bylaws for compliance with the Rotary International Manual of Procedure. These are kept on file in her office. She also assists clubs and their officers with keeping their membership records on file with ClubRunner.

Connie is an avid Michigan State University fan and flag flyer, and her two children both graduated from that university. They both married MSU graduates, and each have a son and a daughter. Breaking with tradition, the grandchildren are enrolled at the University of Michigan, Penn State University, and Valparaiso University. There is only one more chance, when her youngest grandchild graduates from high school in two years, to have another Spartan in the family!

Rotary Plant a Tree Project

As we near Earth Day 2018 [April 22nd] we hope all Rotary Clubs in District 6310 are completing their plans on how to meet the challenge of this year's Rotary International President Ian Riseley for every Rotarian in the world to plant a tree.

There are a variety of ways that this might be accomplished, but for those unsure as to how to proceed, we have suggested one idea in a previous issue of the *District Dispatch* that involves working with your local county conservation district to purchase inexpensive seedling trees and shrubs to plant, perhaps involving local school children in the work.

The Rotary Club of Pinconning & Standish recently invited the administrator and the forester of the Arenac Conservation District to discuss with club members the types of native plants that could be purchased through that conservation district. Twenty-seven [27] species of trees, both conifer and deciduous, are available through the Arenac CD. In addition, sixteen [16] shrubs that provide food and shelter for wildlife are being offered. In addition to seedlings, larger trees as tall at 6 feet are offered, although for a higher cost. Your local conservation district may be offering many of the same plants. If not, clubs in District 6310 are welcome to order plants from the Arenac CD.

If your club would like a copy of the presentation made by the Arenac folks at our club meeting, or if you would like to receive an order form showing the plants available, please contact me in one of the ways shown below. Plant orders are now being taken, with delivery set for the third week of April, a perfect time to meet the Earth Day target. The sooner plants are ordered, the more likely you are to receive what you want.

Whatever you do, we encourage clubs to consider planting only native trees and shrubs. They are more likely to survive and will enhance the local environment for both wildlife and people.

District 6310 began the year at 1,367 members. We are now at 1,354. This is a total loss of 13 members.
