SECOND. Since that philosophy is at the heart of Rotary, exchanging ideas with like- minded professionals within Rotary reinforces why holding ourselves to the highest standards is so important.

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life; At the core of every business is service. Service above Self simply says it all.

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service. Reaching outside of ourselves and stretching beyond our own business and occupation, Rotary enables us to impact the world in a way that individually we might never be able to achieve. Strength in numbers is never more evident than in the power of Rotary to engage people worldwide and change lives. We are much more than a once-a-week lunch group. Polio Plus Contributions

We have completed another successful Rotary year. Our district has contributed over \$40,000 towards the eradication of Polio from our world. This will be matched 2 for 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. We can be proud of our efforts.

Congratulations to the Frankenmuth Club for leading our gifts with \$17,500. They were followed by the Rotary Club of Bay City with a gift of \$3,963.80. The Pigeon Club followed at \$2,316.70. Thanks to all for their efforts.

Let's continue using the "change" jars this next Rotary year. The Change in your Pocket can Change a life.

From The Rotary Foundation:

Polio Plus is now more than just about polio. The extensive polio-eradication infrastructure created by Rotary, its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, governments, and health ministries provide a model for saving millions of people from vaccine preventable deaths. The massive infrastructure that has been created encompasses millions of trained health workers as well as best practices and knowledge, which now can be used to combat other infectious diseases and to undertake other critical health interventions.

Detailed micro-planning and mapping, the tracking of migrant groups, social mobilization programs, and systematic training and employment of vaccination teams can now be applied to other health initiatives. The network now used in the surveillance of polio cases can be used to handle other diseases, including measles, tetanus, meningitis and yellow fever. It has also assisted in the global response to the outbreak of SARS, to floods in Pakistan, and to the tsunami in Southeast Asia.

Most recently, Nigeria used the infrastructure and surveillance system to end the deadly Ebola outbreak. For 30 years, Rotarians have worked to eradicate polio from 99% of the world. That effort has not only ended polio in 122 countries, but has also created a roadmap for the world to tackle a myriad of other health priorities.

A copy of the City resolution recognizing the club and naming the bridge is included below.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS, The Mt. Pleasant Rotary Club has been a part of the Mt. Pleasant Community for over 88 years and has as one of its major core values "service to the community" and where "service above self" is the organization's guiding principle. The local Rotary Club has a long history of supporting area projects for the greater good; and WHEREAS, The City of Mt. Pleasant maintains the GKB Riverwalk Trail that connects five major city parks and is enthusiastically used by many citizens and visitors alike; and WHEREAS, The City has a need to replace an aging pedestrian bridge connecting key portions of the Riverwalk system at Nelson Park; and The Rotary Club recognizes the value of maintaining open space WHEREAS, and access to public parks and recreational activities that promote communitywide health and well-being regardless of ability and has committed to partnering with the City by donating half the cost up to \$20,000 to build a universally accessible covered bridge to meet this community need well into the future; and WHEREAS, Upon completion, the Rotary Bridge will provide daily access to over 500 citizens and visitors of all abilities and will bear the Rotary Logo integrated into the bridge cupola fitting the nature and character of the overall bridge design; and WHEREAS, It is clearly recognized that the Rotary Club's local commitment and ongoing fundraising efforts have been a substantial benefit to the Mt. Pleasant community. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Commission, on behalf of the citizens of Mt. Pleasant, recognize the generosity of the Mt. Pleasant Rotary membership and their contributions to this quality of life project; and FURTHER, Upon successful completion of the bridge and donation of the funds committed, will officially name the covered bridge at Nelson Park The Mt. Pleasant "Rotary Bridge" In Witness Whereof, I hereunto set my hand and the Great Seal of the City of Mount Pleasant, Michigan, this 25th day of November, 2013.
