The new Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo, a member of the Rotary Club of Ragusa, Italy, and an orthodontist in private practice, has been selected by the Board of Directors to become Rotary International's President for 2025-2026.

The Rotary International Board conducted a special session following the unexpected resignation of RI President-elect Mário César Martins de Camargo on June 8<sup>th</sup>. Guided by the RI code and policies, the board selected the new President-elect from a pool of candidates who were considered by the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in August 2023.

In President Arezzo's remarks at the International Convention in Calgary, he said "Let us create one great shared dream that unites us, that excites us, that changes the world and changes our lives, too." He asked members to come together with a focus on membership, the eradication of polio, and peace.

He added, "Together, we can unite. We can unite to change lives, including our own. We can unite to change communities, right around the corner and half a world away. We can unite to change our world for the better, not just for us, but for generations to come. Together, we Unite for Good."

# Letter from Rotary Global Scholar

# Timmy Kipfmiller







Dear Rotarians,

As my coursework begins to slow, I have decided to record some reflections regarding my time at Cambridge! The Rotary Global Grant Scholarship has transformed my life in ways, cultivating my love for learning, people, and the planet. Every day, I am grateful for the generous support of Rotarians in Saffron Walden, Cambridge and back home in Michigan. Without their kindness and guidance, I would not have developed into the person who writes this message today.

Upon my arrival in Cambridge, I was quite overwhelmed. I found myself in an unfamiliar place surrounded by people from across the globe. This type of cultural immersion is difficult to achieve in the United States where the American way of life is so ingrained into every aspect of your day; thus, early interactions with course mates opened my eyes to the world. Each member of the Engineering for Sustainable Development (ESD) cohort, brilliant and unique in their own way, travelled from around the globe to study at the University of Cambridge. In total, the 30 student cohort included scholars from England, Germany, Ghana, Qatar, Kuwait, Canada, South Africa, Zimbabwe, China, Australia, Indonesia, Singapore, Kenya, Sudan, the Netherlands, and the United States. Regardless of the country, each person arrived in Cambridge with a commitment towards making the world a better place through sustainability. This vision gave life to the program, motivating each student to challenge traditional ways of thinking regarding the harmonious relationship between engineering and the environment. This constant intellectual challenge culminated in coursework concerning sustainable development and political mechanisms for change. For the purpose of this reflection, I will highlight the three most impactful assignments from my program.

The ESD program's focus on cultivating systems thinking to solve complex sustainability issues related to climate change, infrastructure resilience, and international development generated a wide variety of assignment submissions. Recently, I completed an assignment titled: "Building a Resilient Water Supply in Mexico City: Enhanced Resilience Assessment." This assignment explored innovative methods to identify and address Mexico City's water infrastructure challenges, assisting policymakers—in their decision-making process. The holistic analysis uncovered political, economic, and—societal factors that hinder Mexico City's access to clean water. Solving these challenges,—like other sustainability issues, requires outside-the-box solutions that counter traditional thought processes. This thinking has been foundational in the ESD learning process.

Outside of infrastructure resilience, the program has also forced me to interact with policy. This pollical thinking culminated in a policy brief for fictional representatives in the Government of Malawi. The brief was titled: "Powering Malawi: Strengthening Local Governance and Funding Structures for Increased Energy Access." This submission proposed an alternative policy structure aimed at increasing energy access throughout the small African country of Malawi. Currently, only 12% of Malawi's population has access to clean, reliable electricity; thus, sustainable and resilient energy solutions are needed to create long-lasting energy infrastructure for the region. This policy development pushed me outside of my comfort zone, transitioning my schoolwork from calculations to deeper contemplation regarding actionable policy development.

Aside from politics and resilience, I developed a water strategy for Kenya that focused on enhanced irrigation techniques. This paper required in-depth understanding of the country's water infrastructure, along with appropriate knowledge of change mechanisms to enhance sustainability. Ultimately, each assignment challenged my limited knowledge of politics, economics, and global society. They forced me to understand the connection between each unique factor and helped me realize that sustainability is a multi-faceted challenge.

Outside of coursework, my time at Cambridge has allowed me to continually grow physically, culturally, and emotionally. I have cultivated numerous relationships with friends from around the world, eating their food and listening to stories about their lives. Additionally, I have travelled across Europe, devouring Crepes in France, appreciating the aroma of Dutch Tulips, and hiking the Irish countryside. These journeys have opened my heart to new perspectives, ideas, and adventures.

I was even able to challenge my body in new ways as I ran the Paris Marathon in April. As a person who grew up in a small Midwestern town, I am thankful for these challenges and new experiences. I never thought that life would take me along this path; however, my Cambridge journey has given me stories, friendships, and knowledge that I will cherish for the rest of my life.

In conclusion, I would like to encourage every Rotarian to find peace in knowing that the work of the Rotary Foundation has a tremendous impact across the globe. The organization's "Service Above Self" mentality should be embraced everyday as it continually inspires people to work towards a better future. I speak on this because Rotarians continually inspire me to become the best version of myself. Someone who loves others, gives to others, and wholeheartedly believes in the Rotary Foundation's vision for a better world.

# Polio Update

As we begin our new Rotary year, we have an opportunity to reflect on last year and determine steps to take to improve this year. On June 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Gates Foundation agreed to continue the 2:1 match with Rotary that will provide \$450 million to support the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. The \$61,451 that our district gave last year will be matched by the Gates Foundation. Thanks to district Rotarians who were part of this generosity, 16 of our clubs have given at least \$1,500 to polio and will receive a certificate from Rotary International. Polio Eradicator Clubs will be determined after all monies are tabulated by RI.

Efforts to improve the delivery of vaccines throughout the world continue. A hexavalent vaccine is being used in Mauritania and Senegal that immunizes against six diseases including polio. Somalia is using a vaccine that offers triple protection against measles, pneumonia, and polio.

So far this calendar year 15 cases of the wild poliovirus have been recorded, 2 in Afghanistan and 13 in Pakistan.

Please consider joining the PolioPlus Society. This merely requires a gift of \$100 per year until polio is eradicated.

## **Celebrating a Century of Service**

A milestone 100 years in the making was joyfully celebrated as the Rotary Club of Mt. Pleasant hosted a commemorative banquet on May 16<sup>th</sup>, bringing together 117 guests for an unforgettable evening of reflection, recognition, and Rotary fellowship.

President Christian Velasquez of the Midland Rotary Club—whose members sponsored the Mt. Pleasant Club a century ago—also shared thoughtful reflections and best wishes on this full-circle celebration.
