Exciting Changes Coming to Foundation!

Economic and Community Development

On July 1, 2013, the Rotary Foundation will undergo some significant changes. The way we contribute to the Foundation will not change, Polio Plus, and the Rotary Peace Centers funding and operation will not change. But the grant programs will be very different.

The many humanitarian and education grant programs we have now will be condensed into three: District Grants, Global Grants, and Packaged Grants. You will hear more about each of these in future editions of the Dispatch.

Why are we seeing changes? There are three reasons. First, the new model will allow us (clubs, districts, and the Foundation) to have a greater impact on humanitarian needs; we have seen what our focus on Polio has done, and the Foundation wants to help us have a similar impact on other world needs in the following six areas of focus:



Second, focusing our efforts will bring more public recognition to the wonderful work Rotary and its Foundation do. Third, the Foundation has been spending a lot of our money administering the grant programs and the new model will be more efficient and economical.

Rotary has tested the new model – called Future Vision – with 100 clubs for the past 3 years. Now it is rolling out this model for all districts. District 6310 is developing guidelines and support for our transition to the new Foundation. Eileen Jennings has agreed to become the district Foundation Chair. Penny St. Cyr has agreed to be the Grants Chair. Paul Moore will serve as the District Grants Chair.

Comprehensive training will be provided to all clubs in February 2013. In fact, one of the major changes is that clubs may apply for District Grants only after two members of the club have attended the training, called Grants Management Seminar. Alpena Rotary Club installs two Peace Poles

The Rotary Club of Alpena recently planted two peace poles on Rotary Island, located in the Thunder Bay River. The club planted the poles as a part of the 2012-13 Rotary International theme. Peace through Service. The club intends to plant a new pole each year in various locations around the city. The next location will be near the playground built by the club on the Lake Huron waterfront.

Languages with meaning were chosen for both poles. One pole has English, French, German, and Polish in recognition of the heritage of the citizens of Alpena. The other pole has English, Japanese, Korean, and Italian. The Japanese is in honor of current Rotary International President Sakuji Tanaka. The Italian is in honor of the Rotary Youth Exchange student from Italy that the Alpena Club is hosting for the 2012-13 year. The Korean is in honor of the Group Study Exchange team scheduled to visit the area through a Rotary International project. The poles will be dedicated as a part of the District Conference in April 2013.

The Rotary Island is a project of the local club started in 1995 and continues today. Once an abandoned piece of property that used to house an old lumber processing mill in the 1800s, the club cleared the island, built a bridge connecting it with the bicycle path that encircles the city, and created pathways. Over the years a fishing platform has been added and another bridge was built from the other side, connecting the Great Lakes Maritime Heritage Center with the island. Later a gazebo along with bench seating was added.

I've been in Germany for three months now, and looking back it's hard to believe all the things I've done in that short amount of time. I remember getting off the airplane after going through five different airports, exhausted, excited, nervous, and seeing my host mother for the first time.

The immediate love I felt in her hug was enough to make me cry, because all I could think was, "This is my new home."

Since that time, I've had more new experiences than I could have imagined. I've become best friends with Germans, Brazilians, and Paraguayans. I've gotten lost with people from around the world in the Berlin subway. I've wandered around Vienna with my German classmates. I've finally mastered the bus system in my area!

Being an exchange student has taught me that I can take care of myself and do things that seem out of reach. It's taught me that I can be friends with people around the world, despite what seems to be an impossible language barrier.

I'm already dreading the day I have to leave, not knowing when or if I'm ever going to see the great friends I've made again. That means I have to make the most of the seven months left I have here!

A year ago, I would have never though my life could be like this. I'm so grateful for the opportunity to live abroad, and I'm extremely excited to see what the rest of this year holds for me.







Moca Rotary Club, Dominican Republic

For the past year the Frankenmuth Morning Rotary Club has talked about stepping up our international activity by sponsoring a project. That opportunity came when our District Water and Sanitation Committee identified potential projects. Dave Morgan asked me to travel with him to the Dominican Republic in early October to see first-hand the project the Moca Rotary Club identified.

The Moca Rotary Club wants to help Paso de Moca, a small village outside the town of Moca. Paso de Moca means step from Moca in Española. It is an impoverished community of around 100 families, needing water from wells, water filters, and many latrines (25). Each latrine on average will be shared with four families. Three wells exist but each needs a hand pump to be better utilized. Point of use water filters are needed for most homes.



The benefit of latrines, pumps, and filtered water is a better quality of life and surrounding environment for the 100 families. They will have a place for human waste, limiting pollution and the spread of diseases, parasites, and bacteria. Personal hygiene and overall health will be better.

This community is in stark contrast to the nice homes many of the Rotary members own, very much like yours and mine. And the drive is less than ten minutes outside of Moca. What makes this project special is that Bernard, one of the Moca Rotarians, grew up in this area and has a connection to this community.

When we traveled together I noticed that many local people know Bernard and that is when he said he grew up here. He knows the local community leaders and will follow up with the projects.

Local Rotary Community Corps workers will do the work as one way to keep the cost down and take "ownership" in the project. The Moca Rotary Club has been involved with the design of the latrines and will be contributing money to the project.

The Moca Rotary people are very gracious with big hearts. When I mentioned this to Dave, he said that is very typical of Rotary people all over the world. They opened their homes and their hearts to us, and we experienced many local foods, including Sancocho, a local favorite.

What can you do to help? Our next step in the matching grant process is to get approval of the grant. Your club's international dollars will be needed to fund the grant. Using the Matching Grant, the total cost of the project is just under \$25,000. \$7,000 is needed from clubs in our district. Contributions can range from \$200 to \$2,000. Set aside funds now, and when we get a project number, we will ask for your check. Contact me directly to make a pledge from this year's budget for this project. Your thoughtful contribution can change a village and improve many lives!"

I am also available to speak to your club and give a presentation on this project about how we can impact so many people. Please contact me if you are interested.
