Megan Levy - Midland Rotary to Trenčín, Slovakia

I'm going to be completely honest here: two years ago, if someone had asked me to locate Slovakia on a map, I don't think I could have pulled it off. When I first considered the idea of an exchange program, I had my eyes set on Spain or Latin America as a way to improve my Spanish skills. Or perhaps somewhere exotic, warm, and exciting like Asia. I think I must have changed my top countries at least six or seven times in the process.

Instead, I ended up in the heart of Europe, in a country where the national language is spoken by only 5 million people and still has over a foot of snow in April.

Slovakia is a small country, far overlooked by many tourists who, a) know it only by its reputation from movies like Eurotrip and Hostel, or b) don't know it exists at all. But having lived here for close to eight months now, I can say it's one of the most incredible places to be an exchange student. I have met some of the most hospitable and caring people, who are willing to allow me into their homes and lives. People who are willing to put in the time to work with an exchange student who could hardly speak the Slovak, one of the most difficult European languages, for months. Communication, a basic function that we are accustomed to using in our everyday lives, becomes a struggle. However, one of the big learning experiences for me was learning how to communicate in other ways: we smile, we dance, and sometimes, we wave our arms around wildly in an attempt to mime whatever it is that we want to say (generally eliciting laughter from anyone in on the conversation).

> If there is anything I have learned from my exchange experience, it's that no matter how well you prepare yourself for what you expect to come, things aren't always going to go as planned. Things change, things go wrong, and it's how you deal with it that counts and truly shows how you've matured. I have made countless mistakes, embarrassed myself time and time again, and made decisions on all sorts of things that had never crossed my mind before. So maybe I never expected to end up here, in this crazy, wonderful country that I knew so little about only a few years ago, but I couldn't be happier that I'm here now. I only have a few months left here, but I'm looking forward to making them the best three months of the year.

Thank you Rotary, from the bottom of my heart, for this opportunity. In just eight months, I have learned so much about people, the world, a largely unknown yet exciting culture, and myself as well. Being able to see another way of life by living it instead of just studying it from a textbook has so much more value. I can't even being to express how much that means to me as a to-be college freshman this fall with an interest in international studies. It's been a great year, and I can't wait to see where life will take me next!

In February, the Mt. Pleasant Rotary Club hosted its 50th annual beef tenderloin dinner. This is one of two fund raisers held each year to raise money for local community service projects. Rotarians gather to prepare approximately 700 meals at the local high school. The meals are sold for \$15 per plate.

Rotary Club of Saginaw

In March of this year, the Rotary Club of Saginaw sponsored its 10th annual Saginaw on Stage fund-raising concert. It has, in that decade, raised more than \$100,000 to benefit the arts and other non-profits.

And on May 2, the club and Saginaw on Stage received a prestigious 24th Annual All Area Arts Award, bestowed by the Saginaw Arts & Enrichment Commission to quality-of-life individuals, organizations, and businesses in Saginaw County. The awards were announced at a banquet from a list this year of 10 nominations.

Remarkably, the day before, on May 1, the Rotary Club of Saginaw also won the adult-age Bee for Literacy spelling bee, an annual fund-raiser luncheon by the local chapter of Altrusa International. Rotary's threemember team outlasted ten other community organizations in rounds where the words grew more and more difficult.

But back to the Saginaw on Stage series of concerts -- where 30 bands perform on five stages, between 4-11 p.m., at the Apple Mountain complex in Freeland. Each plays a 45-60-minute set and every genre is there: blues, pop, rock, jazz, latin, country, folk, big band; an a cappella vocal group. This year added a theatrical component performing mime, dance, poetry, improv.

Rotary Club of Saginaw members Dave Oppermann in New Reformation Band, Bill Federspiel in The Wolfpack, Rod Bieber in Mike Brush and Strings, Eric DeVos in Red Hawkins Band, and Todd Farley in Todd's Theatrical Picks.

Beneficiaries over those ten years are: Child Abuse and Neglect Council, Child and Family Services, Mid-Michigan Children's Museum, Community Prescription Support Program, Saginaw Bay Symphony Orchestra, Pit and Balcony Community Theater, Saginaw Art Museum, Saginaw Choral Society, Saginaw Riverfront Development, Saginaw County Business and Education Partnership, Saginaw Family Care Network, The Dictionary Project, and Covenant Sleepsack Project, all locally -- as well as, globally, Japanese tsunami relief, clean water initiatives, and polio eradication.

Many of you may remember Melinda Boznik, an Ambassadorial Scholar from Hungary to our District In 2005-2006. I connected with her on Linked In and thought you'd like to see what she has accomplished.

In the summer of 2006, Melinda served as an intern and assistant to the Consul at the Embassy of Hungary in Washington, D.C. At this position, she prepared summaries and analysis of Congressional hearings and conferences, and she took part in the organization of cultural events for the 50th Anniversary of the 1956 Hungarian Revolution.

After attending Saginaw Valley State University here in the U.S., she continued her studies at the Institut d'Etudes plitiques de Paris where she focused on European Foreign Policy and International Migration. She completed her Masters degree in International Relations at the Budapesti Corvinus Egyetum. Melinda wrote her masters thesis on the migration policy in the European Union.

Currently Melinda is a transitions project manager at Citi, responsible for fully managing transfer of HR data entry, HR administration, and Payroll services to the Employee Services organization locally and coordinating transfer of work from the EMEA region to the Hungarian Shared Service Centre.

RYLA Registration Deadline is Fast Approaching!

The deadline for submission of registrations for High School Juniors to attend Camp Rotary June 9-13 under the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards is May 21, 2013. Participants are to have completed their third year of high school, so sophomores will have to wait one more year.

RYLA Chairmen should remember that the student's physical form from a doctor or a copy of their athletic physical for the year, a signed copy of the climbing consent form, camp ground rules signed by the student and a parent, and the completed health and medical record of the student which their parents complete must accompany the registration form

A check from the club for the tuition of \$250 per student must accompany the registration form. All of the forms may be downloaded from the District website.

Based on the recommendation of each Rotary Club, the students are accepted for camp, unless there are extenuating circumstances, in which case I will contact the Club Chairman. Remember, the club must provide transportation to and from camp; or if you approve the change, parents may provide the transportation.
